NARRATIVE SUMMARY:

On 9 May 1949 at approximately 1430 hours, while reclining on the front lawn of my residence at [REDACTED], Tucson, Arizona, I had occasion to notice two objects in the air overhead, these objects came into view from a southwesterly direction traveling northeast. When approximately directly overhead, the objects banked to the left and went in an approximately a northwesterly direction, continuing in this direction for approximately one mile, and then banking abruptly to the right and headed northeast towards the Catalina mountains. They continued in this northeast direction, gradually fading from view until they finally disappeared from my sight.

The size of these objects, to my estimation, was approximately 25 feet in diameter with a thickness of approximately one foot and their size in relation to a known object as they appeared to me in the air was approximately the size of a wash tub. I would place their altitude at approximately 10,000 feet. There was no discernible variation in this altitude during the time they remained in my sight. The distance between these two objects which did not vary considerably was approximately 50 feet. When I first saw them, they were directly overhead and appeared perfectly round. When they banked to the left, and then to the right I was able to see both sides of them.

There was no apparent means of motivation, no vapor trail, exhaust and absolutely no sound. The surface appeared to be smooth and symmetrical. They did not appear to vary in thickness toward the center from the outer edge. The color appeared silvery and very shiny when reflecting the sun. This particular day was a very clear sunshine day. The objects seemed to be traveling between 750 and 1,000 miles an hour.

I have been associated with aircraft the major portion of my life, having spent the last eight years in actual duties connected with aircraft and presently am a flight engineer on flying status. I have observed all conventional types of aircraft, and jet fighter aircraft in the sky, and this object seemed to be considerably faster than I have ever seen any aircraft travel. My home is located in the residential section of Tucson in the NE portion of that city. Approximate distance from my home to the Catalina Mountains in a northeast direction is six miles. From the direction I first sighted the objects come from, they would have come over a more densely populated portion of the city of Tucson, but not necessarily over the business center. Upon initially sighting these objects in the air, I called to my wife to come out of the house, but she did not get

Objects were round and flat with diameter approximately 25 feet. Objects traveled at an excessive rate of speed (750 to 1000 miles per hr.). Investigation in and around Tucson did not result in finding witnesses or possible explanation of objects.</p>

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**DETAILS**

1. Date of sighting - 9 May 1949.
2. Time of sighting - Approximately 1430 hours.
3. Where sighted:
  - a. Ground
    - (1) Tucson, Arizona
    - (2) Approximately 3 miles from center of town
    - (3) From front yard
    - (4) Not applicable
4. Number of objects - Two objects maintaining distance of approximately 50 feet apart at all times during period of sighting.
5. Distance of objects from observer
  - a. Directly overhead
  - b. From directly overhead to approximately 60 degrees
  - c. Approximately 10,000 feet.
6. Time in sight - Between six and ten seconds.
7. Appearance of object
  - a. Silvery
  - b. Round and flat
  - c. Opaque
  - d. Size
    - (1) Approximately 25 feet in diameter
    - (2) Similar to wash tub
8. Direction of flight - Originally sighted coming from SW traveling NE
9. Tactics or maneuvers - Objects maintained approximately same altitude without variance, banked once to the north with abrupt left bank, traveled a mile in this direction, then banked abruptly to NE. They did not appear to be oscillating or fluttering.

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10. Evidence of exhaust - Absolutely no exhaust discernible.
11. Effect on clouds - Object did not come in contact with any clouds during sighting.
12. Lights - Object gave off reflected light especially in the process of banking.
13. Support - There was no visible support.
14. Propulsion - There was no visible means of propulsion.
15. Control and stability - No fins or stabilizers were apparent.
16. Air Ducts - No ducts or slots or openings were discernible.
17. Speed - Object traveled at a speed approximately 750 to 1000 miles per hour.
18. Sound - No sound heard.
19. Manner of disappearance - Objects faded from view.

6. Ability to determine color, speed and size of moving objects at a distance - Observer is able to determine color and based on his history is believed to be a fair judge of speed of moving objects and their size at a distance.
7. Reliability of observer
  - a. Sources
    - (1) A neighborhood check was accomplished in the vicinity of observer's home, but due to isolated location of his home, no neighbors were found who knew Putman. A thorough check was made.
    - (2) Name files of Police Department and Pima County Sheriff's Office, Tucson, Arizona revealed no record of observer.
    - (3) Local FBI revealed no record of Putman.
    - (4) The following persons were contacted at Observer's parent organization: Major DONALD F. FULTON, Executive Officer, who stated that he has had contact with observer and has flown with observer on many occasions since observer's assignment to his unit, he has always found observer to be

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reliable. 1st Sgt. [REDACTED] has had contact with observer since assignment to his unit and has always found him to be truthful and reliable. Lt. [REDACTED] was in the same unit with observer at Spokane, Washington. Lt. [REDACTED] is now moving into a duplex apartment next to observer. He has been assigned to the same flight crew with observer for the last three months and would trust him implicitly. He is inclined to believe the statements made by the observer due to his knowledge of the observer's character and veracity.

8. Notes relative to observer on

a. Sightings in general - Observer has never sighted any other objects similar to the above described.

b. How attention was drawn to objects - Due to the fact observer was laying on his back on his front lawn and was looking directly overhead when he saw them pass.

9. Witnesses - There were no other witnesses to the occurrence.

10. Comments - The observer, upon interview, appeared to be of good character, normal intelligence and with a fairly rounded education.



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To my cognizance, none of the neighbors in the vicinity of my house sighted the objects. However, I have made no inquiry of the neighbors. I did tell my nearby neighbor who were not home at the time, about this occurrence.

I reported this to my Squadron Security Officer on Tuesday, 10 May 1949. I have read various comments and articles concerning objects of this nature but never put much stock in the information.

These objects appeared opaque in nature. I can think of no possible explanation as to what these objects were nor what kept them in the air or how they could travel at such an excessive rate of speed. I was fully awake when I saw them and can vision them perfectly in my mind at this time.
