




Statement of Observer

I, [REDACTED], Base Flight, 146th Fighter-Bomber Wing, do make this statement concerning a certain unidentified object observed by me on 20 May 1952:

1. The object that I saw was round and bright and silvery, like a light. I heard no sounds coming from it and saw no vapor trails. The object seemed to fade away as it moved.
2. My observation was made at 1425 PDST, on the date indicated and lasted for approximately 5 minutes.
3. I sighted the object with the naked eye from the ground.
4. I made the sighting on the flight line, George AFB. It appeared to be the same size as when I observed the same type of object previously from an altitude of approximately 12,000 feet (previous report dated 13 May 52).
5. I am 22 years old with two years of college. I worked 13 months at Hughes Aircraft, Culver City, California. During the last six months of employment there, I was a field attendant in the Flight Test Department. I have completed the 6 months aircraft and engine mechanics course at Sheppard AFB, Texas. I have flown in aircraft since the age of 18.






Statement of Observer

I, [REDACTED] 146th Air Police Squadron, do this date make the following statement concerning my observation on 1 May 1952 of certain unidentified flying objects:

1. The objects that I sighted were round and they appeared to be elliptical. I could not tell the size of these objects, as there was no basis for comparison, such as aircraft flying nearby at approximately the same altitude. They left no exhaust or vapor trail nor any sound. They were of a flat white color which did not leave any highlight or reflection from the sun. The last two of the five (5) seemed to come together, then pull away from each other. The speed was great, but lack of time in which to make observation prevented any accurate estimate. I was only able to keep the objects under observation for about 1/2 minute before they turned over the base and disappeared, heading north.

2. These objects were sighted at 1050 hours, Pacific Daylight Saving Time. This occurred about one hour after a cloud from an atom blast was sighted in the direction of Las Vegas.

3. They were observed on the ground by naked eye.

4. I was in the range tower on the George Air Force Base small arms range, 2 blocks east of the base Wherry Housing. The objects came from a south-easterly direction. They turned, making a slow arc to the north-west, then went in a northerly direction over the base and disappeared. No reliable estimate of altitude could be made by me. (See attached sketch.)

5. In civilian life, I worked for Lockheed Aircraft Corporation as a plastic fabricator. I have studied art for 14 years and have done some commercial art work. I did not graduate from high school. I am married and have 1 child, 4 months old. I was in the 40th Infantry Division, California National Guard for 3 years as platoon sergeant. I was also a member of the Civil Air Patrol. I have spent a large part of my life handling aircraft. I am well acquainted with aerodynamic theory.

C.</p> <p>a. The following information is submitted:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) Total of 3 objects were observed. One resembled a paper plate in shape and appearance and was of flat white color. Other two were too high for accurate estimate of shape or size but had metallic glow. One of these two was not continually visible whereas it seemed to waver or "bob." As it turned, it cast reflection or it ceased it to glint. The other of the two small objects was continually visible; both of them seemed to be in wing formation. The larger "paper-plate" like object flipped and over and in definite direction, disappearing into south with speed of jet fighter and reappearing about 5 minutes later at a reduced speed. "Paper-plate" object made 90° turn to north about 20 or 30 seconds after it reappeared, then seemed to approach the two smaller objects, which did not appear until second observation. No interaction apparent between "paper-plate" object and two smaller ones. No noise or vapor trails apparent. (2) Sightings made at 1200 and 1224 respectively 11 May. Both observations lasted about 1 minute. (3) Observation took place on ground visually. (4) Observer was on central part of George Air Force Base at time of sighting (located about 6 miles northwest of Victorville, California). Larger object moved southwest when first sighted. When second observation was made, larger object was moving east toward observer, then headed south after 90° turn to right. Altitude was between 10,000 and 15,000 feet. Two smaller objects did not move in definite direction but remained in vicinity. Altitude was between 10,000 and 15,000 feet. (5) Observer has high school educational background and is taking instruction as civilian light aircraft pilot. (6) Clear sky, visibility 30 miles, temperature 35°, wind light at 5 knots per hour.

Statement of Observer

I, [REDACTED], do make the following statement concerning certain unidentified objects observed by me on 11 May 1952:

1. One of the 3 objects that I observed resembled a paper plate in shape and appearance and was of a flat white color. The others were too high to allow any accurate estimate as to shape or size but had a metallic glow. One of the smaller objects was not continually visible because it seemed to waver or "bob." As it turned, the sun's reflection on it would cause it to glint. The other small object was continually visible and both seemed to be in a wing formation. The object resembling the "paper plate" flipped end over end in a definite direction, disappearing into the south with a speed of a jet fighter and returning about 5 minutes later at a reduced speed. 20 to 30 seconds after the second observation had commenced, I saw the "paper plate" object make a 90° turn to the south and then it seemed to approach the two smaller objects, which did not make their appearance until the second observation. There appeared to be no interaction between the "paper plate" object and the two smaller ones. I did not notice any noise or vapor trails emanating from any of the objects.

