1. In compliance with directives received from higher headquarters, forwarded herewith is complete information as received from a witness who viewed an object presumed to be a "flying disc" over Hickam Field. This object was first seen by Capt. [REDACTED] on 4 January 1949 at 1407 local time and went out of sight at approximately 1435 local time. The object was first sighted by Capt. [REDACTED] when it was approximately 25 miles due east of Hickam. There were scattered clouds at 3500 feet (base) and the visibility at the time was approximately 20 miles plus. Capt. [REDACTED] is the Assistant S-3 Officer of the 1810th AAC'S Group located at Hickam Field, T. H., and is also a twin-engine pilot. No photographs are available due to the fact that Capt. [REDACTED] was not in possession of a camera at the time and had no idea that he would have sufficient time to procure one. In the words of Capt. [REDACTED] the object appeared to be a large round piece of flat white cardboard, oscillating continually. The object sighted was the only one seen and appeared to approximate the size of an AF-C. Capt. [REDACTED] stated that the object seemed to be extremely white on the underside, while the topside portion of the object seemed to have a dark, non-reflecting surface. The speed of the object was approximated at 85 miles per hour. Capt. [REDACTED] further stated that the object circled the area, making right circles and left circles at approximately

AMC Opinion: The evidence does not lead to an explanation. It should be noted, however, that if the object were actually the size of a T-6 at 3000 feet a greater amount of detail should have been observed.

With 37 incidents thus eliminated, there remain thirty-four which contain some evidence but have no apparent ready explanation. This statement is true only under the assumption that the evidence is accepted as reliable and accurate. When psychological and physiological factors are taken into consideration, all of these incidents can be explained rationally, as pointed out by Rand Corporation and the Fifts of Air Materiel Command Aero-Medical Laboratory (see Appendices "F" and "G").

Air Materiel Command Aero-Medical Laboratory (Dr. Paul M. Gifford considered)

There are sufficient psychological explanations for the reports of unidentified flying objects to provide plausible explanations for reports not otherwise explainable. These errors in identifying visual stimuli result chiefly from inability to estimate speed, distance, size.

All of the remaining 34 incidents are treated in detail in this report. These incidents form no pattern in regard to area of sighting, type of object, or manner of performance. There are indications, however, that some sightings were influenced by earlier reports, probably would not have been considered unusual or reported had they been no publicity.

VII. Summary of AMC Evaluation of Remaining Reports

The remaining unexplained incidents (see Appendix "F") exhibit a few common characteristics. Two of them, by statements of the reporters, could not have been made had the witnesses not read of the Mt. Shasta Incident (Incident No. 17). Most were distributed without pattern throughout the United States. A few were outside the U. S. No two descriptions of appearance or performance were exactly alike. The reported sightings occurred at various times of day and year.

APPENDIX X

In the following section of this report, each remaining unexplained incident is considered separately. It is not the intent to generalize as to character of observers, but each case has undesirable elements which must not be disregarded. The numerical designation is merely the catalog number of the incident in the project files.

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Incident #236 -- near Hickam Field, Hawaii -- 4 January 1949

There is clearly no astronomical explanation for this incident.

The account given seems trustworthy, even though only one person saw the circular disc. This report differs from many others in that the description of maneuvers executed by the object is definite, rather than hazy.

3000 feet, continually gaining altitude and then suddenly departed, still climbing on a straight course of 25 degrees magnetic. It is the opinion of the witness that the object had limited maneuverability, and that no audible sound emanated from the object. There was no exhaust trail visible.

2. The witness was much impressed by the brilliance of the whiteness of the underside of the object and stated that prior to the disappearance of the object at a distance of 40 to 50 miles from Hickam Field, the object still seemed to give off a blinking whitish reflection and, according to the witness, this blinking seemed to go on and off with decided regularity.

3. Capt. [REDACTED] reported the presence of a C-54 type aircraft in the vicinity of Hickam Field at the time of the initial sighting of the object, and he stated that he was almost convinced that this object was released from or by this C-54 aircraft.

4. Capt. [REDACTED] reported that, at all times and during the departure of the object, the undulation of the object was extremely rhythmical and that this rhythmical cycle was completed approximately once every second.

5. When object ultimately departed on a straight course, it appeared to increase speed and also to increase the angle of climb so that the angle of climb approximated 25 degrees. Witness stated that it was extremely difficult to approximate the rate of speed during departure due to the distance involved and the intermittency of the reflection. Witness stated that it was his opinion that this object was under absolute control at all times and that definite gyrations were being executed. The turns were extremely wide and decisive.

6. The opinion of Capt. [REDACTED] on this subject is considered to be worthy of consideration as this officer is an extremely cool and level-headed person, who is not given to the making of rash statements or using poor judgment.

7. In the event that further information is desired by your headquarters concerning the object as reported, this headquarters will be ready to cooperate in every way possible.

1. In compliance with requests contained in basic communication, forwarded herewith is one completed copy of Guide to Investigation.

2. In lieu of a signed statement, the observer was requested to certify to the statements of observation contained in the Guide to Investigation. This information supplements the initial radiogram report to your headquarters immediately subsequent to the occurrence of the incident and the complete written report forwarded immediately thereafter.

3. No other witnesses reported observance of this incident to the undersigned. However, it has been noted that observers of the incident, who are presently connected with other commands, have reported the incident to the Intelligence Section of their command.

4. Reference paragraph 4, basic communication, item 3 of the "General" Section of the inclosed completed form has been completed in as much detail as is possible. Pacific Airlines.
