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The following account of the sighting of an unidentified flying object is submitted:

1. The object, sighted in the vicinity of Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama, appeared round and about the size of a pencil head. The single object changed colors from white to amber to bright red. There was no trail and no sound coming from the object. When not traveling in a straight line it appeared to be suspended in the air. During the sighting the object made no unusual maneuvers. It disappeared gradually.

2. Object was sighted at approximately 2310 hours (local time) 30 July 1952 and remained in view ten (10) or twenty (20) minutes.

3. Three of the four observers used field glasses (power: 7 x 50) to accomplish the sighting. The fourth observer viewed the object with naked eye.

4. The observers were located in the Maxwell Control Tower ($32^{\circ}23'N$ $86^{\circ}22'W$), facing west. The object was estimated to be 20 to 25 miles from the observers, traveling SE to NW at an altitude of approximately 30,000 feet.

5. The original observer, chief of the tower crew, claims 13 months experience as a tower operator. Two other observers were members of the tower crew, with two months experience as operators. The fourth observer was NCOIC of AACCS facilities at Maxwell. All of them claim no previous sightings of unidentified flying objects.

6. At time of sighting winds at 30,000 feet were 70° at 12 knots, clouds were scattered at 28,000 feet, visibility was 15 miles plus, temperature was 81° , and surface winds were SSW at 7 knots.

7. There was no activity or condition in the area which might be responsible for the sighting.

8. No physical evidence of the sighting was obtained.

9. Interception or identification action was not taken because of the unavailability of necessary resources.

10. At one time during the sighting there was a C-47 aircraft over Maxwell traveling E to W at 5,000 feet. An attempt was made to contact the pilot but the attempt proved unsuccessful.

SUBJECT: Sighting of Unidentified Object

1. Observation was made by the undersigned at approximately 2310 hours on 30 July 1952, from the west side of Maxwell tower, seventy-five (75) feet above ground level.

2. Object was seen west of Maxwell Field and appeared to be at a distance of more than twenty-five (25) miles and at an altitude of more than twenty (20) thousand feet.

3. Close observation through the use of binoculars revealed that this phenomenon was a revolving spherical mass similar to, but larger than, a star whose colors alternately changed from light blue to amber and red. There was no sound coming from that direction and no trails were observed. The object, definitely not a conventional type of aircraft, had a slight swaying motion similar to the one of a pendulum. Its motion covered an angle of approximately fifteen (15) degrees. It was still in the same location at 2345 hours, the time at which I left my post.

4. The above facts are true and correct to the best of my knowledge.



SUBJECT: Unidentified Flying Object

1. This is a report on the object sighted from the Maxwell Control Tower, [redacted] approximately 2300 hours Local, [redacted]

2. The object appeared to be approaching the tower from the west when I first noticed it. This situation existed for approximately ten (10) minutes. The nearest to a description I could give is as follows. It looked something like a falling star except that it was suspended. The color appeared to change from time to time from red to bright white. Observation was made with the naked eye. At times the object seemed to move about in a very agile manner. The tower operators (with glasses), during these periods were under the impression that the object was rotating. When it began to recede I kept it in sight for approximately twenty (20) minutes as the light grew dimmer. I estimate the height about twenty (20) to twenty-five (25) thousand feet. I could not venture a guess as to the distance. (I am not an observer or qualified in any way to judge distance or height.)

1. At approximately 2355 hours CST, 30 July 1952, Captain Eugene P. Daspit and Technical Sergeant James E. Hansen sighted an unusual object on the PPI scope of an AN/CPS-5 radar set located at Keesler AFB, Miss.

2. The target, which appeared on the PPI scope in a teardrop shape, was first sighted at an azimuth of 335° approximately forty-three (43) miles distant. The size of the target was estimated to be approximately that of a C-54 aircraft.

3. During the period of observation, the target was seen to travel in a general southerly direction for a distance of one (1) mile; a maneuver which involved two (2) minutes. It remained in a near stationary position for four (4) minutes. The object then began a very slow movement north for an approximate period of three (3) minutes where it again assumed a stationary position for two (2) minutes, then disappeared completely. The target reappeared approximately three (3) minutes later and began a more rapid movement in a northerly direction for approximately fifty (50) miles (from the CPS-5 set) at which point it disappeared from the PPI scope. The nearest estimate as to rate of speed was forty-five (45) to fifty (50) miles per hour.

4. The unusual maneuvers and the slow speed of the sighted object, in addition to a prevailing temperature inversion, has led the observer to advance the opinion that the target was a non-flying object. Acting upon this assumption a General Agent for the Illinois Central Railroad, Gulfport,

Mr. Cottier: Yes.

