3 April 1952

At approximately 2030-2040 hours, 2 April 1952 I observed a lighted object flashing across the sky from South to North. At the time I first observed it I was standing on the ramp at Temple Airport talking to Lt. Col. Ralph L. ... his attention to the object.

The object closely resembled a rocket (or falling star) leaving a trail of fire except that it's motion appeared to be horizontal to the earth's surface. Also, it appeared to travel at a speed rather than burn out. Its path was from South to North, passing to the east of Temple. It's altitude cannot be approximated, therefore, neither can it's speed. It did, however, disappear to a certain altitude layer of cloud for a few seconds.

I was in the Radar compartment of W-55 - 272 at approximately 2030 2 April 52 and saw the object in question. I was in the traffic pattern at Temple Air Base at the time. The object passed behind us and the last time I saw it, it was passing the lights of base. All I could see of the object was the fire or exhaust coming from it, this fire appeared red to me. The object appeared to be traveling in a flat trajectory at not too great an altitude. I would say its speed was well over 300 MPH. I would estimate the object passed directly over a point between Temple and ... at a heading of about 090°.

At approximately 2030 hours on 2 April 1952, [redacted] the 737th AGAS Squadron telephoned the Chief Duty Controller at [redacted] that he had just seen a "flying saucer". [redacted] was inspecting the guard at an entrance to the area when he saw an object appear from a southerly direction and pass overhead continuing for some ten (10) seconds to the N at which time it disappeared below the horizon.

In [redacted] opinion, at no time did the object leave a trail such as a meteor gives off. Approximately half way along its path it appeared to add speed, which was evidenced by an increase in the trail of fire, lasting approximately three (3) or four (4) seconds, then reverting to a slight glow.

In his estimation the speed of the object was between 1000/1200 MPH. Immediately after the passage of the object, it was possible to hear it. The sound was the same as given off by a jet aircraft at high altitude and speed. The object was witnessed by Lt. Baldwin, Sgt. Carey and Wfc. Barnett.

Interviews of 18 indiv obsers near Temple, Texas reveal substantially following: At approx 2045 hrs 2 Apr unidentified object resembling ball of fire observed west of Temple, Tex for approx 30 seconds. Traveling south to north, in trajectory heading 090 degrees on straight course disappearing in clouds, speed estimated from 500 to 4,000 mph. Altitude estimated generally 20,000 ft. Appeared to be ball of flame with tail and 2 or 3 smaller balls with tails broke off and burned out. Weather cond-clouds thin scattered at 25,000 ft. No indication on radar. Not believed by observers to be meteor, or falling star.

On the evening of 2 April 1952 night flying was in progress for T-28 type aircraft at Bryan Air Force Base, Texas. At approximately 2040 hours local time a bright light with a trail (see part II) was seen traveling at a high rate of speed from the southwest to the northeast. The light was seen by three instructors for varying lengths of time ranging from 3 to 13 seconds. The object passed from sight to the northeast in a normal manner.

The significance of this sighting does not have any apparent value until evaluated by higher headquarters.

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1. At approximately 2040 hours local time on 2 April 1952 an unidentified flying object was sighted by three (3) flight line instructors southwest of Bryan AFB, Texas. One observer was on the ground; one observer was in the control tower; and one observer was at 1200 ft indicated over the north-south runway on a heading of 170° in a T-28 type aircraft preparatory to pitching out for landing.

2. The object was described as a ball of fire with a long trail behind it. The ball was estimated in size to be about one-third (1/3) the size of the moon. The trail was described as being composed of sparks and as being fifteen to thirty (15-30) times as long as the diameter of the ball. The trail was thickest at the forward end.

3. The ground observer stated that two (2) smaller trails dropped toward the ground at the same time in different arcs approximately 100-200 feet in length. The other two (2) observers did not make the same observation.

4. The color of the trail was described as pale orange white fire colored. All observers agreed that there was only one object.

5. Estimates of the speed vary from 1000 mph to 1500 mph with the propulsion system unknown. None of the observers report hearing any sound from the object.

6. The object was first seen to the southwest of Bryan AFB at an undetermined distance and altitude. It flew a straight and level path toward the northeast where it passed from sight normally. It was observed for periods ranging from five to fifteen seconds by the three (3) observers.

7. The three observers were all Captains in the USAF with considerable flying experience. They gave the appearance of serious minded individuals who were not inclined to exaggerate and were considered usually reliable.

8. The weather sequence at 2028G, 2 April 1952 at Bryan AFB, Texas, was as follows:

25,000' scattered, 12 miles visibility, 1016.2 mb, temperature 67°F, dewpoint 48°F, wind south at 8 kts, altimeter 30.00", total sky cover 2/10 cirrus. There was no weather phenomenon at the time of the sighting.

9. The sources of this information are rated B-1. Due to the small amount of information available on this sighting no significance can be attached at this level.

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The shape of the object was rectangular with blunted ends and small trailing tail of sparks and flame. There was no sound at all. It preceded in a straight course with no maneuvers, flying out of sight on a northeasterly course. The object was of a fiery nature and bright orange and yellow in color.

Through visual observation it was sighted at approximately 2035, 2 April 1952. The object was flying at an approximated 2000 ft. altitude. If approximation of altitude is near correct, speed of the object was over six hundred (600) miles per hour.

The observer was located at 31° 36' north, 97° 06' 30" west. This is the location of the Oaklawn Drive-In Theatre a few miles northeast of Waco, Texas, on the Dallas Highway #81.