2. I made the two sightings at 1220 and 1226. The first observation lasted 1 minute and the second one lasted 1 minute.

3. I observed the objects from the ground with the naked eye.

4. I was at the central part of George Air Force Base when I made the observations. George Air Force Base is located 6 miles northwest of Victorville, California. The larger "paper plate" object moved in a south-west direction when first sighted. When I sighted it for the second time, it was moving east approaching me and then headed south after executing a 90° turn to the right. Its altitude was between 10,000 and 15,000 feet. The two smaller objects did not move in any direction but remained in the same general vicinity. They were between 30,000 and 40,000 feet high.

5. I have a high school education and am taking instruction as a civilian light aircraft pilot.

6. Weather was clear, with good visibility and little wind in the vicinity.

7. No special activity or condition which might account for the sighting.

8. No physical evidence of the observation was apparent.

9. No interception or identification action taken.

10. No aircraft in the air in the vicinity at the time of observation.

Memorandum for Record

SUBJECT: Trip to George AFB on 20-23 May 1952

On 17 May 1952, [redacted] called Major Vincent Wolrath, Wing Intelligence Officer of the 46th Fighter Bomber Wing at George AFB, Calif. Major Wolrath stated that due to the recent flurry of sightings he deemed it very advisable to send someone from ATIC to George AFB. [redacted] had orders cut and departed by commercial air on 20 May 1952 arriving at George AFB late on the evening of the 20th.

On 21 May 1952, [redacted] contacted Major Wolrath who reviewed sightings on (1-9-11-13-14) and 20 May. Several of these sightings from a T-6, seemed to be repetitive and plans were made to attempt to observe the object on the afternoon of 21 May.

[redacted] who had piloted the T-6, during previous observations was contacted. He offered to fly that P.M. and take [redacted] along as observer and to assist in setting up an observation team. Both the Ground Control Intercept (Radar) and Fighter Interceptor squadron of ADC were contacted and briefed on the sightings and plans to observe from a T-6. They agreed to stand by all afternoon on "D" channel of VHF in case the object was sighted. If it was, F-86's would be scrambled and radar would attempt a pick-up. A ground station and a ground observer team headed by Major Wolrath was equipped with a ground VHF set and would have a telescope to make ground observations from the George AFB line. Weather was alerted in case a theodolite was needed. All VHF sets were set up for "D" channel on a special frequency to keep the interception of messages to a minimum.

At 1330 PDST, the T-6 was airborne. [redacted] had a Lieca with a 135 mm telephoto lens in case photos could be taken. At 1430 PDST, the ground observation team called the T-6 and stated they were observing the object through a telescope and it appeared to be a balloon. Also it was identical to several of the previous reports as previous observers were on the ground watching. The aerial search was continued with no success and at 1440 PDST the object disappeared. The aerial search was broken off and the T-6 landed.

[redacted] contacted Edwards AFB and was informed that at 1438 PDST a Rawinsonde balloon from their station burst at 75,000'-80,000' SSE of their station (approximately over George AFB).

It was concluded that the object was this balloon.

On 22 May 1952, the entire day was spent interviewing sources of other sightings. It will be noted that although some of the reports were attributed to balloons, others could not be and are still being investigated.

Lt Ruppelt returned to W-P AFB on 23 May.

The cooperation received at George AFB was excellent.

APPENDIX VI

George AFB, Calif. - 1, 9, 13, 14, 20 May 1952

DESCRIPTION OF INCIDENT

The sighting on 1 May 1952 at George AFB, Calif., was the first of a series of nine sightings there in a three week period. These sightings were all by military personnel.

a. 1 May 1952 - Five round, disc-shaped objects, flat white in color which gave no glare or reflection were sighted. They were in formation with three in front and two in the rear. The latter two darted around in a circular or zig-zag manner.

b. 9 May 1952, 1030 PDST - An unidentified round, silver object was sighted visually from the ground and from two F-86 aircraft.

c. 9 May 1952, 1230 PDST - Two unidentified objects moving with the current or breeze at a slow speed. They appeared to be a silver metal color with a dark spot in the center and at certain angles to the sun gave off a bright glare.

d. 9 May 1952, 1720 PDST - Object was of dull color like a thundercloud. It was shaped like an arrowhead but had no known aerodynamic features.

e. 11 May 1952, 1220 PDST - Object looked like a white paper plate flipping end over end with an initial speed comparable to a jet although later it reduced its pace.

f. 13 May 1952, 1425 PDST - Single object, appeared round, shiny, metallic which glowed or reflected white or silver was observed for thirty minutes.

g. 14 May 1952, 1405 to 1430 PDST - Same description as object sighted on 13 May and by same sources.

h. 20 May 1952, 1425 PDST - A silver colored, bright, round object was observed for five minutes. Initially the object was stationary but eventually moved and faded away.

