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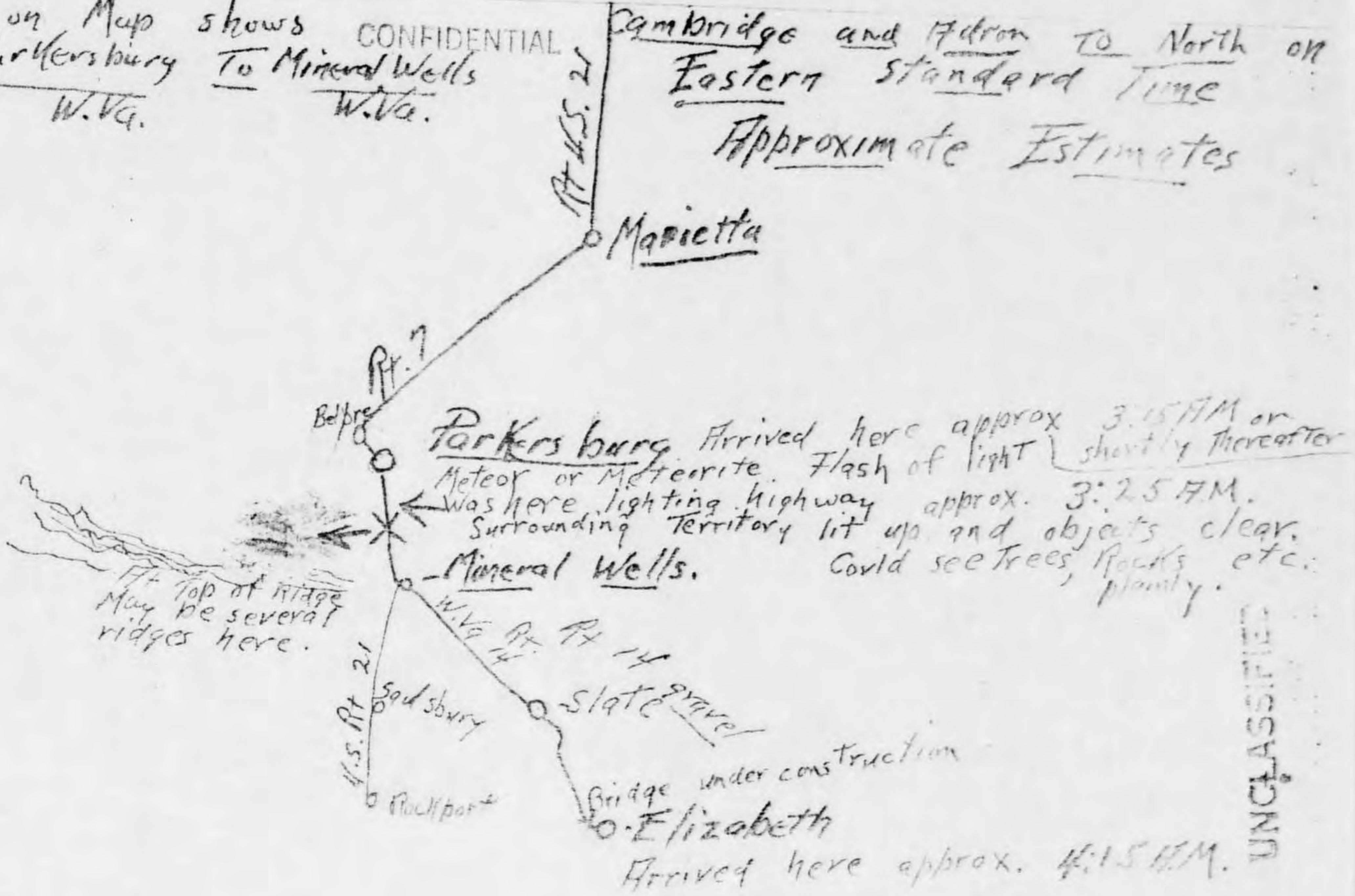

NARRATIVE SUMMARY:

On 5 February 1949, at approximately 0330 hours, while driving three (3) to five (5) miles south of Parkersburg, West Virginia, on U.S. Route #21, toward Elizabeth, West Virginia, an aerial phenomenon was observed that lasted from fifteen (15) to twenty (20) seconds. [REDACTED] first noticed an intense white light, which was followed by a reddish yellow light. Against the hill which served as a background, [REDACTED] saw an object approximately four (4) inches in diameter inclining toward the hill. The object had molten drops coming from its rear. [REDACTED] could not judge whether the object disintegrated or rose over the hill.

