## Gentlemen:

On Oct 27, about 12:30 o'clock P.M. I was in my yard wien I happened to look up and saw something in the sky coming from the North. There were two of them-each one of them ras two oval shaped objects. The ovals were fastened together with a fastener that seemed to be flexible. They were high and going fast. They shined brightly like new aluminum would in the sunlight. The fastener shined like the oval objects. I could see the fastener sag between the ovals when they changed position. They would fly. Cne oval over the other one a few seconcs with the fastener in a vertical position between the ovils. Then they would chance again. The fastener would be in a horozontal position. The ovals appeared to be about one foot in size to me. The fastener seemed to be about one inch wide.

I could see them plainly as it was clear and bright in the north, east, and south that day.

They mada no sound. I had been looking at them a minute or two When one of them seemed to jar or jerk then it vanished; the other one went on south. In a minute, or a half minute something resembling pieces of ashes came down. It vas drifting lightly in the wind. it seemed to be lighter in weight then alshes from the way it floated in the wind. It was a whitesh color. It was coming from the north towards the south; some of the pieces were half as large as a feather. Most of them were much smaller. I saw one piece six or seven inches long. I started to get the large piece. It was about ten feet high; it looked like it would come on down in a minute. I was following the large piece intending to get it when it came down. I happened to look towards my barn which was north of where I was standing. The e was something like spider web coming down. It was coming down from the north. They mere coming down fast and think they were catching on the leaves of the trees. Uneopin Places were thick with them. There were millions of them, the air seened to be full of them. Single strands shining in the sunlicht. They had a Golden tint. There were some pieces that seemed to be large pleces of spider webb that had tangled together. Some of the pleces had a long tail of single strands with heavy pieces at one end. Theheavy end rould lift the piece up, and let it down. It seemed to be controling it.

The large pieces were gray-white, like common spider web. They seemed to be much lichter in weight from the way they floated in the wind. Some of the pieces mere fairly large to stay up like they did.

In about ten min tes I saw another oval coming from the east. It nas a single oval. It mas only an oval shaped object. It mas going
faster than the ovals I had seen fastened together. It seemed about a foot in size. It would turn the end in the direction it was going. In 3 or 4 seconds the side would turn in that direction. It did not turn all the may around. It just seemed to swing half way around. It had passed overhead. I saw it jar, seemed like it stopped. I thought it was going to chance its course, but it did not. A small bright something shot from the oval. It went southeast. It went ruch faster than the oval. It was about the size of a large star. It was bright like a star. It was not large enough for me to see the shape it was.

I looked from the star-like object back to where the oval was. It had vanished. I did not see it again.

In a minute the stuff like ashes was drifting among the trees. It seemed to be coming down. I did not see a piece come to the grounc. I thought it was lancing on the leaves. Then the something like spicer web came down when it came down in the open I could see it go to the ground; in the trees it caught on the leaves and shined. I could see it hanging in the trees.

Then I looked up again there was another one of the ovals; it was going in a southwest direction. I did not see what direction it came from. It was overhead when I saw it. I watched it. It too woul: oring half way around and then back. I saw it jar and jerk like the cther one did. Then the star-like object shot from the oval. It rent in a southenst direction; very fast. It wis some distarce from the large oval. Bright things no larger than single strands of spider re: came from each sice of the large oval. They cane from the oval in a curve. They were so bright and so many of them it hurt my eyes to locs at them. There seemed to be millions coming fron the ovnl. They shirs like spicer web in sunlight. In a minute or less the ashes, or what looked like flakes of ashes, were coming dom. They were like the otie: pieces I had seen. Then the spider web stuff came down. It looked lise Xmas decoration on the trees where it came down in the open. I coiil $\dot{c} s t$ see it after it got to the ground. It seened like it covered ever-jn: as far as I could see there wis as much shining web as there would be rain in a big rain. All the aftemoon the single ovals went over. I would see one every ten or fifteen minutes. They were single ovals. I did not see any more fastened together. They came from the east an. north.

While I was watching it a pline was coming from the west. phat the plane was not very far from the oval, I saw the oval jar or jeris the star-like object shot fron the oval; it went west. I looked at $\quad 3$ plane to see if it would change course or speed as it was not very $2 \times / 4$ the oval. I hoped the pilot would see the oval, but the plane did ac change speed. I looked back to where the oval was but did not see it
again; it had vanished.
At $3 o^{\prime}$ clock I looked up again. There were two of the ovalo alnost overhead. Fach one of then had a tail not anything like a plane, just a shining something that looked to be about one inch vide to me. It was flexible. I could see it plainly. The ovals were going over each other, then around each other; then one of them would go under the other one as they noved I could plainly see that each one of them had a tail. I watched them maybe 3 minutes, while I whtched, I decided they were trying to get in position to hitch to ether. If those tails had been fastened together thet would be exactly like the first ones I saw coming from the North. I did not vatch to see wisch way they went. I had to meet the school bus. We got one small piece of the web. It seens to be nothing but comon spider web. I an sending it vith the lebter. Next morning the webs were gone from the trees. It wis just like nothing had happened.