STATUS OF INVESTIGATION

Only balloons released from Edwards AFB can be tracked accurately over George AFB, consequently, for the most part they are the only balloons with which we are concerned. These balloons are released irregularly thus accounting for some of the unusual times of sightings reported in cases which are probably balloons.

The project monitor of Blue Book went to George AFB to investigate the various reports.

a. 1 May 1952 - Report well documented. No additional information obtained.

b. 9 May 1952, 1030 PDST - A balloon was released from Edwards AFB, 55 minutes prior to this sighting.

c. 9 May 1952, 1230 PLST - No known activity which could account for sighting.

d. 9 May 1952, 1720 PDST - No known activity which could account for sighting.

e. 11 May 1952 - Third report in three days from same individual. No activity in area.

f. 13 May 1952 - Balloon launched from Edwards AFB at 1340 PLST.

g. 14 May 1952 - No balloon release officially reported.

h. 20 May 1952 - Balloon released from Edwards AFB at 1332 PDST.

III. CONCLUSIONS

a. 1 May 1952 - No Conclusions.

b. 9 May 1952, 1030 PDST - Very probable that the balloon released from Edwards AFB was the object sighted.

c. 9 May 1952, 1230 PLST - Very possible that paper was caught in the thermals and swept along. A similar sighting turned out to be just that.

d. 9 May 1952, 1720 PDST - No conclusions.

e. 11 May 1952 - No conclusions.

f. 13 May 1952 - Probably was balloon released from Edwards AFB, 45 minutes previous.

g. 14 May 1952 - Description fits incident of 13 May so perfectly it is highly probable that the object was a balloon.

h. 20 May 1952 - Balloon released 53 minutes prior to sighting was probably object observed.

Dear Sirs:

I like to tell you about something that happened to me today. It's all about flying saucers. I was on my way home and came with bus up the hill at Turk and Baker St. in S.F. just when reaching the top of the hill I happened to see a object in the sky. Seemed to be high up at the same time not too far away to the right of the bus. I got the impression it was a saucer right away of drawing you can figure out even though simple how and in what angle I saw it. It seemed to be only big as a bean to me that how big I saw it from the bus and was standing still tilting a little. The thing was all black around the borders and a shiny very bright part in the middle should say something like real shiny aluminum. I could not in so short time I had as I was getting off the bus at the top of the hill. It could only have been about 30 seconds it all occur to me. I got off the bus and looked right away for the object but it was absolutely gone. I could not find it any place on the sky. I should say it was just about to take off when I sighted the object as it was tilted but at the moment I saw it was standing still. However, I saw another plane in the sky to the right. It was one of the old school planes with the landing wheels down but it was going from left to right and it could absolutely not have been this plane I saw as it was so much nearer and every contour of that plane was visible. No wings or tail was seen at the object I saw.

I went upstairs as I live only half a block down the street and have a big picture window facing the sky at where I saw the object. I took my binoculars out not very good but helps on near objects. I could not find it on lighter side of the house in the sky. When I saw the saucer it was just about 3.25 pm "daylight saving time." Next thing I saw made my knees weak I just came in from the other side of the house after looking there for quite a long time. There I put the time at 3.50 D.S.T. I looked at the clock that's how I know about the time to the minute. I have followed every article about saucers and rockets and I am very interested in scientific matters. I have been watching the sky every day whenever I got time for it.

Well next thing made me shaky as I said. I am sorry to make it so detailed and so much going around the hole thing.

I came in from the other room and in to our room and started to cook immediately. And here I saw 4 big black birds coming down toward the church as is standing on the hill of Fulton St. toward the beach I think about 5 blocks from here. I did not see from where they came as I saw them just coming from the air pretty low at about 300 feet and going down to about 175 and 200 feet. My first thought was just like this. My gosh here comes 4 eagles. But when I looked through my glasses they did not look like ordinary birds. Mark the wind was blowing from the ocean beach toward City Center. If you have a way handy you can follow it better. These big birdlike things was flying toward the beach the slowed down to nearly no speed at all at the church. Mark no wing flaps was visible whatever. I am often sitting looking

You sure must be busy people as you only had time to write 3 lines in the reply to my long letter, and the rest a run of the mill letters.

