b. At 0805C on 18 March 1950 a flying object was observed over Bradford, Illinois, by the pilot of aircraft N505B. The name, address, and occupation of the witness are unknown, but the aircraft owner is reported to be [REDACTED] of the Hubinger Company, [REDACTED], Keokuk, Iowa.

The pilot reported the sighting through the Burlington (Iowa) radio and the information was relayed to the Wright-Patterson Flight Service Center at 0833C, 18 March 1950, through the Chicago Air Route Traffic Control Center.

No photographs or sketches of the object were received by the Wright-Patterson Flight Service Center, but the pilot declared the object to be shaped like a saucer. The object's speed was estimated at 200 miles per hour and it was headed southeast. The pilot stated that the object appeared to be at an altitude of 8,000 feet. No information could be obtained regarding the size, color, maneuverability, sound, or exhaust trails of the flying object.

Comment of Wright-Patterson Flight Service Center: The weather at Bradford, Illinois, as of 0730C, 18 March 1950, was: Estimated 25,000 feet broken clouds, 12,000 feet scattered clouds, 12 miles visibility.
