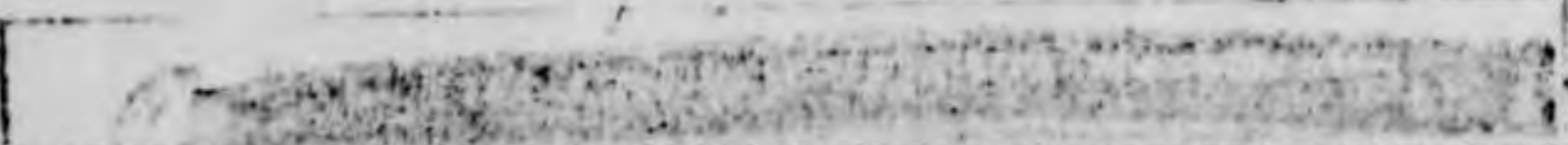

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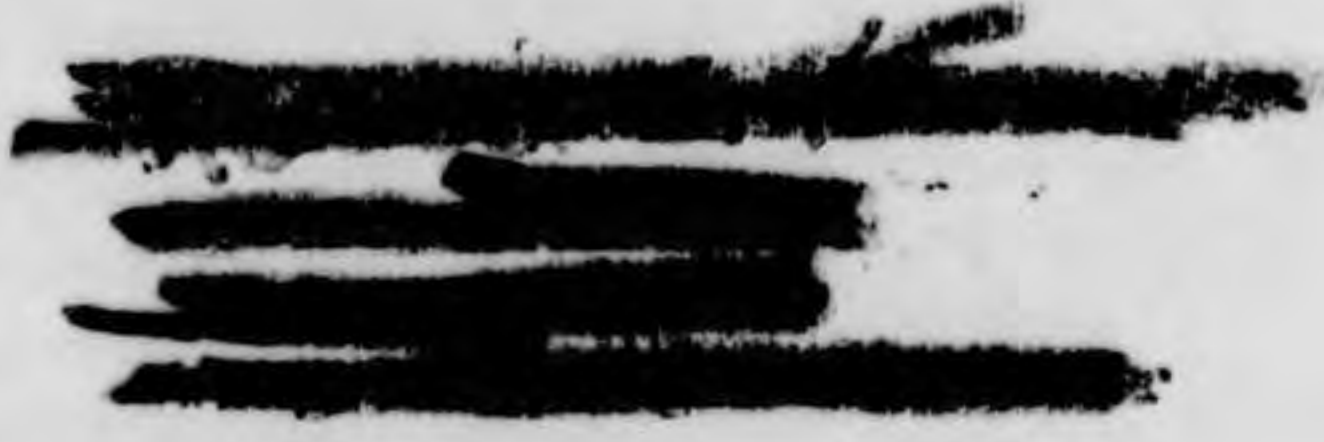

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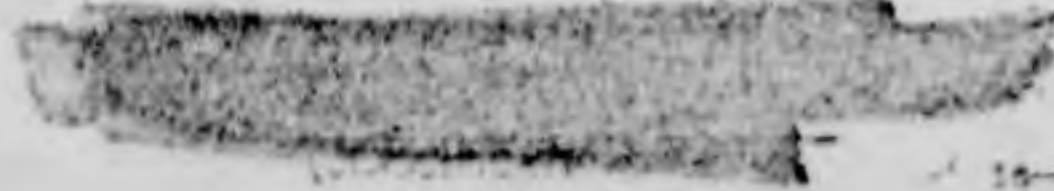

However, it was cigar-shaped and about five times as long as it was thick. It appeared to be descending at a slight angle.