It really surprised me, believe me.

But as I believe you are looking in the very wrong direction for your answer to the riddle of the Flying Saucers, I think I'll write you another one.

Usually I ~~throw~~ ^{throw} away mail that is printed up in mass production like your letters, but I can understand that you are not able to sit and write each individual in person about the Flying Saucers sightings. But you see I'll forgive you. Big of me isn't it. Eh?

As I told you before in my earlier letter
the personal investigation I have done
finally led me in on reading the Bible.

It started with, when a fellow worker
one day said that "Everything you want
to know is in the Bible" referring to
a small different matter than the Flying
Saucers. Well I started thinking,
perhaps there is something about the
Flying Saucers in the Bible then!

I did not start to read it anyway.

So after a short time I bought the

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On 9 May 1948 at 11:15 hours Pacific Daylight (1815 Zulu) I observed the following:

I was leading a flight of two (2) F-86 Aircraft on an Air Defense mission under the control of COMFOTL, Radar site. The flight had been released to land at George Air Force Base and by wingman, Lt. Adair Scarff, was to proceed to in landing for local training purposes. I began a rapid descent from an altitude of 30,000 feet over the base. At approximately 25,000 during the descent I sighted this strange object described below.

The object appeared to be round, and brilliant reflection from the sun made it a very bright silver color. I stopped my descent immediately and began a climb, keeping the object in sight all the while. I reached a point about 8 miles north of Inlandale (34°50' N 117°18' E) at 30,000 feet where the object was directly overhead. Since I have no basis for the object's size my estimate of its altitude will be inaccurate however at the time it appeared to me to be at least 70,000. My wingman was at a position to observe this object in relation to my position and altitude and he stated it appeared to be at least twice my height. We both observed the object to hover motionless then accelerate in an easterly direction. It did not go far, however it would reverse its direction 180 degrees in the short space of 2-4 seconds. During these changes of direction I would turn with the object at the highest possible rate of turn in order to keep it in sight. During the objects acceleration and turns it did not appear to leave an exhaust trail or contrail of any kind. The contrail level began at 34,000 on that day but the top could not be determined for my contrails were still strong at 40,000. We observed this to object execute various port and starboard turns of 180 degrees and hover motionless in the immediate area mentioned previously for a period of 5 minutes when low fuel supply aboard made an immediate landing necessary. Before descending to land I observed the object in one of the turns appear to have a wing, but vertical distance separation made accurate identification of exact shape impossible.

The weather at the time of the incident was clear with visibility of 50 miles.

I have over 1100 hours total flying time of which over 700 have been in fighter type aircraft. I have 320 combat hours with 142 combat missions in the Korean theatre. My wingman has approximately 700 hours total flying time with over 300 hours jet and fighter time.

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The object seen appeared to be round but I cannot give an estimate of the size due to its extreme altitude. It had white in color. Identification or number of the object could not be seen from the ground. No vapor trail or exhaust could be seen from the ground. I would estimate the speed at greater than 1000 mph. The object did not give off any sound or at least no sound could be heard from the ground. It appeared to be doing loops and turns. The object was then temporarily lost and then I picked it up overhead. It was traveling ^{in an} easterly direction in a straight line at a speed of at least 1000 mph. and descending slightly. I lost sight of the object as it moved behind a smoke layer caused by the cement factory.

The object was sighted about 1735 Z and was observed for about 15 minutes.

I observed the object with a pair of binoculars from the control tower. However, the object was visible with the naked eye since it was observed against a clear sky for the most part.

The object was first seen 5-10 miles NE of the base, and at approximately 70,000 feet. It later began to take up an easterly course.



Statement of Observer

[REDACTED] to make the following statement concerning a certain unidentified object observed by me on 9 May 1952:

1. The single object that I observed appeared to be of a dull color, like that of a thunder cloud. It seemed to be shaped like an arrowhead, its size was difficult to determine because of the high altitude. There were no aerodynamic features. If it was the approximate size of any known aircraft, it would have to have been about 30,000 to 40,000 feet high. I heard no sound from the object. The object flew straight and level and disappeared over the horizon to the south.

2. I saw the object at 1750 hours on the date indicated. It was in sight for about 10 seconds.

3. Observation was made by naked eye from the ground.

4. I was on the east side of George Air Force Base when I sighted the object. It was vertically overhead and proceeded south at 30,000 to 40,000 feet altitude.

