On 3 May, 1952, [redacted] presiding at the American Institute of Foreign Trade, Glendale, Arizona, were interviewed and stated in substance as follows: At 2300 hours 3 May 1952, in downtown Phoenix in a convertible with the top down, they observed an object which they believed to be a flying saucer. The object was moving west at approximately 500 miles per hour. Neither the size of the object, nor its distance, nor altitude could be determined. However, it was cigar-shaped and about five times as long as it was thick. It appeared to be descending at a slight angle. It gave off a phosphorescent white glow and emitted what appeared to be molten droppings or possibly jet exhausts. The object was observed for about four seconds when it suddenly disappeared from view. [redacted] is an ex-member of the U.S. Air Force, and [redacted] is an ex-pilot of the U.S. Navy who was formerly a celestial navigator. Both stated that in their experience with aircraft they had never seen any similar object. 




