1. Dr. [redacted] a consultant to the Directorate of Scientific Services of Headquarters Air Weather Service, MATS, advises that while flying as a passenger on Pan American Airways Stratocruiser flight 123 from Frankfurt to New York via Iceland on 21 October 1951, he observed a bright yellowish flash on the horizon at approximately 0500Z.
2. The flash was in the direction of approximately 45° True, and at the time of observance the aircraft was at an altitude of 18,000 feet at the approximate location of 62° North, 15° West. The weather at the time was CAVU, with high scattered cirrus.
3. Dr. Fletcher estimated that the flash illuminated about 3° of the horizon for an instant. At the time of observation, Dr. Fletcher was seated on the starboard side of the aircraft and by chance happened to be looking out the window in the direction of the flash. He did not hear of any of the other passengers having seen the flash and he is inclined to doubt that they or any of the crew did in fact observe the incident. Dr. [redacted] states that he has not discussed the incident with anyone other than the interrogating officer.

Comments of Preparing Officer:

Dr. [redacted] could advance no hypothesis as to the cause of the unusual incident. He considered the sighting to be worthy of considerable scientific thought on his part, but he attached no great significance to it until he read of the President's announcement that a third atomic explosion recently had occurred in the USSR. Dr. [redacted] then felt that he should relate his experience to an Intelligence Officer in the off-chance that the flash might have had some connection with the third, or a subsequent, Soviet atomic explosion. In this connection, Dr. [redacted] commented that the sighting was in the direction of the Soviet island of Novaya Zemlya.

Dr. [redacted] holds a responsible scientific position in the Air Weather Service, and the interrogating officer felt that Dr. [redacted] was a level-headed, mature observer. Dr. Fletcher enjoys an excellent reputation for sound judgment, integrity and reliability.

While Dr. [redacted] does not rule out any possible explanation for the flash, he does reiterate that it did occur beyond the horizon and that on such a day in the Far North, it would be possible for a flash of such magnitude to be seen a great distance [redacted] miles away. He is positive that what he saw could not have been a reflection from a light within or on the aircraft. The time of sighting and the position of the aircraft are the best estimates which Dr. [redacted] can supply.

It made a sound as if it had crashed then later it started again and moved West and that was all.

