



1. The following information pertaining to the above captioned subject is transmitted to your headquarters, as received by this office from the 5th District OSI, Louisville, Kentucky Detachment:

"On 27 June 1952, Captain JACK WEBB, 109th CIC Detachment Louisville, Kentucky, advised that Special Agent EDWARD J. LEATHEN, 109th CIC Detachment, interviewed on 26 June 1952, Mr. [REDACTED] DEPP, Contractor, Owensboro, Kentucky, concerning instant matter. DEPP is a former Major (Engineer Corps) and presently a Lt. Colonel in the Kentucky National Guard. DEPP stated that he saw his first 'flying saucers' on 23 June 1952 at approximately 1000 hours. The sighting took place 3 miles east of Owensboro on U.S. highway No. 60. DEPP was walking north when he heard a noise similar to a flight of aircraft at high altitude. Upon looking up and ahead of the noise, he saw two round objects resembling giant soap bubbles that reflected the sun in a yellow-lavendarish light. The objects were proceeding north, flying in trail (one behind the other) and passed out of sight in about five (5) seconds. DEPP estimated the objects were at 15 to 20 thousand feet altitude. The sighting took place on a very bright, clear day. DEPP added that he was accompanied by C. C. FRYAR, who saw only one of the objects. No further pertinent information was obtained from DEPP by Special Agent LEATHEN."

Two globular dark blue objects appearing six inches in diameter, with grey centers, observed in trail at estimated 500 MPH at estimated six angles over NW Chicago. Number two assumed lead, passing number one to left before disappearing to North-east. Observer was emphatic that objects were not conventional aircraft, and wrote down his observations as to speed, maneuvers, weather, size and distance, although his report was not made to Air Force until after a "Flying Saucer" newspaper story appeared in Chicago papers.

This report is forwarded in compliance with AFL 200-5 dated 20 April 1952.

1. Two globular objects, dark blue with grey centers, appearing six inches in diameter, at estimated 6000 feet, were observed in hazy outline without visible trail or sound. Objects passed in trail from Southwest to Northeast at estimated 500 miles per hour. Number two assumed lead after passing number one to left before disappearing.

2. Date and time of sighting: 0644 CDST (1144Z) 11 June 1952. Sighting lasted for 30 to 45 seconds.

3. Observation was visual from surface.

4. Observation was made from out-of-doors in North-west Chicago, seven miles east of O'Hare International Airport. Objects were overhead and passed from Southwest to Northeast just in or below broken clouds at 6000 feet.

5. Observer, Mr. [REDACTED] Chicago, Illinois delayed his report until newspaper article on "Flying Saucers" prompted him to telephone. His description of weather tallied exactly with forecasters report for period of sighting. He appeared to have had experience in judging altitudes and speeds of aircraft.

6. Weather at time of sighting: Scattered clouds at 6000 feet, broken ceiling at 12000 feet, overcast at 25000 feet with visibility 15 miles.

The winds aloft were: S 140/09, 50 240/12, 10 290/29 15 280/35, 20 310/35, 25 310/55.

7. There is no known condition or activity which could account for the sighting.

8. No photographs were known to have been taken.

9. No interception action was taken.

10. Air traffic is unknown.

1. At approximately 2200 hours on 23 June 1952 Major John H. Ellevold Jr., HQ Sq, Civil Air Patrol, USAF, Room 378, U.S. Court House, 219 South Clark St., Chicago 4, Illinois observed from the corner of Foster and Harlem Avenues two extremely brilliant lights right near the horizon-to the southeast. These lights appeared to be at the same level quite a distance apart and without any motion. Their appearance was that of two stars. However, they were in a position where one would not normally see a star.

2. Major Ellevold proceeded south and west to the intersection of Grand Avenue and Route 83 at which time he turned south and again noticed these two objects which had by this time moved in a westerly direction. The observer continued south on Route 83 ~~at~~ and observed the objects continuing at a rather slow rate of movement towards the west. As he approached the intersection of Route 83 and Route 66 he noticed that a third similar object appeared at a slightly higher level than the other two. It had the same intense white brilliance. After turning west on to Route 66 he continued to observe the objects and saw the center one increase its altitude abruptly so that the three objects formed a very extensive triangle. Continuing west he noticed the appearance of two more of these objects which seemed to have come from the southwest. At this point all five objects formed a rather irregular line in the sky running east and west and their movement was reversed so that all five were moving eastward.

3. As they approached my Major Ellevold position on the highway he stopped his car and stepped out to observe these objects to better advantage. He assumed their altitude to be in the vicinity of 6000 to 7000 feet, each one having tremendous white brilliance similar to a light bulb when seen from a distance. To the rear and slightly above the white light was a rather intense red blinker light. He assumed these objects to be approximately 1000 yards apart in a single file traveling at a rather slow rate of speed. He heard the sound of engines which to all indications sounded more like the engines used on a helicopter. These objects to his observation were not conventional type aircraft. The brilliance of the lights as well as the position and type of blinker were not like anything now in use on commercial or military aircraft.

4. Major Ellevold reported this information to Capt. Everett A. Turner, USAF, 4671st Grd Obsr Sq. Det. 2, 57th St. and S. Lake Shore Dr., Chicago, Ill. at approximately 0100 hours 24 June 52.

5. These objects were also observed by his wife, who was with him at the time and who is also a qualified aircraft pilot.
