The main bulk of the cloud remain motionless and was not immediately disturbed by action of the wind. The small cloud was not immediately spherical, but form so during travel to the N and E. 

A study of the photographs indicates that the object shown is a lenticular altocumulus cloud. This type of formation often results from the atmospheric conditions which you described.

The Air Technical Intelligence Center would like to obtain the use of your negatives, if you still have them on hand, for the purpose of making enlargement prints. The negatives would be promptly returned to you.

Your interest in the unidentified flying object program and your desire to be of service is greatly appreciated.

Dear Sir,

During the winter 1951 I was on
out of a building on my section at Kaapori
the time was approximately 11 a.m. New Zealand
time, most of the north and east sky was
cloudless but one cloud of approximately 600 yds
long and 100 yds wide and 60 yds high.
(approximate estimate only) was above the
township in an easterly direction from my
position.

Out of this cloud came, at the
north end only, and suddenly, detached pieces
of cloud that you see in photograph. I watched
this whirling whirlwind of cloud travel
north for a short distance, then at right angles

in an easterly direction on an even keel. as in photograph, but when whirl wind was in the making, the cloud that formed the sphere was only a small part of the north end of cloud. The main bulk of the cloud remained almost motionless and was not immediately disturbed by the action of whirl wind. The main bulk of cloud disappeared about one hour later upwards just as a cloud of steam disappears from a railway engine.

The small piece of cloud that formed whirlwind was not immediately spherical in shape but formed so, during its short distance north then east with tremendous velocity as wisps of cloud were whirled around at amazing speed and to almost 85° I then settled to horizontal with change to easterly direction and disappearance at that elevation. Out to sea. a distance of approximately four miles.

I formed the opinion that no aircraft encountering such a whirl wind of cloud would survive to tell the tale as the vicious velocity

of the whirlwind's tremendous power as proved by the way wisps of cloud were streaked around during the formation as seen in photograph.

For some years I thought that I had only witnessed a whirlwind.

I am now certain that the remainder of the cloud remained almost motionless before disappearing upwards some time afterwards as steam does. The cloud was just an ordinary atmospheric cloud.

However I forward you the snaps hoping that although over two years and one half have passed that they will be of interest.

Perhaps some naval, merchant seaman, or pilot may have witnessed a similar sight, and you may compare notes.

I would appreciate your opinion of the photographs.
