Considered as insufficient data since additional personnel in tower and A/C in area did not report these objects.

Report contains information on five alleged sightings of unidentified flying objects submitted by various MATS units. The sightings were all in the US and occurred during the period 29 March and 17 April 1950.

The following sightings of unidentified aerial objects have been received from sources as indicated:

1. The 1922nd AACS Squadron, Maxwell AF Base, Alabama, reports that Sergeant Turner, a TAF control tower operator at the field, at 2130 hours GST on 29 March, 1950 saw an object flying over runway 36 on a heading of approximately 355 degrees. This object at first appeared to be a formation of five aircraft flying in a "V" formation; later it appeared to be a flying wing. The object was flying very slowly and at times appeared to be hanging in one spot. Sgt Turner stated that during this time she made two or three transmissions to aircraft contacting Maxwell tower, but kept noticing the unidentified object between transmissions. She told one of the other operators on duty with her to get a pair of binoculars, but when he went outside the object had disappeared and they thought it had flown straight up. The object appeared to have 10 to 12 large red lights.
