1. Reference is made to your AF Form 112 dated 27 February 1952, subject: "Unidentified Flying Objects", and the photographs inclosed thereto.

RESEARCH & DEV.*

2. The unidentified objects which appeared in the photograph prints were caused by small flaws in the emulsion of the negative.

3. It is requested that information be obtained as to where the negatives were developed and whether or not the source, Capt Musick, knew the flaws caused the images on the print.

INTELLIGENCE

4. The Directorate of Intelligence, Hq USAF, has requested this investigation. Since the investigation of unidentified aerial phenomena is a serious problem and if these photos were submitted as a hoax or joke, disciplinary action should be taken. However, if the source was not aware of the damage to the negative and conscientiously submitted them for analysis, his efforts are appreciated by the Air Force and no further action will be taken.

OR MILITARY LAB. IF HE DEVELOPED IT HIMSELF,
OR IF IT WAS DEVELOPED BY A MILITARY LAB,
IT APPEARS THAT DISCIPLINARY ACTION WILL
BE INVOLVED FOLLOWING A REPORT OF OUR FIND-
INGS TO THE CO OF THE FIRST STRATEGIC SUPPORT
SQUADRON. REQUEST THAT YOU EXPLORE ALL OF
THESE POSSIBILITIES AND WE WILL DISCUSS IT
FURTHER WHEN I ARRIVE AT ATIC NEXT WEEK.

SUBJECT: Evaluation of 35 mm negative

1. Examination of the piece of 35 mm negative was made under magnification and by direct transmittal and reflected light. The following opinion is given:

a. The negative contains two (2) flaws in the emulsion of the film of such a nature that the emulsion coating is irregular on the surface and there are edges that will cause slight shadows and highlights when viewed under reflected light.

b. The cause of the flaws is unknown however they do appear to be caused by sticking of the film during the processing. A similar appearing defect appears on the edge of the film nearest the exposed roof top.

I. DISCUSSION OF INCIDENT

This report contained a photograph of two very unusual objects. The source, an Air Captain, stated that he was attempting to photograph "a circle" that he observed near a rainbow. The "circle" disappeared but he took a picture anyway. Upon developing, or having the negatives developed, two circular objects, similar in appearance to the planet, Saturn, were noticed.

II. STATUS OF INVESTIGATION

Examination of the negative under a microscope showed that the images on the print were caused by two damaged spots on the negative. The cause of these damaged spots is unknown but it appeared that the emulsion had been heated or burned as it was brownish in color. The spots could also have been due to something touching the emulsion while it was still in a gelatin state.

III. CONCLUSIONS

The images on the print were due to damaged spots on the negative.