I told my daughter to listen at school to find out if my one else saw the oval.s. She said there vas no talk of anyone seeing anything.

So far a3 I know ry du ginter and I were the only ones that sav them. On Nov Ist about I o'clock, I locked up and sav another one of the ovals. It was going south. A fen flakes of the aanes stupf and spider web came drifting dom from the north. It seemed like I could taste a bitter taste in my mouth, the bitter taste seemed to go on dom in ry throat. I could not get rid off tha bitter in my mouth and that for 2 dayz.

On Oct 27th when I sam the ovals, I tasted that bitter taste in 1 yy mouth. That day I thought perhaps I iragined the bitter tasta, because I was scared. The ovals, ashes and webs frightened me.

But arter I sar that one on Nov lst, and tasted the bitter taste agin, I kner I had not inagined it. I live in northeast Mississippi about 25 miles northeast of Tupelo, $2 i s s$. If it will not be a lot of bother, would you let ne know if there were anr rocketa or anthing like that streaking orer northeast, iliss. chat diz. I Ja3 scarec when I sar all I sar that afternoon, and please don't turn this over to the papers. I do not wish to lead another flying saucer sare.

SUMMARY OF INPORMATION
On 28 October 1949, TH: KNOVILI: NES-S NTIEL carried an article vhich stated that a Irs. Vinnie Iytle, Old laryville Fike, Knoxville, Tennessee, cenorted that about 1530 hours on 27 october 1949 , she sighted two (2) bright looking obj cts flying high and fast over her home. The nevispaper quoted Nrs. Lytle as saying that the objects were tube shaped, noisless and about a yard in length, and that they looked like airplanes when the sun shined on them.

On 28 October 1949, I'rs. Minnie Lytle, Housewife, Old Maryville pike, toute \#3, Knoxville, Cennessee, was interviewed and stated that while standing in her back yard at approxinately 1530 hours, 27 October 1949 , she sighted two (2) objects which were flying toward the South ( 180 degrees) at approxi ately the same altitude and speed as commercial type nircraft. She said that she sighted the first object by coincidence while looking up at the sky. When she first sighted the object it was directly overhead, and was flying in a level flight. She said that the object was shaped like a straight tube, and that no openings either in the side or reir were visible. There vias no evidence of vapor trails or exhaust, nor was there any sound from the object. The Thformant saic that she kept this objoct in sight for approximately one (1) minute before it disappeared from her vision at approxi ately a forty-five (45) degree angle. Xrs. Iytle continued by saying that irsediately after the first object disappeared, she again looked overhead and si hted another object which vas identical to the first one in shape and size, and that it vas flying at the same altitude, in the same direction and at the same rate of speed as the first object. This object was also kept in sight for approximately one (1) minute before it disappeared. The Informant stated that from the reflection of the sun on these two objects, they apseared to be constructed of metal similar to thet used in airplanes. She said that the sky at the time vas void of clouds. Lirs. Iytle further stated that she was alone et the tine the objects were sighted. (B-2)

AGZNTS NOTES: Mrs. Lytle is approyimately fifty-five (55) years of age, and of at least average intelligence. all her answeres vere made without hesitation.

An attempt to report the above incident to Headquarters by telephone met with negative results since the information was not obtained until about 1715, on 28 October 1949, and no personnel were in the office at that time.

On 29 October 1949, Officials of the United States Weather Bureau, McGeeTyson Airport, Knowville, Tennessee, were contacted and stated that weather ballons were released by that Bureau on 27 October 1949, at 0405, 1000, 1602 and 2203; but that no other meteorological instruments were released. They said that the ballons were approximately thirty (30) inches in diameter, and that the color of the first ballon was red, the second was orange, the third was yellow and fourth was orange. The officials furnished the folloving information relative to winds aloft on 27 October 1949:

If it will not be a lot of bother, would you let me know if there were any rockets or anything like thit streaking over northeast liss. that day. I was scared when I saw all I saw thit afternoon, and please don't turn this over to the papers. I do not wish to lead another flying saucer scare.
