This investigation is submitted in compliance with AFCISI Letter No. 85, dated 12 August 1949, to report all sightings of unidentified flying objects. Mr. [REDACTED], JR, Special Agent, Office of Special Investigations, Holloman AFB, New Mexico, observed an unusual aerial phenomenon at 2230 hours, 6 January 1950, and reported all pertinent information regarding the sighting.

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DETAILS:

1. This investigation predicated upon a directive, AFCSI letter No. 85, dated 12 August 1949, to report all sightings of unidentified flying objects.

AT ALAMOGORDO, NEW MEXICO

2. Mr. [REDACTED], Special Agent, Office of Special Investigations, observed an unusual Aerial Phenomenon on 6 January 1950 at 2230 hours, and the following information is submitted:

- a. Date of sighting: 6 January 1950
 - b. Time of sighting: 2230 hours
 - c. Where sighted: 1607 Hawaii Ave., Alamogordo, New Mexico
105° 58' West Latitude
32° 55' North Longitude
Azimuth: Approximately 175°
 - d. Number of objects: One
 - e. Observable celestial phenomena or planets that may account for the sighting: None
 - f. Distance of object from observer:
 - (1) Laterally or horizontally: Undeterminable (due to unknown size of object).
 - (2) Angle of elevation from horizon: Approx. 15°.
 - (3) Altitude: Undeterminable. (Due to unknown size of object).
 - g. Time in sight: Was observed for a period of 45 minutes, at the end of which time it was still in sight.
 - h. Appearance of object:
 - (1) Color: Predominately white-bright, comparable to Venus. Changed erratically to green and red.
 - (2) Shape: Star-like shape. Unable to determine specific shape.
 - (3) Apparent construction: Unable to determine.
 - (4) Size: Slightly larger than the planet Venus.
 - i. Direction of flight: Generally, East to West; however, object moved erratically up, down, to the right, and to the left, in its general path from East to West.
 - j. Tactics or maneuvers: Object traversed a predominately level path from East to West. Changes in altitude were comparatively minute and erratic.
 - k. Evidence of exhaust: None

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1. Effect on clouds: Extremely clear moonlight night, no clouds in sight.
- m. Lights: Object itself was a light.
- n. Support: None visible.
- o. Propulsion: Unable to determine.
- p. Control and stability: Apparently poor, trajectory was very erratic.
- q. Air ducts: Unable to determine.
- r. Speed: Object moved approximately 15° to 20° from East to West during the 45 minutes it was under observation.
- s. Sound: None
- t. Manner of disappearance: Observer did not see object disappear.
- u. Notes relative to observer:

3. This agent contacted the Base Weather Station, Holloman Air Force Base, in an attempt to get a "fix" on the object with a theodolite. However, due to an obstruction between the fixed theodolite

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and the object no data was obtained. A Q-13 type radar set was used in an attempt to pick up the object on radar. This attempt met with negative results. Checks were made with the Operations and Projects Division, Holloman AFB, and the Research Section of White Sands Proving Ground and it was determined that there have been no testing devices sent aloft in this vicinity which could account for this sighting.