Col. Woods: This is Col. Wood out at Keesler Air Force Base. Due to the possible-for-one additional reasons that I am not able to contact anyone outside of Bullock, it is believed that you will want information and to get train times for last night in the 11th month to Mississippi. It would be between 11:15 and 12:00 between 11:55 PM last night and 12:15 AM this morning.

Mr. [redacted]: Yes, they have a train out of here every night. The train is 102. Now, I could not give you positive advice as to that time, but it leaves every night at 8:00 PM and that would be about right for the one hour time in there; but if you want me to verify that, I can find out exactly when it goes through there.

Col. Woods: I would appreciate it.

Mr. [redacted]: Mr. Col. Irving to Brooklyn-tell's when you want to know the time?

Col. Woods: You.

Mr. [redacted]: Your welcome and now can I get off the phone?

Col. Woods: Thank you, and good day.

S T A T E M E N T

Personally appeared before me, the undersigned, authorized to administer oaths in cases of this nature, Captain [REDACTED], 3398th Technical Training Squadron, 3380th Technical Training Group, Keesler Air Force Base, Mississippi, and upon being warned of his rights under the 31st Article, Uniform Code of Military Justice, and upon being duly sworn according to law, made the following voluntarily sworn statement:

"At approximately 2355 hours CST, 30 July 1952, Technical Sergeant [REDACTED] and the undersigned located an unusual blip (target) on the PPI scope of the CPS-5 radar set, located at Keesler Air Force Base.

"The target was first sighted at an azimuth of 335°, approximately forty-three (43) miles from the site of the radar set. The target moved very slowly south for approximately two (2) minutes, moving only a mile or so; it then stopped for a period of four (4) minutes; it then began a very slow movement north for three (3) minutes, stopped for two (2) minutes and disappeared. Approximately three (3) minutes later, it reappeared and began moving at a more rapid pace north and at fifty (50) miles from our site, the target disappeared completely. The estimated speed of the target was forty (40) to forty-five (45) miles per hour.

"During the observation at 2400 hours CST, the undersigned requested the two tower operators to scan the azimuth of 330° to 340° with binoculars to ascertain if they could sight any object or lights, moving or stationary. Only one star was sighted.

"A query was made by the undersigned to the Base Weather Forecaster whose records indicated that a temperature inversion was existent over the area in which the target (blip) was sighted. Further study of the position of the track on WAC 467 revealed a railroad track and highway in line with the position of the target.

"In view of the above findings, it is the opinion of the undersigned that the object sighted (on the radar scope only) was some ground vehicle and the unusual pick up was caused by the prevailing atmospheric conditions.

"It is recommended that the Illinois Central Railroad be contacted to ascertain if any trains operated in the vicinity of Wiggins and

I talked to the trainmaster's office. But that time in Hattiesburg is positive, and they figured it would be about 10:30 through Wiggins, 11:00 through Brooklyn.

"At approximately 2355 hours, CST, 30 July 1952, a target was sighted at an azimuth of 335° at forty (40) miles, on the CPS-5. There was no movement of the target for approximately two (2) minutes when it moved two (2) miles in a southern direction. It stopped at this new location and then moved directly back to its original position. The target then started to move in a northeast direction and was lost from sight at an azimuth of 345° at fifty (50) miles. The time the target was lost was approximately 0010, CST, 31 July 1952. An investigation was then initiated by Captain [redacted]

#3. Because we could no longer see the trail movement from the west window in home where we first saw it, my little girl and I walked hurriedly out of the house (which faces to the south) and watched on the front lawn until above trees and in distance in the southeast it was lost to our sight.

#10, Trail was first seen through window glass and afterward through open space.

#13. "Did the object look Solid?" It did look solid slightly thinner at bottom, or the beginning, where there could be seen a very tiny bit of blue between the white, at which point I also termed the "twisty" movement of the white was noticed, as per Question #25, also.

What impressed me was the distinct edges, and straight edges of the white trail both as it came down from sky and disappeared into or behind cloud and also as it reappeared when the narrow appearing movement was going southeastward. In some years past I have seen airplanes make smoke-writing for advertisements but by contrast this differed in that advertisement writing would be more distinct at the beginning near the plane and then widen out considerably and fade away. The white trail movement as referred to throughout this Questionnaire seemed all the time confined to an even width and only faded out at the extreme end.

At 3:19 pm on Wednesday, July 30, 1952, I was sitting at a table by a picture window and my little five year old daughter called my attention to something in the sky at about a 50° angle toward the southwest which appeared to be coming directly down from the clear, blue sky above. The sky beneath appeared blue and the movement seemed very steady or even. The trail it left behind appeared white, thick, like fleecy white clouds, and not over four inches wide. Then, going straight down, disappeared into a large white cloud, sort of greyish, toward the east.