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

On 18 May 1949, Mr. [REDACTED], Room No. 2, [REDACTED] Akron, Ohio, was interviewed in the Detachment Office [REDACTED] Akron, Ohio, in reference to [REDACTED] observation of [REDACTED] aerial phenomenon. After having been informed of his rights under the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America, Mr. [REDACTED] executed a signed statement, the gist of which is as follows:

On 5 February 1949, at approximately 0330 hours, while driving three (3) to five (5) miles south of Parkersburg, West Virginia, on U. S. Route #21, toward Elizabeth, West Virginia, an aerial phenomenon was observed that lasted from fifteen (15) to twenty (20) seconds. Mr. [REDACTED] first noticed an intense white light, which was followed by a reddish yellow light. Against the hill which served as a background, Mr. [REDACTED] saw an object approximately four (4) inches in diameter inclining toward the hill. The object had molten drops coming from its rear. Mr. [REDACTED] could not judge whether the object disintegrated or rose over the hill.

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STATEMENT

I, [REDACTED], residing at Room No. 2 [REDACTED] Akron, Ohio, having been duly advised of my rights under the Fifth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America that I need not make any statement; that my silence in this respect will not raise any inference of guilt against me; that I may make a sworn or unsworn statement; and that any statement I care to make may be used against me in any proceeding, civil or criminal, which may arise from the facts hereinafter stated, do proceed to state as follows:

Q. What is your name?

A. [REDACTED].

Q. Where do you reside?

A. Room No. 2 [REDACTED], Akron, Ohio.

Q. Where are you employed?

A. At the present time I am unemployed. Until February 1949, I was employed at the B. F. Goodrich Company, Akron, Ohio, where I was laid off because of a reduction in force.

Q. What was the date of your observation of the incident you mentioned in your letter to Headquarters, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio?

A. The date was 5 February 1949, at approximately 0330 hours.

Q. Where were you at the time of the incident?

A. I was driving approximately three (3) to five (5) miles south of Parkersburg, West Virginia, on U. S. Route #21 toward Elizabeth, West Virginia.

Q. What happened?

A. The highway and roadside were suddenly illuminated with an intense white light, changing into a reddish yellow light that lit up the whole area. I was going up a grade at the time between Parkersburg, West Virginia, and Mineral Wells, West Virginia.

Q. After the flash or lighting up of the highway, did you see any objects?

A. No, I saw no objects. However, I don't believe this was a mechanical thing. It didn't appear to be mechanical. There was this white light which diminished to this reddish yellow color, and then I was in darkness again.

Q. What was the length of time of this incident?

A. I would say that it lasted for approximately fifteen (15) to twenty (20) seconds.

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Q. Did you see any falling objects either during or after the flash?

A. No, I didn't. This incident occurred so quickly, I was taken by surprise. The intense white light which seemed to be directly over me faded into a reddish yellow glow, and the first thing I noticed was this reddish yellow stuff over to my right with a hill in the background. I picture it like a cast-iron cupola bursting out. The white light was so intense that I could see trees and stones along the road approximately twenty-five (25) to fifty (50) yards away from me.

Q. Did you see any moving objects prior to the flash?

A. No, I did not. There was nothing mechanical, nothing moving; it appeared to me to be soft molten stuff. The hill was in the background, and this thing was above me. Stuff seemed to be spewing out of it. I thought it was a meteor.

Q. Did this thing fall to the hillside?

A. No, it inclined to the hill and then sputtered. Whether it dissolved or not, I do know.

Q. What color was this thing you describe?

A. It was reddish yellow, like molten cast iron. It had a deep reddish yellow color, unlike molten steel which gives off a more intense and brighter light.

