1. In compliance with ADCL 200-1 dated 11 April 1951, the following report is respectfully submitted.

2. The following information is not the result of an observation of the undersigned; simply heresay evidence from citizens of Moorhead, Minnesota and Fargo, North Dakota.

3. On or about 2145 hours 25 April 1952, a call from the Fargo Police Department was received by this writer. The reason: Airborne objects that glowed were seen "Very High" directly over the City of Moorhead Minnesota between 2100 and 2145 hours. The glowing objects ~~hereinafter referred to as~~ "Disks" appeared in wide "V" formation consisting of five (5) disks per flight in five (5) flights approximately eight (8) minutes apart. Direction of flight was consistently South to North. No shape, other than "round" was apparent. Size could not be determined since disks were travelling very high. No trails of vapor or exhaust were seen. No obvious means of propulsion were apparent nor was there any noise made by any disk. Formation was described as wide "V" but irregular, or more specifically, rather sloppy, in that the disk pilots, if such is the case, appeared to have trouble maintaining constant speed and altitude.

b. Time of observation between 2100 and 2145 hours. Actual sighting time per flight of disks; about four (4) seconds, after which time disks suddenly disappeared.

c. Manner of observation was visual and no binoculars or other optical assistants were employed. Speed, altitude and type of aircraft were unknown. Form surface of disk unknown. Only description pertinent to same was "a glowing ball." No electronic equipment was available for use.

d. Location of observer was on Southwest corner of Third Avenue South and Sixth Street South in Moorhead Minnesota. Objects were sighted directly overhead moving north. Altitude unknown.

- i. No interception was made or attempted, nor was identification by the proper authorities possible.

- j. There was no local aircraft activity at the time of the sighting. Northwest Airlines flight from Minneapolis to Fargo passed through the area and was sighted by the majority of the parties that are mentioned in par e., on or about 2110 hours. This is the normal approach time for that commercial flight.

- k. This report, classified confidential, was prepared at 0900 hours, 27 April 1952 and will go forward via airmail to the prescribed headquarters. This headquarters awaited arrival of ADCL 200-1 which was flown in promptly to accomplish this report.

1. In compliance with ADCI 200-1, dated 11 April 1952, the following follow-up action on report, same subject as above, dated 27 April 1952, is respectfully submitted.

2. The information below was gathered by the undersigned and observed first hand, rather than as hearsay as was submitted in report 27 April 1952.

a. The Airborne objects referred to as disks by several citizens of Moorhead, Minnesota and Fargo, North Dakota, seen traveling "Very High, Very Fast, Bright Red and Orange, etc., " on or about 25 April 1952, have turned out to be Mallard and Teal Ducks.

b. To satisfy his own curiosity, the undersigned proceeded to the top (10th floor) floor of the Black Building in the City of Fargo, North Dakota, about 2030 hours on 28 April 1952, equipped with binoculars, high speed camera, telescope, etc., and waited the mysterious flights.

c. On or about 2115 hours several Teal Ducks passed over, high, fast, and bright orange. Identification was positive via flapping wings. Geese followed, also illuminated and were positively identified by "honking". Phosphorescence was picked up by the fowl from the neon lights in the City thus causing the strange illumination.

d. Observation heretofore had been from the ground level with lighting glare. The difference in both of these factors caused the objects to show up more clearly.

APPENDIX I

Fargo, North Dakota - 25 April 1952

I. DESCRIPTION OF INCIDENT

Between 2100 and 2145 hours on 25 April 1952, eight observers reported sighting unidentified flying discs which appeared in a wide "V" formation. There were five discs per flight and a total of five flights at eight minute intervals. The direction of flight was consistently south to north.

The formation was described as a wide "V", irregular or more specifically, sloppy, in that the disc pilots, if such is the case, appeared to have trouble maintaining constant speed and altitude.

II. STATUS OF THE INVESTIGATION

The Commanding Officer of Detachment 2, 462nd Ground Observer Squadron, Fargo Filter Center, Fargo, North Dakota, followed up the report personally. He proceeded to the top (10th floor) of the Black Building in Fargo, North Dakota, at about 2030 hours on 28 April 1952 equipped with binoculars, high-speed camera, telescope, etc., and awaited the mysterious flights. A number of local citizens shared his vigil with him.

III. CONCLUSIONS

The unidentified discs seen traveling very high and fast and of bright red and orange color were identified by the above observers (II) as being migrating mallard and teal ducks.
