SYNOPSIS

Investigation requested by Colonel V. R. CLINEBURN, Chief, Analysis Division, Intelligence Department, Headquarters, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio, to investigate a report contained in the 7 May 1949 edition of the Dayton Daily News, Dayton, Ohio, that a "flying saucer" was seen at Sidney, Ohio on 6 May 1949. An unidentified bright silver object was observed traveling through space at a fast rate of speed on 3, 4 and 6 May 1949, by residents of Sidney, Ohio and Hanleywood, Ohio.

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DETAILS:

1. This investigation was predicated upon receipt of a Routing and Record Sheet, dated 10 May 1949, from Colonel W. R. GILDEDERH, Chief, Analytic Division, Intelligence Department (WPAFB), Headquarters, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio, requesting an investigation be conducted of the "flying saucer" seen at Sidney, Ohio and reported by a newspaper article in the 7 May 1949 edition of the Dayton Daily News, Dayton, Ohio.

AT DAYTON, OHIO

2. Mr. [REDACTED], Dayton Daily News, Dayton, Ohio, was contacted on 18 May 1949 and he stated that Miss MILDRED CROWLEY of the Sidney Daily News, Sidney, Ohio, had furnished them the information for their newspaper.

AT SIDNEY, OHIO

3. Miss [REDACTED] Sidney Daily News, Sidney, Ohio was interviewed on 18 May 1949 and she stated that the only information that she had on the "flying saucer" was published in their paper on 3 May 1949 and 6 May 1949. Photostatic copies of the two newspaper articles attached hereto. [REDACTED] stated that Mr. F. [REDACTED] 107 North Ohio Street, Sidney, Ohio and Mr. [REDACTED] Sidney, Ohio saw the "flying disc" on 3 May 1949. Mrs. [REDACTED] [REDACTED], Columbus, Ohio saw a "flying disc" on 4 May 1949 and Mrs. [REDACTED] 107 North Ohio Street, Sidney, Ohio saw a "flying disc" on 6 May 1949.

4. Mr. [REDACTED] was interviewed on 18 May 1949 and he stated that he had observed an unidentified aerial object at approximately 0900 hours on 3 May 1949, just as he was opening his jewelry store for business. [REDACTED] stated that he was watching some birds on a high wire that crossed the street in front of his store when the bright shiny silver object appeared high in the sky. The object was shaped like a disc, approximately five inches in diameter and appeared to be traveling at a fast rate of speed. The object appeared at approximately eighty-five degrees overhead and was traveling northward. [REDACTED] lost sight of the object when the building obstructed his view. [REDACTED] stated that the object wavered in flight, climbed and descended slightly and was in sight for approximately two minutes. The object was in sight for approximately two minutes and was traveling north in a straight line

6. Mr. [REDACTED] of Ohio Street, Sidney, Ohio was interviewed on 18 May 1949 and he stated that he observed object at approximately 0830 hours on 6 May 1949, in front of Buckeye Restaurant, located at the corner of South Ohio and West Court Streets, Sidney, Ohio. The illumination of the object attracted STURM's attention. STURM was unable to determine the shape of the object due to its bright reflection, but appeared to be approximately five inches in diameter. The object was about a half mile west and traveling south at a great altitude. The object was in sight approximately two minutes, appeared to be traveling at a fast rate of speed and faded out in the sky. The object traveled in a straight line and was very brilliant against a clear, blue sky. The object did not make any sound or leave any trail. STURM did not see any projections on the object nor too bright and too far away. [REDACTED] the owner of the camera store at the above address but did not take any photographs of the object.

7. Mrs. [REDACTED] of [REDACTED] Street, Sidney, Ohio was interviewed on 18 May 1949 and she stated that she saw the object when [REDACTED] called her attention to it. The object appeared to be five inches in diameter, one inch in thickness and was probably larger due to the great distance. The object had a flat, circular shape. STURM stated that she lost sight of the object once but that it reappeared in the same position. The rest of STURM's statement corresponded to that of STURM.

8. Mr. [REDACTED] of [REDACTED], Sidney, Ohio stated that he saw the object but couldn't give any description other than that it was a round, bright, shiny object traveling south through space at a fast rate of speed.

AT HARRISON, OHIO

9. Mrs. [REDACTED] of [REDACTED], Ohio was interviewed on 18 May 1949 and she stated that at approximately 1830 hours, 4 May 1949, while she was working in the garden of her farm which is approximately three miles northeast of Fort Jefferson, Ohio and four and a half miles west of Harrison, Ohio, she was attracted by the sudden glare of an unidentified object. The object reflected very bright light when the sun hit it and it was whirling and traveling through space at a great rate of speed. The object appeared to be six inches diameter, a bright, silver color and had a flat round or flat oblong shape. Mrs. [REDACTED] sighted the object at a high altitude, traveling northeast. The object appeared to be between her farm and Fort Jefferson. The object was in sight for less than two minutes and disappeared by fading out in the sky. The object did not make any sound or leave any trail. The weather was clear, no wind was blowing and no planes were in the vicinity at the time the object was in sight. No photographs were taken of the object.