We watched to see if something would come thru the cloud but it did not appear in the blue sky beneath the cloud but instead, after a short time, about two minutes, we saw the movement with a sort of "twisty" appearance going horizontally instead of straight down and behind it left only the appearance of thick, fleecy solid white, the width to the eye now only about like a clothes line behind and going into blue sky toward south a little but much more toward the east. We went outside in front of our house which is south facing on East Mankato Street.

Then, because of trees across the street, it was lost to sight toward the southeast at an angle of about 35° at 3:26.

The white trail did not seem to widen as it disappeared but rather faded out slowly from top part or rear end as trail moved southeastward.







At approximately 2235, facing southwest, he saw an object moving across the sky at a speed less than that of a jet but seemingly greater than that of a conventional aircraft. It had no blinking lights on its wings and no flaming exhaust. It had some type of motor, as a hum was heard which seemed to be a hundred yards behind the object. Its color was red in distinction to the stars, which were yellow. The size seemed to be that of a star and the shape appeared to be round. It did not seem to be burning, yet the entire object cast a reddish glow. It appeared to be flying at an altitude of between 3,000 and 6,000 feet. It disappeared after being visible for a period of about one minute.

At 1920Z on 30 July 1952, the pilot of an F-89 aircraft while flying on a routine test hop contacted the GCI controller at Caswell, Maine, for practice intercepts and Airborne Intercept Training. The aircraft vectored to what the controller called a " Meteorological Object " in the vicinity of Mars Hill, Maine. The aircraft was flying at the speed of 450 knots per hour at an altitude of 34,000 feet. The object appeared to be at least 10,000 feet higher and no maneuvers or hostile acts were observed about the unidentified. It appeared to be balloon-shaped, smooth, and nothing protruding from it. It was of a white translucent color. The observer is an A-1 source.

At 1507 EDT, 30 July 1952, Houlton, Maine Radio notified Presque Isle Tower of call from Maine State Police of reported civilian sighting of unidentified flying object over Monticello, Maine ($46^{\circ}18'N$ - $67^{\circ}50'W$). The OSI at this station was advised of this report and every effort has been made to contact the individuals reporting this sighting. This has proved to be unsuccessful. The following information was relayed to Presque Isle Tower concerning civilian report:

Shape - unknown

Size - approximately 200 feet wide

Manner of Observation - no report

Speed - unknown

Length of time observed - unknown

Altitude - reported object as being just above clouds. Base Weather Station reported clouds at time of reported sighting to be 5000 scattered

Air traffic in the general area at the time of sighting was one Canadian helicopter which had departed this station at 1357 EDT and landed at 1455 EDT. Pilot reports having been in the vicinity of Houlton ($47^{\circ}07'N$ - $67^{\circ}51'W$) approximately 13 miles (statute air miles) south of Monticello.

Taking into account the reported route taken by the Canadian helicopter following take-off from this base, it is not unreasonable to assume that the reported sighting may have been that of this helicopter. The evaluation placed upon this reported sighting is F-6.

At 1515 EDT, 30 July an F-86 aircraft from 75th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron was vectored to investigate a "meteorological object" in the vicinity of Presque Isle Air Force Base. The pilot reports having sighted object approximately 20 to 25 east of this base at 15,000 feet for approximately 15 minutes. Object appeared as a white speck and pilot stated it was a weather balloon approximately 6 feet in diameter, white and tear-drop shaped. This balloon was observed from 2,000 feet below object.

At 1545 EDT a second F-86 aircraft observed an object 80 to 90 east of this base at 37,000. Pilot description identical with first pilot report and also identified as weather balloon. Pilot stated he could not get closer than approximately 3 miles to object at 40,000 feet.

Local weather at the time of sighting as received from the Base Weather Office was as follows:

5000 feet scattered, 20 miles visibility, temperature 74° , dew point 50,
Wind SW 9 knots.







① Description of what I saw:

It was still daylight and off to the west (slightly north) in a light western sky an extremely bright, blinding white light went on. The light stayed on for about 10 seconds - with no variation in intensity or color whatsoever. When the light went out a dark object appeared coming towards us. As it came nearer, its top-like saucer shape and wobbly flight motion became evident. The saucer lost altitude (from 10,000' to about 2000') as it came and gradually took a south-westerly route (making a gradual right turn in flying so) disappearing behind a hill at about the same altitude as planes did the same day. It appeared lower than 100 ft or East of the Burbank Air Terminal).

At 0900 hours 30 July 1957, an unidentified object was observed over Orlando, Florida, by [REDACTED], Florida. Observer was standing in his yard at the above address, facing west, at time of sighting.

The object was egg shaped, aluminum colored, with no audible sound, and no vapor trail, exhaust or protuberances visible.

