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1. An unconventional unidentified aerial object was observed by [REDACTED], Chief Aircraft Communicator, CAA, Hulmen Municipal Airport, Terre Haute, Indiana. Observation was made on 9 October 1951 at 1342 CST for approximately 15 seconds.

2. The following descriptions were obtained in an interview with Mr. Sonner and OSI agent, 12th District Office OSI, Chanute AFB, Illinois: Single object was round and the size of a half dollar piece held at a distance of arms length, silver colored with no vapor or exhaust trail and no sound. Propulsion system unknown, speed estimated up to 2800 MPH.

3. Object was sighted visually from the ground and observed to travel a straight path in a north-easterly direction. Electronic surveillance device (EPO-13 located at Rockville, Ind) was used but no sighting was reported.

4. Weather: CAVU with bright sunny winds at Chanute AFB on 9 October; surface 270° at 3 knots; 1000 feet to 10,000 feet average direction 315° wind at 9 knots average. No physical evidence available. No interceptions made.

5. [REDACTED] a pilot, sighted a similar object on the same date at 1355 CST just east of Paris, Illinois, at 5000 feet. Object was last seen travelling in a north-easterly direction south of atomic energy plant at Newport, Indiana.

6. Although accurate measurement of the distance between sighting number one by Mr. [REDACTED] and sighting number two by [REDACTED] is not possible from the information furnished, it appears as though the object could not have been travelling more than 600 MPH (30 miles from Hulmen Airport to Newport) if the two sightings were of the same object.

On 9 October 1951, at approximately 1245 CST, a private pilot en route from Greencastle, Indiana, to Paris, Illinois, sighted a silver object just east of Paris, Illinois, at 5,000 ft. altitude. More details of the incident will be obtained. Weather balloons are launched from Chanute AFB which is approximately 45 miles NW of the location of the incident. It is very doubtful if this object was a balloon as the balloon would have risen to a much higher altitude if it had drifted SE from Chanute AFB.

TWO SIGHTINGS BY A PROMINENT SCIENTIST IN
CHARGE OF HIGH-ALTITUDE COSMIC RAY RESEARCH

October 10, 1951 -- Two observers

"We had just spotted our trajectory flight and were approaching (in a small plane) from the north at an altitude of 4,000 feet. We started to climb towards the balloon on a course of 230 deg. At 6,000 feet I noticed a strange object crossing the skies from the east to west, a great deal higher and behind our balloon. I estimate that our balloon was at approximately 20,000 feet at the time.

Using our balloon for comparison, this object appeared to be about $1\frac{1}{4}$ the size of the balloon. We were climbing and about six miles northeast of the balloon. The object had a peculiar glow to it, crossing behind and above our balloon from east to west very rapidly, first coming in at a slight dive, leveling off for about a minute and slowing down, then into a sharp left turn and climb at an angle of 50 to 60 degrees into the southeast with a terrific acceleration and disappeared.

J.D. and I observed this object for approximately two minutes and it crossed through an arc of approximately 40 to 45 degrees. We saw no vapor trail and from past experience I know that this object was not a balloon, jet, conventional aircraft or celestial star." J.J.K.

October 11, 1951 -- Four witnesses

"D. R. and I were flying at 10,000 feet observing the grab bag balloon when I saw a brightly glowing object to the southeast of the University of M. Airport. I pointed it out to D and we both made the following observations:

1. SYNOPSIS: Chief Aircraft Communicator, CAA, [REDACTED] Municipal Airport, Terre Haute, Indiana, reported to the Office of Special Investigations agent that on 9 October 1951 at 1342 hours he observed an unknown unidentified aerial object directly overhead at Hulman Municipal Airport. The object was approximately the size of a half-dollar coin held at arm's length and was flying in a southeasterly direction. The day was clear and informant's vision was unobstructed. Exact size and altitude of the object unknown. Informant advised that a pilot, one [REDACTED], sighted a similar object on the same date at approximately 1345 hours just east of Paris, Illinois at approximately 5,000 feet. Object was last seen traveling in a northeasterly direction, south of the Atomic Energy Plant at Newport, Indiana.

2. DETAILS: Mr. [REDACTED] [REDACTED] Street, Terre Haute, Indiana, Chief Aircraft Communicator, Civil Aero-nautics Authority, Hulman Municipal Airport, Terre Haute, Indiana, was interviewed on 12 October 1951 by Special Agent Elbert W. Farris, and stated that he had observed an unknown unidentified aerial object at 1342 hours, Tuesday, 9 October 1951. The object was sighted directly overhead at Hulman Municipal Airport which is located approximately five (5) miles east of Terre Haute, Indiana, on Indiana State Road No. 42. According to Mr. [REDACTED] the object was approximately the size of a one-half dollar held at arms length; was silver in color and flew in a southeasterly direction. Mr. [REDACTED] stated that the object pursued a straight path of flight; that he

observed no vapor trails; heard no noise and observed no protruding fins or other protrusions on this aerial object. Mr. [REDACTED] stated he observed the object pass from directly over his head to the horizon in approximately fifteen seconds which he considered to be a conservative estimate of time. The day was clear, a bright sun, no clouds or haze, vision was not obstructed by trees or other foliage or buildings and the object traveled over flat terrain; shape and general form of object could still be observed at the time it disappeared over the horizon. Mr. [REDACTED] stated that he could not estimate the object's size or altitude. According to Mr. [REDACTED], if this object was 200 feet high, it would have been traveling approximately 2,880 miles per hour and that the speed in miles per hour would increase in proportion to the object's height. Mr. [REDACTED] further stated that either this object or another was sighted by Charles Warren, South Seventh Street, Terre Haute, Indiana, at approximately 1345 hours, Tuesday, 9 October 1951, just east of Paris, Illinois. Warren was flying a private plane at an altitude of 5,000 feet from Greencastle, Indiana, to Paris, Illinois, and sighted this silver object just east of Paris, Illinois at 5,000 feet. The object appeared to be stationary at 5,000 feet, inasmuch as it did not increase or diminish in size with the approach of the plane. The object then reversed its direction and was last seen traveling in a northeasterly direction south of the Atomic Energy Plant at Newport, Indiana.