Q. Can you give us an idea of the size of this thing? Compare it with something in the office.

A. I actually don't know. Something was shooting out in the back of it, or the end of it. This spewing out was the principal thing in my mind. It happened so fast it was hard to grasp. I suppose it was about the size of that alarm clock on the file cabinet, but it is difficult to estimate sizes and distances, especially after dark. (Note: The ordinary alarm clock in this office has a diameter of four (4) inches, and ~~was~~ was a distance of approximately eighteen (18) feet away from it at the time of the above statement.)

Q. What was its altitude when it started on an incline?

A. It was a distance of two or three miles from me. It seemed quite a ways away from me.

Q. What was the altitude?

A. It was just below the hilltop. The road is surrounded by steep hills, and since the hills were the background, it couldn't have been too high.

Q. From your direction of travel, where did the object land?

A. It was southwest to my right, but whether it landed or cleared the hill, I can't say.

Q. What were the weather conditions as you remember them?
A. It was clear night, the moon may have been shining. It was not too cold. The temperature was around 30° or 40°, I would say, but this can be checked with the weather bureau.

Q. You first noticed it fading away into the distance?
A. Yes, there are gas wells there but they don't act like that. There are no steel mills to my knowledge in the vicinity. I don't know whether it was the first or second ridge of the hills. The drops and the reddish yellow color are what got me. I saw the light and then looked over on this hill and saw the object.

Q. Could it have gone over the top of the hill?
A. Yes.

Q. Did it hit the mountain or disintegrate?
A. I don't know, I couldn't see.

Q. After the flash, did it make a route of travel to the southwest?
A. All I saw was the object making the incline, it was not a sharp incline, and the red drops seemed to be a constant action.

Q. Were there any wings or fins?
A. No. The action of it was like pictures I have seen of Halley's Comet. It shed drops, and was similar to a geyser in a fountain.

Q. Did you see any objects other than the previously mentioned objects?
A. No. Picture a comet with a tail. I saw sparks or lines at the rear, and then my attention was directed to the spewing of a substance similar to drops of molten metal.

Q. Was there any odor?
A. No odor. I was in the car and the windows were closed.

Q. Was there any sound?
A. I didn't hear anything.

Q. From the time of the flash and from the last you saw of the object, can you recall how long a period of time was covered?
A. Not more than fifteen (15) or twenty (20) seconds. A very fast operation, twenty-five (25) seconds at the most.

Q. From what direction did its travel start?
A. No specific direction, from all around. It was very surprising to me. I could see the highway very clearly. It was a very intense light, as clear as daylight.

Q. Did the flash of the object leave any noticeable change in the weather?

A. I don't know, I had the car heater going and the windows up.

Q. Were you wearing glasses then?

A. Yes.

Q. How long had you been driving?

A. I worked from 6 to 12th midnight at Goodrich in Akron, and after work drove to Parkersburg, which is 170 miles. I stopped for gas once, and then stopped for more gas and had coffee and toast in Parkersburg. It was 3:05 approximately, West Virginia time. I may be off fifteen or twenty minutes. Around 3:15 or 3:30, I left Parkersburg. Then I drove three to five miles. I was tired.

Q. Was there anyone else in the area?

A. No, the highway was clear.

Q. Did you discuss the incident with anyone?

A. No, I was making the trip to see my boy and his girl. I got to Elizabeth at 4:20, and had to wait until the town woke up. My boy was in Parkersburg, so I didn't get to see him, but I saw his girl friend.

Q. Do you have any mechanical hobbies?

A. No, but I am a turret lathe operator, a grinder, and do some mechanical work.

Q. Do you have any hobbies?

A. Stamp collecting.

Q. What about your glasses, why do you wear them?

A. My eyes are in good shape. I wear glasses for eye strain, and there is only a slight correction in the lens. I don't wear them when I work.

Q. Has anyone mentioned seeing this object to you?

A. No.

Q. You were the only witness as far as you know?

A. Yes. I was alone in my car. I passed two or three cars on the way down from Parkersburg. I met another car at the junction of Routes #21 and #14. It is possible the occupants of this car could have witnessed the incident.

I further state that the foregoing statement was made by me freely and voluntarily, without promise of benefit, or threat, or use of force or duress. I have read the foregoing statement consisting of 5 pages, and it is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and belief.