5. I have a high school education and am taking instruction in civilian flying.

6. Visibility was good, skies were clear and there was little wind in the area.

7. There were no special conditions, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.

8. There was no physical evidence, fragments, photographs, etc., of the sighting.

Memorandum for Record

SUBJECT: Trip to George AFB on 20-23 May 1952

On 17 May 1952, Lt E. J. Ruppelt called Major Vincent Wolrath, Wing Intelligence Officer of the 46th Fighter Bomber Wing at George AFB, Calif. Major Wolrath stated that due to the recent flurry of sightings he deemed it very advisable to send someone from ATIC to George AFB. Lt Ruppelt had orders cut and departed by commercial air on 20 May 1952 arriving at George AFB late on the evening of the 20th.

On 21 May 1952, Lt Ruppelt contacted Major Wolrath who reviewed sightings on 19-11-13-14 and 20 May. Several of these sightings from a T-6, seemed to be repetitive and plans were made to attempt to observe the object on the afternoon of 21 May.

Lt Melzer, who had piloted the T-6, during previous observations was contacted. He offered to fly that P.M. and take Lt Ruppelt along as observer and to assist in setting up an observation team. Both the Ground Control Intercept (Radar) and Fighter Interceptor squadron of ADC were contacted and briefed on the sightings and plans to observe from a T-6. They agreed to stand by all afternoon on "D" channel of VHF in case the object was sighted. If it was, F-86's would be scrambled and radar would attempt a pick-up. A ground station and a ground observer team headed by Major Wolrath was equipped with a ground VHF set and would have a telescope to make ground observations from the George AFB line. Weather was alerted in case a theodolite was needed. All VHF sets were set up for "D" channel on a special frequency to keep the interception of messages to a minimum.

At 1330 PDST, the T-6 was airborne. Lt Ruppelt had a Lieca with a 135 mm telephoto lens in case photos could be taken. At 1430 PDST, the ground observation team called the T-6 and stated they were observing the object through a telescope and it appeared to be a balloon. Also it was identical to several of the previous reports as previous observers were on the ground watching. The aerial search was continued with no success and at 1440 PDST the object disappeared. The aerial search was broken off and the T-6 landed.

Lt Ruppelt contacted Edwards AFB and was informed that at 1438 PDST a Rawinsonde balloon from their station burst at 75,000'-80,000' SSE of their station (approximately over George AFB).

It was concluded that the object was this balloon.

On 22 May 1952, the entire day was spent interviewing sources of other sightings. It will be noted that although some of the reports were attributed to balloons, others could not be and are still being investigated.

Lt Ruppelt returned to W-P AFB on 23 May.

The cooperation received at George AFB was excellent.

APPENDIX VI

George AFB, Calif. - 1, 9, 13, 14, 20 May 1952

DESCRIPTION OF INCIDENT

The sighting on 1 May 1952 at George AFB, Calif., was the first of a series of nine sightings there in a three week period. These sightings were all by military personnel.

a. 1 May 1952 - Five round, disc-shaped objects, flat white in color which gave no glare or reflection were sighted. They were in formation with three in front and two in the rear. The latter two darted around in a circular or zig-zag manner.

b. 9 May 1952, 1030 PDST - An unidentified round, silver object was sighted visually from the ground and from two F-86 aircraft.

c. 9 May 1952, 1230 PDST - Two unidentified objects moving with the current or breeze at a slow speed. They appeared to be a silver metal color with a dark spot in the center and at certain angles to the sun gave off a bright flare.

d. 9 May 1952, 1720 PDST - Object was of dull color like a thundercloud. It was shaped like an arrowhead but had no known aerodynamic features.

e. 11 May 1952, 1220 PLST - Object looked like a white paper plate flipping end over end with an initial speed comparable to a jet although later it reduced its pace.

f. 13 May 1952, 1425 PDST - Single object, appeared round, shiny, metallic which glowed or reflected white or silver was observed for thirty minutes.

g. 14 May 1952, 1405 to 1430 PDST - Same description as object sighted on 13 May and by same sources.

h. 20 May 1952, 1425 PLST - A silver colored, bright, round object was observed for five minutes. Initially the object was stationary but eventually moved and faded away.

STATUS OF INVESTIGATION

Only balloons released from Edwards AFB can be tracked accurately over George AFB, consequently, for the most part they are the only balloons with which we are concerned. These balloons are released irregularly thus accounting for some of the unusual times of sightings reported in cases which are probably balloons.

