SYNOPSIS

Investigation requested by District Commander, 16th District OSI, Hill AF Base, Ogden, Utah.

Stated that he observed five (5) lights in vee formation; estimated altitude one thousand feet; five miles South of Elko, Nevada; lights moving West at high rate of speed. No outline discernible; could not establish whether one object or five (5) objects. No other witnesses.

DETAILS:

1. This investigation was requested by District Commander, 16th District OSI (IG), USAF, Hill Air Force base, Ogden, Utah, and was predicated upon a report that Mr. Communications Chief, Elko Airport, Nevada, had observed five (5) wee shaped objects flying in the vicinity of Elko, Nevada.

AT ELKO. NEVADA

2. Investigation conducted at Civil Aeronautics Administration,
U. S. Department of Commerce, Elko, Nevada, on 7 June 1949, revealed that
Mr. HENRICH is not employed at the Elko Airport, but is a Yard Clerk for
the Western Pacific Railroad Company, Elko, Nevada. Mr. YALE D. HASKINS,
Aircraft Communicator, CAA, stated he had received the report from
by telephone and produced a file copy of the message which he (HASKINS)
forwarded to Salt Lake (Exhibit A) and which read as follows:

Report from Western Pacific Ofc.

Mr. Frank Yard Clerk reports sighting a series of five objects in V-shaped formation at about 1,000 feet traveling west bound at a high rate of speed. No sound accompanied them. Sighted over Elko. Time of sighting 0200P. He advd could have been large plane with swept wings or five objects. Objects were lighted.

The copy of the message on file at the CAA Office bears a time stamp indicating it was sent at 0245 PST on 29 May 1949. HASKINS stated he was not sure of the exact time he received the telephonic report from HENRICH, but it had been between 0200 hours and 0230 hours on 29 May 1949.

- 3. Review of the communication files maintained at the Civil Aeronautics Administration, Elko, Nevada, revealed that the following aircraft were in the vicinity of Elko, Nevada at times indicated on 29 May 1949:
 - a. NC 59484 enroute to Sinclair, Wyoming. Over Elkc at 0222 PST.
 Altitude 15000 feet.
 - b. NC 79975 enroute to New Jersey. Over Elko at 0243 FST.
 Altitude 13000 feet.

Aircraft personnel did not report any unusual aircraft or activity in the vicinity.

DETAILS: (cont'd)

4. Review of the files maintained at the Meather Bureau, U. S. Department of Commerce, Elko, Nevada: Latitude 40°50'N; Longitude 115° 47'W revealed the following information relative to weather conditions on 29 May 1949:

- a. C132 PST; broken clouds at 7000 feet; visibility 15 miles; wind west at 3 miles per hour; temperature 52°F; Dewpoint 42°F.
- b. 0207 PST; broken clouds at 7000 feet; visibility 15 miles; wind southwest at 8 miles per hour.
- c. 0230 PST; broken clouds at 7000 feet; visibility 15 miles; wind southwest at 8 miles per hour; temperature 47°F; Dewpoint 41°F; occasional lightning West of Elko.
- d. 0306 PST; scattered clouds at 7000 feet; visibility 30 miles; wind southwest at 11 miles per hour; occasional lightning West of Elko.

5. On 8 June 1949, Mr. A. Railroad Company, Elko, Nevada, was interviewed at his home, Elko, Nevada, and the following statement (Exhibit B) was obtained:

At approximately two A.M. on the morning of May 29, 1949, while attending to routine duties in the freight yard of the Western Pacific Railroad Company in Elko, I noticed five amber colored lights approximately five miles distant and at an altitude of 1000 feet. The lights were in a vee formation about 150 feet apart and heading West at a speed of over 500 miles per hour. I could hear no sound and there were no visible signs of exhaust. The lights were steady, giving the appearance of being seen through a window, rather than that of a ray or beam. When they disappeared it was as if an obstruction or projection on an aircraft had come into my line of vision.

I do not know how long the lights were within my sight or the distance they covered during that period. I could not distinguish any outline around them and do not know whether they came from one very large aircraft or five smaller ones flying in formation.

The only portion of statement made with assurance was that he had seen five (5) lights travelling West in vee-formation and had heard no sound.

The balance of the statement was indefinite and arrived at after many variations. Could give no logical basis for his assumption of height, distance, spacing or speed.
