1. This activity has received a report of the sighting of a flying disk in the vicinity of Monroe, Michigan on 21 June, 1949.
2. The report was made by Mr. [REDACTED], Monroe, Michigan, who states, "At 9:24 (a.m.), June 21, 1949, directly over Monroe, Michigan, among several Naval aircraft, a flying disk-like top, with heavy center section - traveled south-west - disappearing within two seconds - it was travelling about half a mile high. A newspaper item was printed by reporters who saw it too. It may have been a new type ram jet machine - as vapor disturbance could be seen whorling from the outer edge as it traveled along".
3. On 23 June, a similar report was received by phone from Mr. Almon Jones, reporter on the Monroe Evening News.