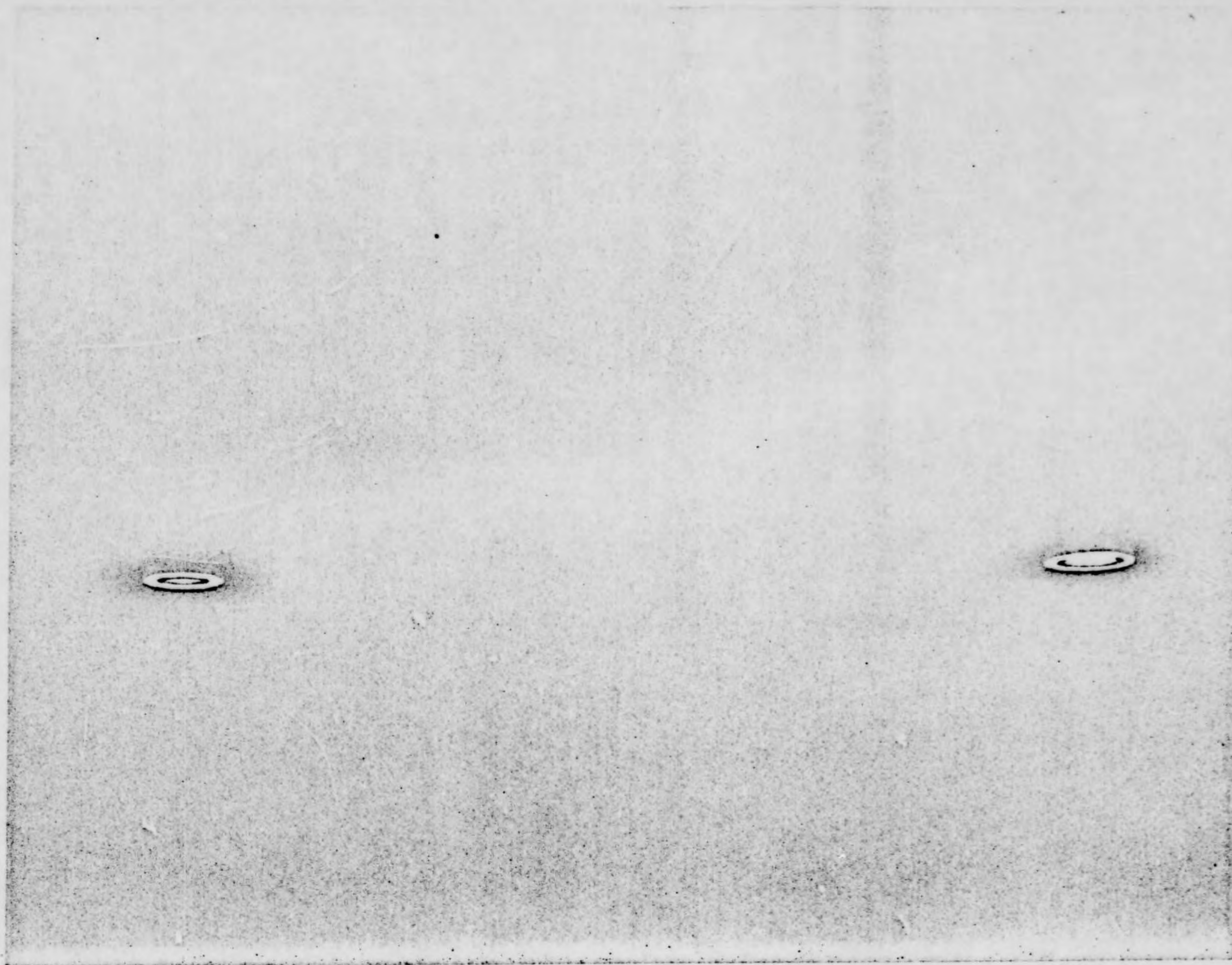

1. The following report on two (2) unidentified flying objects is submitted as a result of an interview with Captain John D. Musick, AO 695353, Adjutant of the 1st Strategic Support Squadron.

2. At approximately 1100HST, 22 February 1952, source attempted to take photographs of a circle observed about a rainbow in the sky. Source was in front of home at 3514 Hamilton St., El Paso, Texas. The angle of the camera at the time of photography was approximately 70°. Sky was clear with no clouds present. Source used 35mm Canon Camera, F-4 Rokor Telephoto Lens; film used was Kodak Super XX Panchromatic; shutter speed 1/500th second at F-5.6 or 1/200th at F-8.

3. Upon developing exposed film, two (2) unidentified objects appeared in one (1) negative of the exposed film. Objects were not visible to source at the time the picture was taken.

4. Photographs of unidentified objects as printed from exposed film along with the negative are submitted herewith.



S T A T E M E N T

I developed the negatives in a steel Nikor tank using Microdal fine grain developer. All developing was done in my own home in a make shift darkroom (namely the bathroom). The exact date that the film was developed is unknown.

I take and develop pictures as a hobby. This was the second roll of film developed since 1947, the year I took up the hobby of photography. The film was developed in accordance with the instructions for fine grain developing. The time was twelve (12) minutes for developing with a thirty (30) second stop bath of 3 percent acetic acid and fixed for fifteen (15) minutes in Ansco Acid Fixer. Washing was done in the tank for approximately twenty (20) minutes. After discovering the supposed images, I brought the negatives to Biggs Air Force Base, Texas, where the negative was projected on a screen by 97th Bombardment Wing Intelligence personnel for their inspection. No one had seen anything like the supposed image before and the negative was taken to the Base Photo Laboratory where it was enlarged. Prints were processed and they were in turn taken to the Commanding Officer 1st Strategic Support Squadron who referred them to the Squadron Intelligence Officer for action.

In the April or May issue of " U.S. Camera " I read an article in the " Letters to the Editor " column about someone who had a similiar flaw in the negative and the explanation was quite concise. They stated the flaws were caused by bending the film.
