1. At 1330 a call was received from the Hanford Area (Concrete) that a Flying Saucer was over the East 200 area approximately 4 (four) miles east of the Hanford Atomic Plant, Washington. The operator at Hanford stated that the Disk was standing still and then took off in a south-easterly direction at a speed greater than that of a jet fighter. The available aircraft was called for by the Hanford operator and the aircraft was scrambled. The Hanford operator cleared the aircraft into their prohibited area (authorization coming from the Assistant Chief of the Security Section at Hanford). The scopes were instructed to search the southern sector with no results. Crew personnel and the controller searched the sky, visually, and noted a round, white or silver object traveling in a north easterly direction at a speed greater than that of jet fighters at approximately 10,000 to 15,000 feet. The base weather section was then contacted to see if any weather balloons were sent up and they reported in the negative. Base weather section stated that they do not utilize weather balloons. At 1420 an F-82, Gertrude 20, pilot Gardner was airborne and reported in to Torch controller. A target, number 81, was being tracked in the east-south-east sector by Torch at this time and the ADCC instructed the controller to intercept it in hopes that it might be a Disk. Target 81 faded in radar contact just after (approximately 5 minutes) Gertrude 20 was airborne. The controller was able to give two vectors before target 81 faded. Radar contact with the fighter was spotty, so poor that a coherent track on the fighter was impossible. At approximately 1425 Hanford reported falling bits of paper in their area (in the vicinity of the Rattlesnake Mountains). The Hanford operator described the papers as being approximately 6 inches square, red on one side and green on the other. The fighter was then sent to the vicinity of the Rattlesnake mountains to examine the area for the papers.

At 1426 the F-82 was cleared to Moses Lake Tower and landed at 1435.

2. It is believed that two separate and distinct alert conditions existed on the afternoon of 21 May 1949. The first was caused by the sightings of Flying Saucers (noted) by Hanford using a telescope and the operations crew of the 637th ADIC. The second was caused by the dropping of leaflets by an aircraft into the Hanford area. It is believed that there is no connection between the two events.

3. Teletype sequence of local weather and winds aloft reported at time of observation: 5000 feet scattered, visibility 20 miles, sea level pressure 15.6, temperature 69, dew point 29, wind SSW 10 knots per hour, altimeter setting 29.99. At 1600 a call was received from AF Int'l AFACW that a Virgin saucer was over the southwest portion of Hanford Nuclear Reservation east of the atomic plant, minimum altitude 10,000 feet. The aircraft was a jet and was still visible when head off at a low altitude. Direction of a broad center line west of a jet stream. AFACW advised that they were over the Hanford operator had no information and stated that he would contact the AFACW into their restricted area. A message was passed from the Assistant Chief of the Security Section AF Int'l. AFACW was instructed to search the southern sector with no results. NARRATIVE SUMMARY: At 1330 a call was received from the Hanford Area (Concrete) that a Flying Saucer was over the East 200 area approximately four miles east of the Hanford Atomic Plant, Washington; the operator at Hanford stated that the Disk was standing still and then took off in a southeasterly direction at a speed greater than that of a jet fighter. The available aircraft was called for by the Hanford operator and the aircraft was scrambled. The Hanford operator cleared the aircraft into their prohibited area (authorization coming from the Assistant Chief of the Security Section at Hanford). The scopes were instructed to search the southern sector with no results. Crew personnel and the controller searched the sky, visually, and noted a round, white or silver object traveling in a northeasterly direction at a speed greater than that of a jet fighter at approximately 10,000 to 15,000 feet. The base weather section was then contacted to see if any weather balloons were sent up and they reported in the negative. Base weather section stated that they do not utilize weather balloons. At 1420 an F-82, Gertrude 20, pilot Gardner was airborne and reported in to Torch controller. A target, number 81, was being tracked in the east-southeast sector by Torch at this time and the ADCC instructed the controller to intercept it in hopes that it might be a Disk. Target 81 faded in radar contact just after (approximately 5 minutes) Gertrude 20 was airborne. The controller was able to give two vectors before target 81 faded. Radar contact with the fighter was spotty, so poor that a coherent track on the fighter was impossible. At approximately 1425 Hanford reported falling bits of paper in their area (in the vicinity of Rattlesnake Mountains). The Hanford operator described the papers as being approximately 6 inches square, red on one side and green on the other. The fighter was then sent to the vicinity of the Rattlesnake mountains to examine the area for the papers, and also to search the Hanford area for other evidences of the Flying Saucers. The search continued, with spotty radar coverage, with no results. The Hanford operator again cleared the F-82 into the prohibited area and indicated that he, himself, was taking off in an airplane to search. He stated further that a weapons carrier had been dispatched to the pamphlet (paper) drop area and no papers had been found. The fighter was vectored to the Columbia river gorge to lessen the time to be flown in the prohibited area. At approximately 1525 a call was received from the Hanford operator that the papers dropped were advertisements for a Rodeo at Richland. The Rodeo is an Air Rodeo. The Hanford operator indicated that the pamphlets did fall into the prohibited area and were dropped by one of the aircraft participating in the Air Rodeo. The aircraft that was dropping the pamphlets was a PT-19 flown by Don Wise of the Atomic Speedway in Pasco, Washington. This pilot holds a commercial ticket. The aircraft NC number is (NC 46258). At 1426 the F-82 was cleared to Moses Lake Tower and la-

The second was caused by the dropping of leaflets by an aircraft into the Hanford area. It is believed that there is no connection between the two events.

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
