On the 28th of July 1952, at 2045 CST, Miss ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~, living at ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~, Chicago, Illinois reported ten (10) blue, green flat disc shaped objects west of Chicago, Illinois. The objects were observed at approximately 50,000 feet, traveling at a high rate of speed in a straight line, then turned abruptly about 30 degrees. The observation lasted about fifteen (15) minutes.

The AN/GPS 6-B was in operation, at the 755th AG&W Squadron, Williams Bay, Wisconsin. There was no electronic sighting, no visual sighting by GOC, and none by AAA observers.

The weather was dissipating low scattered clouds, high thin broken cirrus, visibility fifteen (15) miles, no restriction to vision. The winds aloft, 320 degree 25 knots.

Captain Frank J. Radzwickas, Intelligence Officer, called the Yerkes Observatory on the 30th of July 1952, in reference to the above sighting, with negative results.
