It is with some reluctance and with a faint feeling of foolishness that I write to you with the following incident. I noted this occurrence over a year ago, but didn't place much importance with it then - or now, but having recently read a run of articles about the so-called 'flying saucers', the latest in the current issue of the Saturday Evening Post, I thought that I could pass along this information for what it is worth.

On April 1, 1949, at about 8:30 P.M.CDT, I was driving my car in a westerly direction on highway 66 about 13 miles east of Amarillo, Texas. The sun had gone down, and dusk was approaching. I noticed what appeared to be a rather bright star almost dead ahead, possibly a little south of west a few points. There were no other stars visible yet however, and this one seemed to be considerably elongated. I watched it for several minutes, and finally commented about it to my wife. She too noted that it did seem to be rather long or then is usually the case with an evening star. The brightness was about that of the brightest of stars. I observed this object for a period of several minutes, and it appeared to be moving, but as I had been moving along the highway at about 35 mph, it was impossible to get a fix on it and be certain.

I stopped the car, went back to my trailer and took out camera and a 35 mm. film, and took a picture of the object through the ground glass. It was still a prominent white light object and the possible speed, as it moved about 3 3/4 - 4 1/2 degrees in 10 seconds. I was holding a film slide ready. As this had been done, I took a shot in front of the object. A sharp focus was obtained, and the picture taken with an exposure of 1/10 sec. At this time, the object had disappeared without any perceptible trace of motion.

The next day, I developed the film and found that the print was all, so must go back no readily recognizable object. All the negatives were destroyed, but I enclose herewith one of the slides.


Soon after I had taken the pictures, the object seemed to either
