Albuquerque. Aircraft flying at 32,000 feet in both instances. Each object had upward trajectory and seem to burst several thousand feet above aircraft. Albuquerque radio was advised. One man interrogated at Roswell Air Force by OSI regarding the incident a few days later. Both of the above named officers was convinced that object had no relation to meteorological or astronomical activity. No physical evidence of sighting is available."

The following message was received from COMINT WASH DC, Washington D.C. on 1 Jan 52, in quoted for your info. Following is a reproduction of information regarding sightings by 32nd Bomb Group crew during operation conducted under 101-2 hours round trip. Object observed reported unknown distance in flight direction. Object was flying in vicinity of Cedar Keys, Minnesota, USA. Object appeared approximately 30 degrees above and to left of route heading 330 degrees. Object's fall was directly toward ground and divided from what appeared to be intense combustion. As it approached 5 degrees of horizon it suddenly exploded with fall out and trace of explosion demonstrated. Object traveled through space at greater speed than expected of conventional object and appeared much closer and brighter than falling stars and meteors. Prior to explosion, object had glowed and estimated to be 150 feet long. Immediately after explosion object had faded from sight. Object observed at 190156Z for period of approximately 3 seconds. Only visual observations were made. 3 crew members aboard aircraft 44-932 observed phenomena due shot of 49 000 and 87 100 while at 25,000 feet altitude. Location of aircraft approximately 15 miles northwest of Cedar Keys Flying Range. Aircraft flying 360 degrees at 250 knots. 32nd Bomb Group personnel observing phenomena as follows:

Aircraft Commander [REDACTED] 9 years flying experience, 3 years flying experience. Senior Pilot [REDACTED] 3 years flying experience. Senior Pilot Lieutenant Lawrence M. Leggett 3 years flying experience. Both commander very corroborative and corroborative information all appearing apparently truthful and to the point. No opinion given as to identity of the object. [REDACTED] reported that during 9-10-51 he flew between Denver and Albuquerque in late 1948 he saw two types of phenomena on 2 separate occasions and approximately 1000 ft. each all appearing and acting just as he stated the object.

FLYING EXPERIENCE. BOMBARDIER 1ST LIEUTENANT [REDACTED] 5 YEARS FLYING EXPERIENCE. EACH OBSERVER VERY CONSCIENTIOUS AND COOPERATIVE DURING INTERROGATION. ALL REMARKS APPARENTLY TRUTHFUL AND TO THE POINT.

NO OPINIONS OFFERED AS TO IDENTITY OF THE OBJECT. GOADE REPORTED THAT DURING C-47 FLIGHT BETWEEN DENVER AND ALBUQUERQUE IN LATE 1948 HE OBSERVED SAME TYPE OF PHENOMENA ON 2 SEPARATE OCCASIONS: ONCE APPROXIMATELY 30 MINUTES NORTH OF ALBUQUERQUE AND AGAIN JUST AS HE REACHED THE CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE.

AIRCRAFT FLYING AT 12,000 FEET IN BOTH INSTANCES. EACH OBJECT HAD AN UPWARD TRAJECTORY AND SEEM TO BURST SEVERAL THOUSAND FEET <sup>DOWNGRADED AT 3 YEAR INTERVALS;  
DECLASSIFIED AFTER 12 YEARS.  
DOD DIR 5200.10</sup> ABOVE AIRCRAFT. ALBUQUERQUE RADIO WAS ADVISED. [REDACTED] WAS INTERROGATED AT RANDOLPH AIR BASE BY OSI REGARDING THE INCIDENT A FEW WEEKS LATER. EACH OF THE ABOVE NAMED OFFICER WAS CONVICTED THAT OBJECT HAD NO RELATION TO METEOROLOGICAL OR ASTRONOMICAL ACTIVITY. NO PHYSICAL EVIDENCE OF SIGHTING IS AVAILABLE."

JAN 52, IS QUOTED FOR YOUR INFO: FOLLOWING  
IS SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION REGARDING SIGHTINGS  
BY 32 ND BOMB SQUADRON CREW DURING OPERATION  
CONDUCTED UNDER 101-2 LARGE ROUND BLUISH  
GREEN BALL OF LIGHT OBSERVED UNDETERMINED DISTANCE  
IN FRONT OF B-29. TYPE AIRCRAFT FLYING IN  
VICINITY OF CEDER JETS BOMBING RANGE FLA.

OBJECT FIRST APPEARED APPROXIMATELY 30  
DEGREES ABOVE AND TO LEFT OF ACFT HEADING  
120 DEGREES. OBJECT'S FALL WAS DIRECTLY  
TOWARD GROUND AND GLOWED FROM WHAT APPEARED TO  
BE INTERNAL COMBUSTION. AS IT APPROACHED 5  
DEGREES OF HORIZON IT SEEMINGLY EXPLODED  
WITH FALL OUT AND FORCE OF EXPLOSION DOWNWARD.

OBJECT TRAVELED THROUGH SPACE AT GREATER  
SPEED THAN EXPECTED OF FREE FALLING OBJECT  
AND APPEARED MUCH CLOSER AND BRIGHTER THAN FALLING STARS AND METEORS.  
PRIOR TO EXPLOSION OBJECT LEFT GLOWING TAIL ESTIMATED  
TO BE 150 FEET LONG. IMMEDIATELY AFTER  
DISINTEGRATION OBJECT AND TRAIN FADED FROM SIGHT.

OBJECT OBSERVED AT 19015SZ FOR PERIOD OF  
APPROXIMATELY 3 SECONDS. ONLY VISUAL  
OBSERVATIONS WERE MADE. 3 CREW MEMBERS  
ABOARD AIRCRAFT 44-962 OBSERVED PHENOMENA  
DUE EAST OF 29 05 N AND 83 10 W WHILE AT  
25,000 FEET PRESSURE ALTITUDE. ; 191-589,  
OF AIRCRAFT APPROXIMATELY 15 MILES NORTHEAST  
OF CEDER KEYS BOMBING RANGE.

30 SECOND BOMB SQUADRON PERSONNEL OBSERVING

REPLYING TO REPORT TS-24, CSAF ITEM 5, 23 JANUARY 1952.  
THIS OBSERVATION IS TYPICAL OF THE GREEN  
FIREBALL CLASS OF UNIDENTIFIED OBJECTS. THE AIR  
FORCE CAMBRIDGE RESEARCH LABORATORY HAS  
BEEN INVESTIGATING THIS PHENOMENA FOR THE  
PAST TWO YEARS BUT HAVE REACHED NO CONCLUSIONS.  
ATIC IS STILL COLLECTING DATA ON THIS TYPE OF  
PHENOMENA, HOWEVER, IN CASE IT IS EVER  
NEEDED IN THE FUTURE, ATIC HAS NO PREVIOUS REPORT ON  
THIS INCIDENT. PILOTS 1943 REPORT IS ON  
FILE.
