(a) A brief description of the object. Radar blip identical to that of aircraft only larger. Oblong in shape. No tail ever observed in a turn, appeared as new plot on several occasions.

(b) Time. 181035Z to 181131Z and continuing in other areas to north as late as 181335Z.

(c) Manner of observation. Electronic speed estimated at 6000 ft. although it varied greatly. Altitude could not be estimated because of great speed. Electronic equipment used is that at P-31 (Elkhorn) and P-34 (Empire).

(d) Location of observer. Observers at P-31 and P-34. Object first plotted approximately 50 miles east Milwaukee. Eleven minutes later at 50 miles east Selfridge, then to 20 miles south Milwaukee to 60 miles northwest Selfridge to 80 miles southeast Sault Ste Marie to 20 miles east Bay City to 20 miles southeast Selfridge to 60 miles south Calumet, Michigan to 40 miles northeast Oscoda to 10 miles northeast Port Huron to 30 miles southeast Sault Ste Marie to 60 miles northeast Port Huron to 65 miles south of Calumet to 85 miles northwest of Milwaukee to 100 miles northeast Sault Ste Marie to 10 miles north of Bay City.

(e) Identifying information on observers. Experienced operations personnel at both locations observed blips.

(f) Weather and wind conditions. Milwaukee weather sequence 181000Z follows: 02GFK 162/49/48 northwest at 1/999. Generally heavy ground fog over entire area which progressed north and east during period.

(g) Any activity or condition, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting. Ground fog with high moisture content. Yerkes Observatory, Geneva, Wis. reports observations not made during night of 17-18 September 1951 due to ground fog layer 200 ft. thick. Have no knowledge of sun spot activity for period but report Aurora has occurred within last several days. No known meteoric showers occurred. Observatory at Ann Arbor, Michigan had no observers on duty at time of period in question. Report no knowledge of sun spot activity Aurora or meteoric showers in past several days.

(h) Existence of any physical evidence. Negative.

(i) Interception or identification action taken. 2 F-86 from Oscoda scramble at 181035Z - negative results.

(j) Local aircraft airborne at the time of sighting. Not believed applicable due to range of target and speed concerned.


Additional information: Adjoining eastern station at P-21 (Ft. Niagara) reports no similar targets. P-69 (Finland, Minn.) picked up similar target at approximately 181310Z which faded after being plotted on varying headings and over widely dispersed area.

Conclusion: Ducting due to heavy ground fog believed a possibility. Same type of phenomena has occurred in less violent form in area previously under like weather condition.

EXTRACT FROM STATUS REPORT # 1

DESCRIPTION OF INCIDENT: Great Lakes Region Air Defense Command radar stations tracked fast moving objects across Michigan and Wisc.