The project monitor of Blue Book went to George AFB to investigate the various reports.

a. 1 May 1952 - Report well documented. No additional information obtained.

b. 9 May 1952, 1030 PDST - A balloon was released from Edwards AFB, 55 minutes prior to this sighting.

c. 9 May 1952, 1230 PLST - No known activity which could account for sighting.

d. 9 May 1952, 1720 PDST - No known activity which could account for sighting.

e. 11 May 1952 - Third report in three days from same individual. No activity in area.

f. 13 May 1952 - Balloon launched from Edwards AFB at 1340 PDST.

g. 14 May 1952 - No balloon release officially reported.

h. 20 May 1952 - Balloon released from Edwards AFB at 1332 PDST.

III. CONCLUSIONS

a. 1 May 1952 - No Conclusions.

b. 9 May 1952, 1030 PDST - Very probable that the balloon released from Edwards AFB was the object sighted.

c. 9 May 1952, 1230 PLST - Very possible that paper was caught in the thermals and swept along. A similar sighting turned out to be just that.

d. 9 May 1952, 1720 PDST - No conclusions.

e. 11 May 1952 - No conclusions.

f. 13 May 1952 - Probably was balloon released from Edwards AFB, 45 minutes previous.

g. 14 May 1952 - Description fits incident of 13 May so perfectly it is highly probable that the object was a balloon.

h. 20 May 1952 - Balloon released 53 minutes prior to sighting was probably object observed.



Statement of Observer

I, [REDACTED], Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron, 131st Air Base Group, do this date make the following statement concerning my observations on 1 May 1952:

1. The objects, five (5) in number, appeared to me to be round and disk shaped. The diameter of these objects seemed to be greater than the length of an F-51 fighter plane. They were of a flat, white color and gave off no glare or reflection. They moved in formation (as per attached sketch), with the last two darting around in a circular motion. I noticed no vapor trail or exhaust. I estimate that the speed of the objects was about twice that of an ordinary jet aircraft.

2. I sighted the objects at approximately 1050 hours and they were in my sight for about 30 seconds.

3. I observed the objects from a 20 foot control tower on the small arms range. The control tower faces north and George Air Force Base can be seen off to the left. It was a visual observation and I estimated the altitude of the objects to have been about 4,000 feet. Speed was approximately twice that of ordinary jet aircraft.

4. From the observations I made at the tower, I would say that they came from the south-east over Apple Valley, California. They headed in a north-west direction toward George Air Force Base, then veered sharply to the north and disappeared.

5. I am 23 years of age, married and have a high school education. I have spent close to 6 years in the Army and Air Force. I worked at the Rock Island Arsenal, Rock Island, Illinois, as a small arms repairman. I have been assigned to the small arms range at George Air Force Base since November 1950.

6. The weather was warm, the sky was clear, and there was little or no wind.

7. I think that weather conditions (no overcast) made the sighting of these objects easier.



I, , Jr., Major, USAF, , make the following statement concerning certain unidentified objects observed by me on 9 May 1952:


1. The two (2) objects that I observed were of a silvery, metal color with a dark spot at the center, and, at certain angles to the sun, they gave off a bright glare. They were flat and square and fluttered much as a kite in the air. They were moving with the air current or breeze at a speed described as "slow." The type of movement might be characterized as wavering. No vapor trails or noises were noticed by me.
2. The objects were observed by me at 1250 hours on the date given. I kept them in my sight for 4 minutes.
3. I sighted these objects from the surface with the naked eye.
4. At the time that I first observed these objects I was standing next to my own residence, which is located at Wherry Housing, just south of George Air Force Base. I continued observation of them as I drove north toward the base in my automobile. The objects were from 4,000 to 5,000 feet high. They appeared to be at a distance of about 2 1/2 miles. They were located west of me and appeared to be drifting in a north-westerly direction.
5. I am the Intelligence Officer of the 146th Fighter-Bomber Wing.
6. At the time that I saw the objects, the weather was calm, clear and hot, with good visibility prevailing.
7. There was no activity, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.
8. There was no physical evidence of the sighting.
9. There was no interception or identification action taken.

I, ~~████████████████████~~, do make the following statement concerning certain unidentified objects observed by me on 11 May 1952:

1. One of the 3 objects that I observed resembled a paper plate in shape and appearance and was of a flat white color. The others were too high to allow any accurate estimate as to shape or size but had a metallic glow. One of the smaller objects was not continually visible because it seemed to waver or "bob." As it turned, the sun's reflection on it would cause it to glint. The other small object was continually visible and both seemed to be in a wing formation. The object resembling the "paper plate" flipped end over end in a definite direction, disappearing into the south with a speed of a jet fighter and returning about 5 minutes later at a reduced speed. 20 to 30 seconds after the second observation had commenced, I saw the "paper plate" object make a 90° turn to the south and then it seemed to approach the two smaller objects, which did not make their appearance until the second observation. There appeared to be no interaction between the "paper plate" object and the two smaller ones. I did not notice any noise or vapor trails emanating from any of the objects.