The object flew over the observer's (Mr. [redacted]) head at an estimated 2000 ft. altitude, flying away from him on a northeasterly heading, disappearing from his vision about 3 miles south of James Connally Air Force Base.

The observers were Mr. and Mrs. [redacted], with Mr. [redacted] spotting it first. Mrs. [redacted] corroborates the statement made by her husband. Mr. [redacted] a civilian instructor in the Radar Observer School of the 3585th Training Wing at James Connally Air Force Base, Waco, Texas and is a graduate electrical engineer. The reliability of his statement can be estimated as fairly substantial.

The weather was as follows: scattered clouds at 12,000 ft., scattered clouds at 25,000 ft. 15 miles visibility with a south-southeasterly, 6 MPH wind. The temperature was 64° and the dew point .38.

As far as can be determined there were no unusual meteorological conditions or activities at that time.

There is no physical evidence of the sighting in existence other than the written and signed statement of Mr. [redacted] pertaining to his observation.

STATEMENT

On the night of April 2, 1952, my wife and I sighted an unidentified object in the sky. Our location was at the Oaklawn Drive-in theatre a few miles northeast of the city of Waco on the Dallas highway # 81.

While watching the movie we observed a flaming object approaching overhead from the southwest. I thought, at first, that this object was a jet aircraft, but after getting out of the car and watching it come directly overhead I was convinced it was not.

The object was flaming yellow in color and its end emitted particles of the flame or sparks. It was absolutely noiseless and had no landing lights. It traveled at a uniform speed while in my sight and although it was impossible to tell its speed (not knowing the size of the object or its altitude) I approximated (by my watch and a rough measurement of distance) that it took the object 30 seconds to travel from (headed northeast) the edge of Waco, to a point about 3 miles south of JCAFB. My first thought was that, if it were a jet, its altitude was about 2,000 ft. The object traveled parallel to the earth's surface and I detected no change in altitude. It held a straight course until it disappeared from my sight. The time I sighted this object was approximately 2035. Nothing was visible except a flame, which was rectangular and had a rather blunt head and tail.

The sky was clear that night and except for a couple small clouds south of us the stars were clearly visible.

My wife and I both observed this object and to my knowledge so did several others at the drive-in. Unfortunately I failed to get their names.

At this point I should like to interject, that even though I don't know what this object was I am fairly positive it was not an aircraft. (Working at JCAFB for 15 mos. I have seen just about every model the Air Force has with the exception of the secret experimental models). Had it been a jet (and as far as I know jets don't have flames as long or as large as this) I would have heard some sound or saw night lights of some sort. I was standing out of the car when the object came from overhead and was clear of the movie loudspeaker (which may be argued as a factor in drowning out any airplane noise). The drive-in (which I have attended many times) is located some what southeast of JCAFB, s runways and night flying B-25's fly over all the time sometimes drowning out the movie sound. This further substantiates my belief that it was not an aircraft.

I am a graduate electrical engineer and I am positive it was no electrical discharge such as lightning etc.

I, _____, hereby state that RICHARD J. BROWN has identified himself to me as a Special Agent of the Office of Special Investigations, United States Air Force, and that I do hereby voluntarily and of my own free will make the following statement without having been subjected to any coercion, unlawful influence or unlawful inducement, and without any promise of reward, benefit, or any immunity having been made to me:

On April 2, 1952 at approximately 2000 hours I stepped out of the hangar in the 1st Group Carrier Assault Squadron area at Brownwood Municipal Airport. I looked up at the sky and saw what appeared to be a bright object trailing fire. It was at an elevation above the horizon of approximately 10 degrees. I called to the other pilots in the field, but they did not see it. The object was moving across the sky. At this time it started to leave a trail of fire, similar to the air object, from behind and went out. The object continued in its course at a constant speed until it went out of sight. It did not appear to turn out but rather it disappeared as if it could not be seen any longer. The speed of the object was more than that of a fast jet aircraft and slower than a rocket star or missile. I have no idea as to its altitude or its distance from me. The color of the object was a light color. This object was seen at approximately about 40 seconds.

I further state that I have read this entire statement, indicated all the proper corrections and signed in state a typical but it is correct and true, as stated.

[REDACTED] has identified [REDACTED] as a Special Agent of the Office of Special Investigations, United States Air Force, and that I do hereby voluntarily and of my own free will make the following statement without having been subjected to any coercion, unlawful influence or unduly inducement, and without any promise of reward, benefit, or any immunity having been made to me:

On 2 April 1952 at approximately 2100 hours I heard Lt. Marquardt call me from the tent at Brownwood Airport to observe a sighting, when I was outside at the time and looked up and saw the object approximately 57 degrees to the East at an angle above the horizon of about 30 degrees. As it moved thru the South about three sparks or flames or objects separated from the main body which diminished as they increased and I on the same path as the main object. It continued moving in a northeasterly direction and appeared to disappear approximately 15-20 seconds after spotting it. The object was yellow-orange in color with the left front and larger part in front and a tapered tail. Size and speed could not be determined and there was no sound that could be heard. The sparks or flames or pieces that appeared to separate when the object disappeared were similar in shape to parts of a wheel with the same color as the object and disappeared in about three seconds.

During the time that I observed the "object", I saw two smaller balls of fire appear to leave the large one. Each at a different time, probably a second apart. Since the "object" passed almost directly over my position, relatively speaking, and since I have no idea the size of it, I can not even venture an estimation of the height.
