Ocurre, despite a stiff cross  
wind. It was round,  
pale yellow, flying in a  
vertical, elongated position,  
at approximately 2500 ft.  
Elevation, and about the  
speed of a passenger liner,  
many of which pass over  
our Shetland every day and  
night.