The object came from northwest, flying very high at a high rate of speed, and made a gentle turn to the right. The object was in sight approximately 10 seconds. About two minutes later observer saw an object flying from the southwest, at the same altitude and speed as the first object. The second sighting was approximately five seconds in duration. At 1115 hours 30 July 1952, an unidentified object was observed ten miles south of Orlando, Florida, by [REDACTED] [REDACTED], Tampa, Florida. Observer was driving an automobile north on U. S. Highway 92 at time of sighting.

The object appeared to be a disc, bright white in color, similar to white enamel, with no definite outline, and was flying straight and level, except for slight rocking on longitudinal axis. 

On 29 July 1952 at 2302 MST, 1st Lt. George E. Funk, Duty Controller, 135th AC&W Squadron, Kirtland Air Force Base, Albuquerque, N.M., observed a strange light in the western sky. In company with several airmen, Lt. Funk watched this light for approximately three minutes through a transit as well as with the naked eye. The light hovered in the sky for about ten (10) minutes and gradually seemed to fade away. No radar contact was made with the object by this squadron.

At approximately 0015 MST 30 July 1952, the 769th AC&W Squadron, Continental Divide, New Mexico was notified by Lt. Funk that an unconventional flying object had been sighted. This unit made electronic contact with the object and several people went outside of the building to look for it. The object was seen hovering under a cloud to the east. It hovered nearly motionless for a few minutes, and then, it traveled slowly in a flat circle. The object appeared to be approximately 25 miles away and resembled a large light. When the object reached a speed of approximately 200 knots, the light went out, and it disappeared towards the north. The time of observation by observers at the 769th AC&W Squadron was approximately ten (10) minutes.

A fighter (F-86) from the 93rd Fighter Interceptor Squadron was scrambled in an attempt to intercept the object; however, no sighting was made by the fighter.

The reliability of the observers making the above sightings is considered good.





1. An unidentified flying object was observed twenty-three miles north of Jacksonville, Florida, 30 July 1952. Sighting occurred at 0336EST and the object was visible for a total of 4 or 5 minutes.

2. The object was sighted from the Eastern Airlines Flight 635W, a constellation, while passing the St. Mary Fan Marker. The aircraft was making a speed of 260 knots at 3,000 feet when sighting occurred. The object was described as a stationary, extremely bright amber light, which after 2 or 3 minutes accelerated to an extremely high speed and headed in a westerly direction. The object was first observed off the left wing of the constellation, then moved directly in front of the aircraft and disappeared from view off the right wing. It appeared to be 10 miles from the constellation.

3. Weather in the area at the time of sighting was clear, visibility 12 miles, winds aloft 3,000 feet, 260°, 18 knots.



1. An unidentified flying object was observed near Sunland, California, 30 July 1952. The sighting occurred at 1825PST.

2. The witnesses were seated on a porch in Sunland, California, watching planes arriving at Burbank, California, when they saw an intense white-blue light in a cloud to the north northwest. The light burned for about seven seconds. Both witnesses then saw a saucer shaped object approaching south southeast, the same as landing aircraft, at about the same altitude but at a speed which appeared faster than that of a commercial DC-6 still in the vicinity of the airport. The object had a wobbly sort of motion and a saucer like shape. It turned to the right, following the path of approaching aircraft and disappeared beyond the hills. The witness is a Douglas engineer and states the object appeared at least as large if not larger than a DC-6.

3. Weather in the area at the time of sighting was clear with 10 miles visibility. Winds aloft at 5,000 feet from 130° at 5 knots; 10,000 feet from 200° at 7 knots; 16,000 feet from 180° at 9 knots; 20,000 feet from 150° at 15 knots.

4. Witnesses: Mr. [REDACTED] Los Angeles, California, telephone [REDACTED] and an unidentified woman.

5. There were numerous planes flying in the vicinity of Burbank at the time of sighting. Burbank tower does not keep a log of their landings and take-offs; therefore, an accurate check of air traffic could not be obtained.

1. Present employment of the witness indicates adequate aerial observer qualifications. Witness was not interrogated.



From the size ^{approx} of the object at its closest point of observation I judge that it was about 100' in diameter and about 30' thick at the center. I base this on the very large plates appeared at a similar distance on the same evening.

② What I believe:

This sighting, because of the bright light seen and then the dark object in a light sky moving against the wind, pretty well excludes the balloon, mirage, reflection, illusion, temperature variations, auto lights, fireball, or similar type of conclusions.

It is obvious to me that what I saw is the same type of craft which ~~was~~ of Salem, Mass. - the counterpart not photographed on July 16, 1852 and the same type of craft which was photographed in ~~Brazil~~ Argentina (I think) and was featured in one of their magazines.

I believe these craft are from another planet.
