**SPOT INFORMATION REPORT**

1. SYNOPSIS: Disc-like objects observed flying southeast of Chicago, approximately 0640 hours, 22 July 1952, at such high speed altitude, speed, and confirmation could not be accurately described.

2. DETAILS: [REDACTED], Chicago Tribune, telephonically advised this office that he had been informed by Mr. [REDACTED] employed in the Baking Department, National Biscuit Company, Chicago, that at 0640 hours, 22 July, while driving on Humboldt Boulevard, Chicago, he observed two (2) disc-like objects flying southeast towards Lake Michigan. However, the objects disappeared so rapidly he was unable to make any estimate of altitude, speed, or confirmation.

3. ACTION: Two (2) copies of instant report being forwarded direct to the Commanding General, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.


1. SYMPTOMS: Five (5) or seven (7) luminous spots flying in sky about 2115 hours, 24 July 1952, approximately forty (40) miles north of Chicago.

2. DETAILS: [REDACTED], Attorney, [REDACTED] Boulevard, Chicago, telephonically advised this office that about 2115 hours, 24 July 1952, while attending a Ravinia Concert (outdoor concerts held approximately forty (40) miles north of Chicago on Lake Michigan), he saw five (5) or seven (7) luminous spots in the sky flying in an irregular, horizontal line. The "spots" appeared to be traveling from south to north at the zenith. Mr. Bevier heard no noise and could make no guess as to the altitude except that they were very high. He estimated the speed from about 1500 to 2000 miles per hour.

3. ACTION: Two (2) copies of instant report being forwarded direct to the Commanding General, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.

1. Four distinctly grey, round objects in formation (elements of two, stepped up) observed at fast rate, constant rate of speed. There was no sound and no visible trail or exhaust. The size was similar to a silver dollar at arms length.

2. The sighting was at 2230 CEST, 22 July 1952. The duration of the sighting was 2 minutes.

3. The observation was visual from the surface.

4. The observer was located at 8032 S. Winchester Chicago, Illinois. The object was due south of observer at an elevation of 60° to 70°. The object was traveling from E to W.

5. The observer was Mr. Larry Seborg, who was a former T Sgt in the 12th A.F. He claims to be completely familiar with air craft. His wife also observed these objects.

6. The weather was clear, visibility 15 miles and a slight temperature inversion at 45,000 feet. Winds aloft:

10. Local traffic is unknown, no air craft airborne from this station.
