The light would seem to fade and then recur at intervals of approximately 10 to 15 seconds. The light seemed to be a pale yellow color when observed against the glare of the steel mills in the west.

I first observed the light at approximately 0110 CST and estimate that it was visible for approximately seven minutes. I reported my observation to Pace Operations, 2587th AFMCC at the Birmingham Municipal Airport at approximately 0130 CST.

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

At approximately 2325 CST, 11 August 1951, Mr. [REDACTED], [REDACTED] Birmingham, Alabama telephoned Base Operations, 2587th AFRTC, Birmingham Municipal Airport, Birmingham, Alabama and reported unconventional type aircraft which he described as 18 to 20 feet in diameter, trailing twin exhausts of orange-red flame, making passes over TCI Plant, Fairfield, Alabama. Base Operations alerted 3903d Radar Bomb Scoring Squadron, Birmingham Municipal Airport, who tracked for reported unconventional aircraft on radar equipment AN/MSQ-2 with negative results. Birmingham Control Tower was alerted and contacted Delta inbound flight 126K (cargo flight) who reported seeing bright streak of light 35 miles southwest of Birmingham.

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

SUBJECT: Weather Conditions at time of reported unidentified "flying objects".

1. At 2300 hours, Central Standard Time, on 11 August 1951 to 0430 hours, Central Standard Time, the local sky condition in Birmingham, Alabama was clear (ie. no clouds), wind was calm and surface visibility was 4-5 miles with ground fog and smoke.

2. Information supplied by Mister W.E. Glenn, Professor of Astronomy, Birmingham Southern College stated that on the night of 11th and 12th August 1951 respectively, a shower of meteorites were visible to the naked eye from 2300 hours, to 0300 hours Central Standard Time, and Mister W.E. Glenn further stated that time time of the year meteorites are very numerous.

3. Miss , of Birmingham Southern College also stated that she personally saw three (3) unidentified flying objects about 2400 hours Central Standard Time, 12 August 1951, and assumed them to be "shooting stars".

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## 1. Unconventional Aircraft Report

- a. Description: 18 to 20 feet in diameter, circular, building up to conical shape in center, trailing twin exhausts of orange-reddish flame; speed 300 to 1000 miles per hour; made repeated passes over Tennessee Coal, Iron & RR Company, approximately 16 to 18 times, traveling from northeast to southwest with a time interval between passes of 1½ to 2½ minutes.
- b. First observed at 2310 Central Standard Time, 11 August 1951 and the object was last reported at 0117 Central Standard Time 12 August 1951.
- c. Unconventional aircraft was observed visually from the surface by Mr. [REDACTED], Birmingham, Alabama (Fairfield sub-division). The unconventional aircraft was also observed by Miss [REDACTED], Birmingham, Alabama. Altitude of object was estimated 3000 to 5000 feet and travelled at a speed of from 800 to 1000 miles per hour. 3903d Radar Bomb Group, Detachment 20, Birmingham Municipal Airport, Birmingham, Alabama was alerted and tracked for reported unconventional aircraft on radar equipment AN/MSQ-2 type with negative results.
- d. The unconventional aircraft was observed from a geographical location of 36 degrees 56 minutes west; 33 degrees 27 minutes north, in Fairfield sub-division of Birmingham. Object made repeated passes over Tennessee Coal, Iron & RR Company Plant from northeast to southwest, at an altitude of 3000 feet to 5000 feet.
- e. Due to the temperament of Mr. [REDACTED], see inclosure #1, and lack of experience of Miss [REDACTED], see inclosure #2, it is felt that little reliability can be placed in the descriptions given in their statements.
- f. Teletype sequence for Birmingham 11 August 1951 2330CST: Clear 4 miles in smoke, pressure 176 millibars, temperature 73/dew point 72 wind southwest 2 miles per hour, altimeter 007.
- g. Mr. [REDACTED] Professor of Astronomy, Birmingham Southern College, states that on the nights of the 11th and 12th a shower of meteors were visible to the naked eye from 2300 Central Standard Time until 0300 Central Standard Time.
- h. There exists no physical evidence to substantiate sightings.
- i. The Air Defense Command, Knoxville, Tennessee dispatched an F-82 Aircraft number 6411, Pilot Captain R. W. Wilson, at 0053 Central Standard Time 12 August 1951 and a search of the Birmingham area was made. This search met with negative results and the aircraft returned to Knoxville at 0345 Central Standard Time 12 August 1951.
- j. Birmingham Control Tower was alerted by Base Operations at the time of sighting. Birmingham Control Tower made contact with inbound Delta Flight 124X (Cargo Flight) who reported seeing a bright streak of light 35 miles southwest of Birmingham. Upon departure from Birmingham to Meridian, Mississippi, Flight 124X reported five 5 minutes apart streaks which appeared to be twin streaks of light at a very high altitude descending at a 45 degree angle and traveling at a very high rate of speed from east to west. The time was 0033 Central Standard Time 12 August 1951. Captain [REDACTED], Delta Airlines, Municipal Airport, Atlanta, Georgia was in command of the flight.

At 0120 EST, 12 August 1961, Captain Stenger of Military Flight Service Center, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama advised this unit that numerous citizens of Birmingham, Alabama were reporting an unidentified object at 5,000 feet, speed 300 MPH, flying north over the city. He also advised that a pilot of Delta Air Lines flight 126 saw the object.</p> <p>b. Upon relaying this information to 30th Air Division (Ref ID: ), AFISG, the duty controller thereof, advised the duty controller at this organization to order one (1) F-82 type aircraft from this station to investigate the Birmingham incident.</p> <p>c. Captain Ralph J. Alison, Detachment 1, 52nd A/F Fighter Wing, pilot of the F-82 to Birmingham and reported no visual or radar confirmation.</p> <p>d. Captain George L. f. Findings and Observations: There are several rotating airway beacons near Birmingham and, what with the smoke reported in the area, it seems very probable that the reflections of one or more of these beacons against the low lying smoke may have been what was observed. It is considered nearly impossible for anyone to have estimated either the speed or the altitude of a flying object in such a determinedly positive manner as reported on this particularly hazy night in Birmingham. The reoccurrence element, as reported by [REDACTED] would strongly indicate a rotating beacon and not cloud and/or haze cover.
