At approximately 2240 hours, on 21 July 1952, I was returning from checking the Base Nursery. I was driving south at a speed of approximately 10 miles per hour. Suddenly a solid white circle of light appeared in front of me, similar in shape and color of a full moon but far more brilliant like looking at a white hot iron through a small hole. The object was not too high above the horizon, maybe 1000 feet. It rose at an extremely high rate of speed at an angle of 60-75 degrees at maybe 15,000, 20,000 feet it leveled off smoothly like an aircraft under good control would level off after a very rapid climb. The light went off suddenly like it was shut off or went in a cloud bank, though no clouds were visible. The contour was smooth (extremely or perfectly so). No jagged edges or tails, smoke, or other colors were noticeable. I was Base O. D. at the time.
