Unconventional aerial sightings observed at Sheppard Air Force Base, Wichita Falls, Texas during evening of 4 May 1951.

Sightings consisted of unidentified round objects traveling in a Southeast to Northwest direction at unknown altitude and speed. Observed sightings emitted a soft, steady fluorescent glow. Observations made for approximately 30 to 45 seconds.

The preparing officer interviewed Staff Sergeant [REDACTED], AF [REDACTED] 3770th Instructor Squadron, Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, and Sergeant [REDACTED], AF [REDACTED] 3770th Instructor Squadron, Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, on 10 May 1951. The following information was received:

Subject Airmen state that, at approximately 2100 hours, 4 May 1951, they were returning to their squadron base from Weather #1. They observed a formation of ten to fifteen remote objects moving in a Southeast to Northwest direction at an altitude, latitude and speed. Objects were believed to be solid with a reflected light resembling a soft, fluorescent glow. Observed directions were on a definitely set course, all traveling in the same direction, but moving independently within a formation. Objects seemed to repel one another in much the same fashion as electrons. No sounds were heard for sighting. Objects were first seen directly overhead and were observed for a period of approximately 10 seconds. No specific anomalies were noted and date to best of knowledge no other information can be obtained. Subject stated that he had no knowledge of any other information concerning this phenomenon.

Interview of preparing officer:

1. What information do you have concerning the objects? It is possible that the objects are man-made or natural phenomena. I am not able to say at this time. The objects were seen in a formation and it is believed that they are man-made.

2. When did you see the objects? At approximately 2100 hours, 4 May 1951, I was returning to my unit after a night shift.

3. Who saw the objects? I, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] saw the objects. Both of us are members of the 3770th Instructor Squadron.

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The preparing officer interviewed Sergeant [REDACTED], AF [REDACTED], 3770th Instructor Squadron, Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, and Sergeant [REDACTED], AF [REDACTED], Instructor Squadron, Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas on 12 May 1951. The following information was received:

Subject Airmen had accompanied S/Sgt. [REDACTED] to Theater #1, Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, on the night of 4 May 1951, at approximately 2100 hours, and the Airmen observed a group of circular objects in a rough formation approaching from a Southeasterly direction at an altitude of 10,000 feet and speed. Subject Airmen described the number of objects as being "more than nine." Objects were described as moving in and out in an independent manner, but remaining in close proximity. Objects exhibited a steady, white low-wattage incandescent illumination. No vapor trails were observed. [REDACTED] was heard. Subject Airmen stated that objects moved in a circular orbit or uniform circle and kept on a steady, straight course, and it was impossible to determine the direction of motion. The objects were described as being spherical, metallic, and solid. [REDACTED]