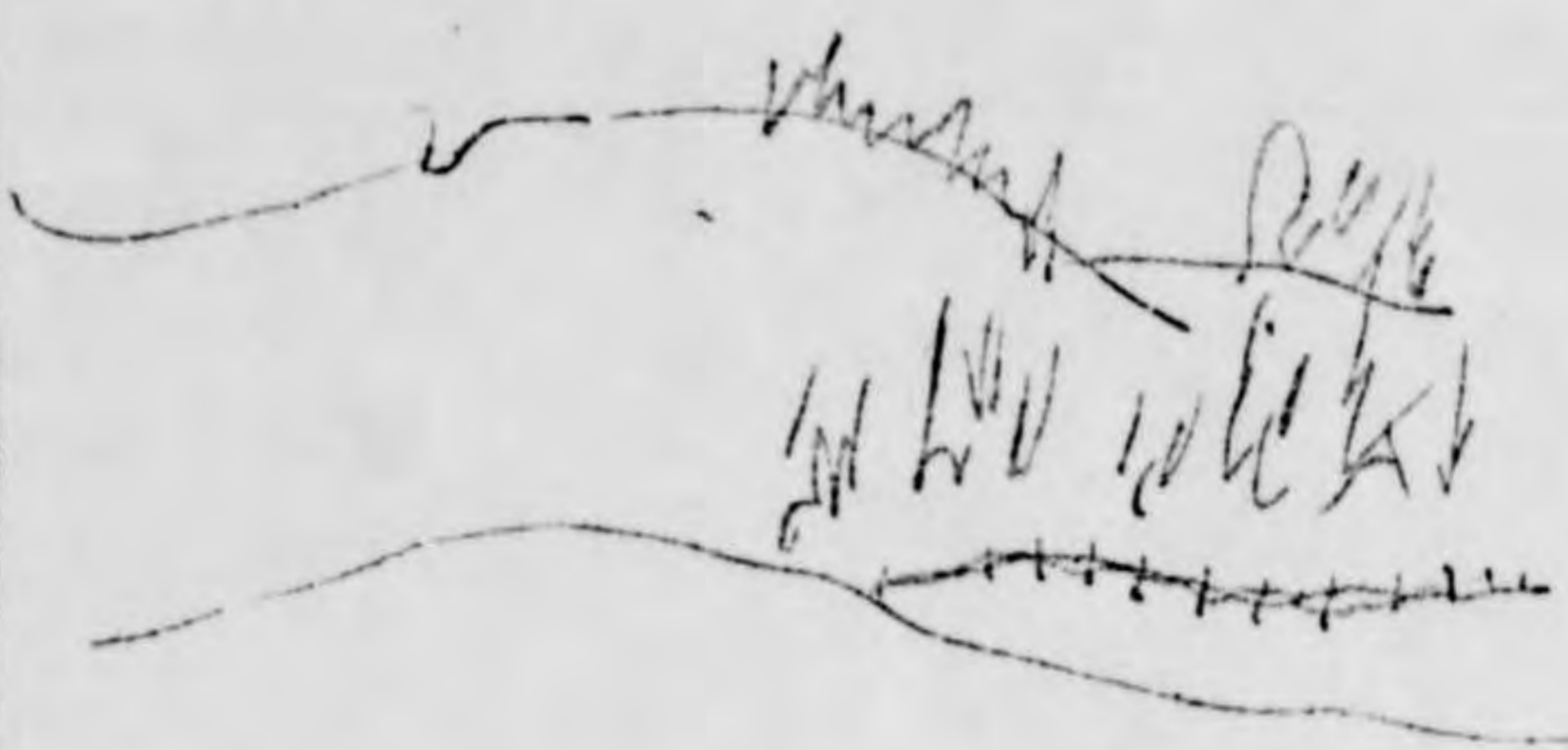
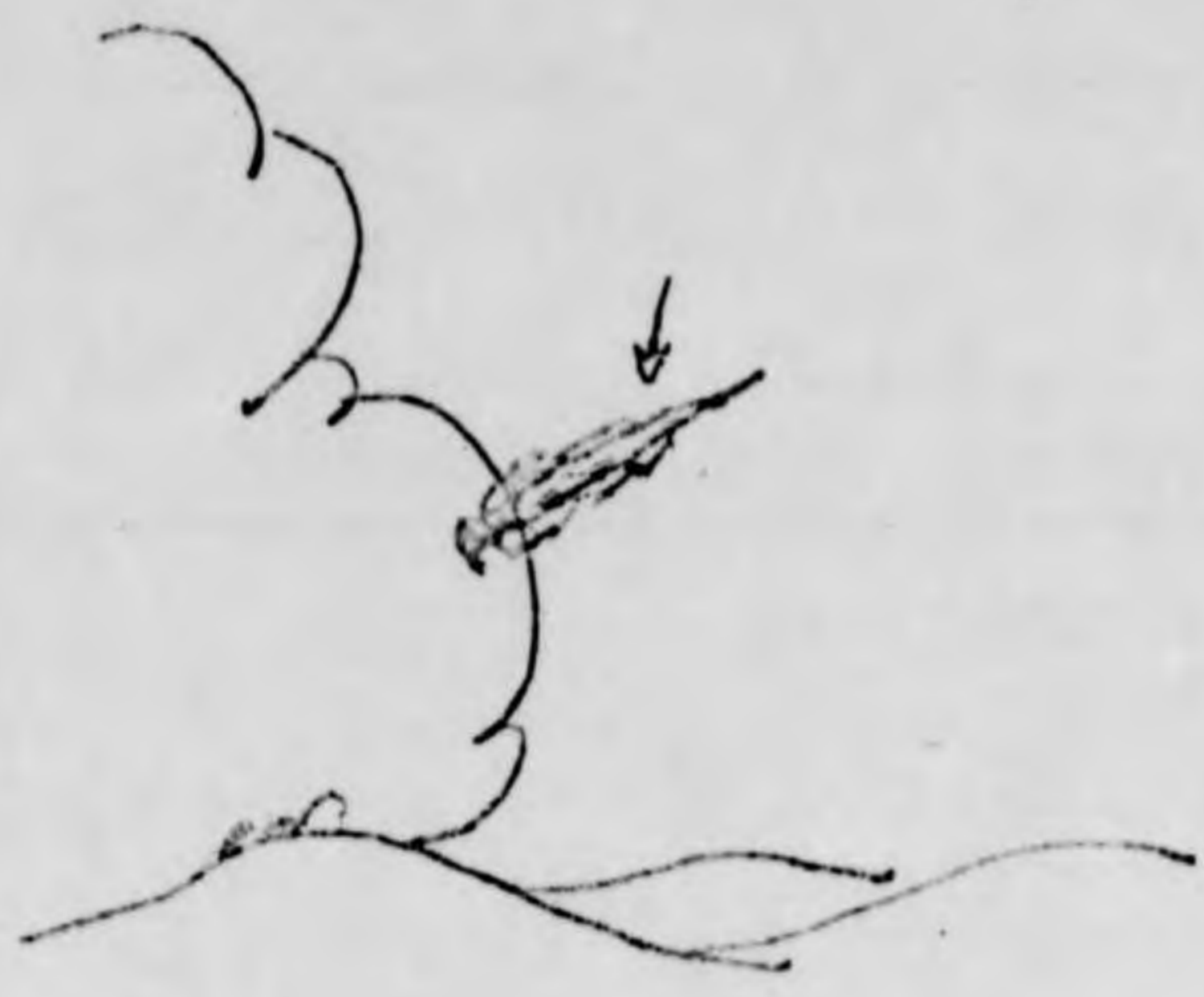