2. I made the two sightings at 1220 and 1226. The first observation lasted 1 minute and the second one lasted 1 minute.

3. I observed the objects from the ground with the naked eye.

4. I was at the central part of George Air Force Base when I made the observations. George Air Force Base is located 6 miles northwest of Victorville, California. The larger "paper plate" object moved in a south-west direction when first sighted. When I sighted it for the second time, it was moving east approaching me and then headed south after executing a 90° turn to the right. Its altitude was between 10,000 and 15,000 feet. STATEMENT OF OBSERVER

I, , 146th Medical Group, this date make the following statement concerning my observations on 1 May 1952:

1. The shape of the objects appeared to me to be round, like that of balloons or saucers. The diameter compared in size with the length of a C-47. They were five (5) in number, three of them were flying forward and two behind. The color of the objects was silver or white. They were perfectly round in appearance and had no wings or tail assembly. They left no vapor trail or exhaust of any kind. I saw nothing on the objects that looked like motors and I heard no sounds coming from the objects. The two objects at the rear of the formation were moving in a zigzag manner. They appeared to be moving faster than a jet aircraft and disappeared at as great a pace as they appeared.

2. I sighted the objects at approximately 1045 hours and I saw them for from 5 to 10 seconds.

3. I spotted the objects from a tower which is about twenty (20) feet high. I was unable to make a close scrutiny of the objects with binoculars because by that time they had already disappeared from view.

4. I sighted the objects from the tower of the small arms firing range of George Air Force Base. They flew over the base in a north-easterly direction at an altitude estimated to be between 10 and 20 thousand feet.

5. I am nineteen (19) years old, am an ambulance driver at George Air Force Base. In civilian life I worked as a mechanic's helper. I completed the 10th grade at school and am married.

6. At the time that I sighted the objects the sky was clear and there was practically no wind.

I, [REDACTED], 94th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron, do this date make the following statement concerning my observation on 13 May 1952 of an unidentified flying object:

1. Single object; appeared round; undetermined as to ball or flat; unknown diameter; shiny, metallic; appeared to either reflect or glow white or silver; no aerodynamic features; no vapor trail, no exhaust; appeared stationary; looked away and was unable to relocate.

2. At approximately 1425 hours to 1455 hours P.D.S.T., 13 May 52.

3. Visual observation from the air at 10,500' IALT, at 150 MPH IAS, T-60 aircraft. No sighting equipment used.

4. North of George AFB, Victorville, approximately 10 miles, orbiting between Princess Pat Mine and Mojave River on heading 240° - 60°. Object was north at 60° above the horizon. I was observing, together with my passenger [REDACTED] a swept-wing jet bomber (estimated to be B47 type) making bomb runs on Edwards range east of EAFB, at approximately 35,000', runs being from east to west, left hand pattern. Object appeared above contrail of bomber by approximately 10,000' and to north of bomb run approximately 10 - 20 miles. I, A/1C ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~, Hq & Hq, 146th Air Base Group Base Flight, George AFB, California, do this date make the following statement concerning my observation on 13 May 1952 of an unidentified flying object:

1. The object was round and small and appeared to be very far away. The color was whitish but not bright like a reflection of the sun. There was only one and there was no trail as it seemed to stand still in the air. At one time the object seemed to turn on its side and become thinner for about 30 seconds. I was looking at the object and it was almost directly overhead when it disappeared. The object disappeared very fast.--Almost like a light being turned off. It must have gone straight up.
2. Time sighted 1425 to 1455 13 May 52.
Time observed - 30 minutes.
3. Visual observation from the air. Speed 150 mph. Altitude 10,500. Type of aircraft - T-60.
4. I was sitting in the rear seat of the aircraft north of George AFB about 10 or 15 miles. The object was almost above us but a little north of us. The aircraft I was in flew east to west and west to east, back and forth. The distance of the object was at least 30,000 feet above us. 

At (A) object appeared 10° above horizon of earth (flying 245°-065° heading)



Statement of Observer

I, 1st Lt. [REDACTED] 94th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron, do this date make the following statement concerning my observation on 14 May 1952 of an unidentified object:

1. The single object that I observed was round, but I was unable to determine whether it was flat or ball-like in volume. I was also unable to make any judgment as to its diameter. The object had a metallic surface that appeared to either reflect or glow white or silver. I observed no aerodynamic features on the object, nor did I see any vapor trail or exhaust. The object disappeared as my observer and I looked away during a turn.

