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STATEMENT

June 18, 1952

EXTRACT

On Saturday, 24 May, 1952, I was driving east on U.S. 66 about 25 miles west of Santa Rosa, New Mexico, with my wife as a passenger, when we both observed a round silver, shiny object in the sky. It seemed to be some ten to fifteen miles away, fairly high, and to the northeast of the highway. I assume it was fairly large in size, for I am sure that it was quite some distance away, yet it was clearly visible at all times, and quite easy to see. It seemed to hang motionless for a period of some minutes, then it started to move rapidly, and disappeared in the southeast, moving away in that direction. My wife made these same observations. The time of this happening was about nine A.M. The sky was clear around the object, though there were clouds higher up.

Begin text of report on AF Form 112—Part II.) <p>One object was observed from the ground at 0900 MST on 24 May 1952 by 2dLt & Mrs. ██████████, Albuquerque, New Mexico. The observers were traveling east on U.S. Highway No. 66 and were approximately 25 miles east of Santa Rosa, New Mexico at the time of sighting. The object, which was round in shape and silver in color, was northeast from the point of observation and appeared to be motionless for 1½ to 2 minutes, then moved off quite rapidly to the southeast. The object, which appeared to be large and at a very high altitude, was observed for approximately 2 minutes. No trail or fire was visible nor was any noise audible. There were a few cumulus clouds with visibility of 60 miles and westerly winds aloft of 14 MPH. Lt ██████████ is attached to the 4913th Food Service Squadron on this base.</p>