2. I observed the object from 1405 to 1430 PDST.

3. Observation was made in the air, flying in a T-6G aircraft at 150 miles per hour IAS, at an altitude of 10,000 feet IALT. A pair of Japanese binoculars were used in the observation (CVR 7x50). However, the vibration of the aircraft prevented careful study of the object.

4. At the time of observation I was on a flight between a point just west of the Mojave River north of George Air Force Base and a point just south of Edwards Air Force Base. (See attached diagram.) Altitude of the object was estimated to have been far above 40,000 feet. Location of the object was 20 miles east of Edwards Air Force Base and it was apparently motionless.

5. I am 25 years old; commissioned for 7 years. I have had two years of college. I am a Korean returnee and have served as Flight Safety and Accident Investigating Officer with the 49th Fighter-Bomber Wing.

6. Ceiling and visibility was unlimited to the north. There were some high thin ice clouds in the area. Strong ground winds were present but were not gusty above 7500 feet.

7. No activity, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the condition. Inquiry to Edwards AFB as to weather balloon release in the area brought a negative answer.

8. No physical evidence such as fragments. However, several photographs were taken of the object by a small box camera.

9. I asked Edwards AFB if any aircraft were in the air that could be dispatched to investigate. They advised me to contact Algiers control on "D" channel. Algiers did not reply. However, Oscar Tower (Huroc) stated that an F-36 was being sent aloft. Two (2) F-36 and one (1) F-4 were observed tracking at approximately 40,000 feet on east to west headings for the next 3/4 hours.

1. Single object was described variously by the 4 observers as follows:

a. One observer describes object as being oval in shape as viewed from a low angle; otherwise round. Its color was a bright white, with a bluish hue at times. He observed no exhaust or vapor trails. Object hovered in one spot and then, as it slowly "peeled off" or turned, it displayed a reddish brown color (which may have been the color of the other side of the object and not of the proponent). It disappeared slowly.

b. Another observer's impression of the object was that of a ball of mercury. When it turned over and headed north, it revealed its underside which was dark like the top side and which was of a light brown color. Before that time it was relatively stationary. In size it was comparable to a B-29, but of a bulky character.

c. The third observer spoke of a round object, bright and silvery, like a ball. He heard no sounds, nor saw any vapor trails coming from the object. The object seemed to fade away as it moved.

d. The fourth observer reported that he was watching a jet do slow rolls at 20,000 feet when he sighted the object above and to the rear of the vapor trail left by the jet. It appeared to be stationary and seemed to be round but it was too high for the observer to make any estimate as to size or altitude. The object had a bright silvery surface. After it had remained stationary for about 5 minutes, it began to move, turning its edge up and displaying a darker side underneath. It moved at a great speed, but left no vapor trail nor exhaust.

2. All four observers sighted the object at 1745 PDT on the date indicated for a period of about 5 minutes.

3. Observation was made visually from the ground.

4. a. Location of observers: The observers were standing on the flight line at George Air Force Base at the time of observation.

b. Location: (1) The object when first sighted was located, according to one observer, due north of the flight line at a 3 o'clock position above the vapor trail of a P-47 which had recently been in the vicinity. When it began to move it did so in a northerly direction.

c. Altitude: One observer estimated the height of the object to be "very great."

5. [REDACTED] is 22 years old with 2 years of college. He worked for 13 months at Bush Aircraft, Culver City, California. During his last six months of employment there, he was a field attendant in the Flight Test Department. He has completed the 6 months aircraft and engine mechanics course at Sheppard AFB, Texas. He has flown in aircraft since the age of 18.

[REDACTED] is 22 years old and has 14 years of schooling. In civilian life he was an A&E mechanic. He is now flight chief of the T-6 aircraft for 146th Base Flight.

6. Weather conditions were: Hazy sky and strong ground winds.

7. No activity or condition, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.



I, [REDACTED], 146th Base Flight, do make the following statement concerning a certain unidentified object observed by me on 20 May 1952:

1. The object came into my line of sight while I was watching a jet do slow rolls at about 20,000 feet. The jet was leaving a clear vapor trail as it maneuvered. The object appeared above and to the rear of the vapor trail. The object appeared to be stationary. It seemed to be round but it was too high up for me to make an estimate of its size or altitude. The object had a bright silvery surface. After it had remained stationary for about 5 minutes, it began to move, turning its edge up and displaying a darker side underneath.
