While on patrol at location, two bright objects were observed in the southern skies, at the same altitude. The objects appeared to be stationary and then suddenly they appeared to descend toward the western horizon, for approximately five seconds, then stop and appeared to remain in that position for a few seconds. At this time one of the objects appeared to move in an easterly direction and travelled at a moderate rate of speed and parallel to the horizon, for approximately 10 seconds. At this time it appeared to turn in a southerly direction and disappeared from view.

The other object remained stationary for approximately 10 minutes and started to descend toward the horizon in downward pendulum like motion and disappeared from view.

The above object was witnessed by Mr. & Mrs. ~~_____~~, at location of Undersigned.

At 11:40PM, date, ~~_____~~, State Fish & Game Warden, called desk and reported seeing the above objects from his home. His description of objects and their motions coincides with above statements of Undersigned.

At approximately 11:45PM, date, ~~_____~~ called station and reported seeing a strange object in the sky, over the Lake Hughes Area. C.A.A., Palmdale, was notified of the above and they in turn notified the U.S.A.F., George Air Base.

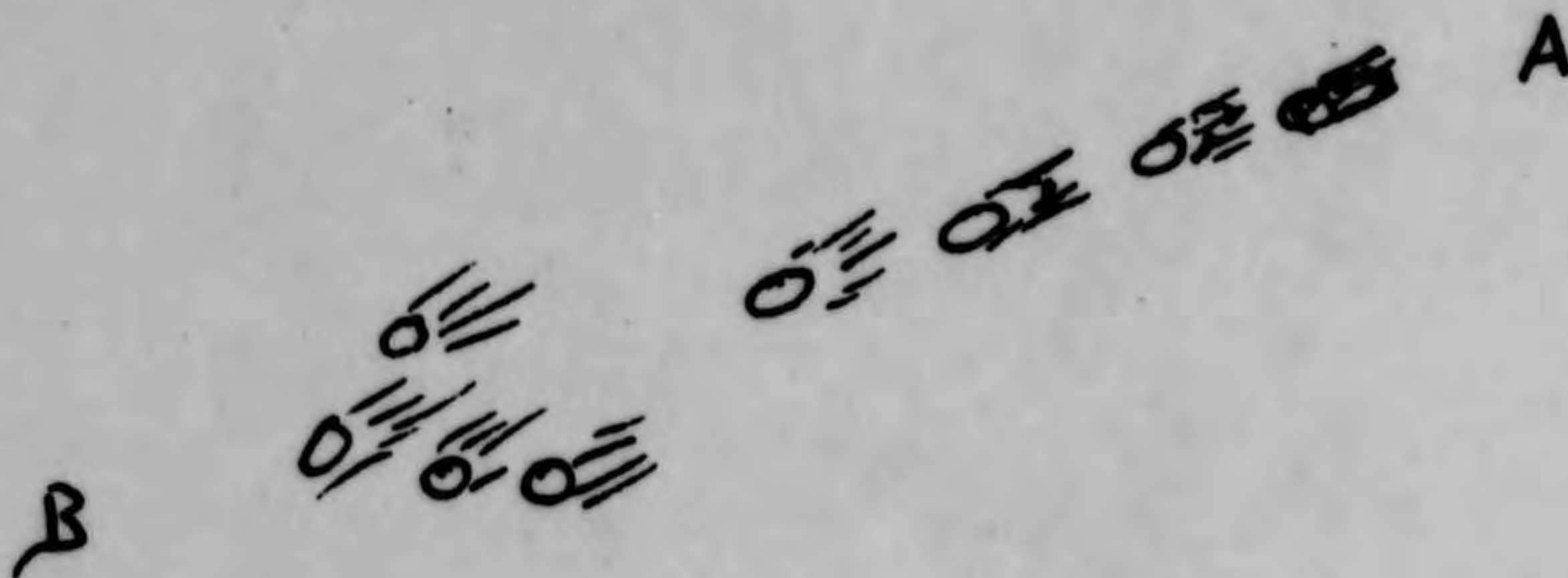

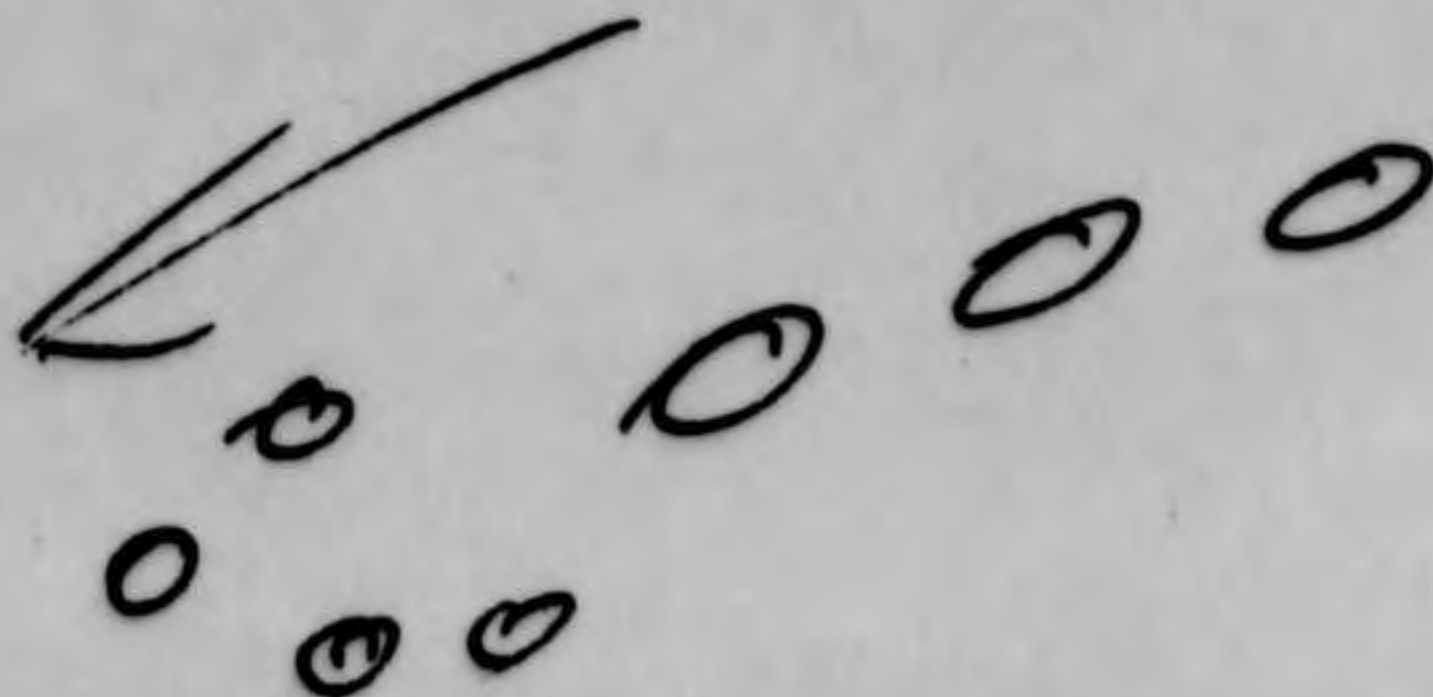

It is reported from Boon that a German expert, a witness will give information in the next issue of Der Flieger about a flying saucer which is stated to have landed in Spitzbergen and been examined by a Norwegian rocket-weapon expert.

A few hours after the landing experts arrived and were certain it was not manned and consisted, in the main, of a disc of steel of unknown (alloy) composition. The diameter was 48.44m. An outer ring was fitted with 46 jet motors which cause the disc to rotate round a sphere in the center of which there are instruments for measuring and remote control steering. These are stated to have Russian markings. The expert found an undamaged observer and sender instrument with a plutonium core in the wreck which on all wave-lengths sent out on a frequency of 934 Hertz, unknown in any country.

The announcement has caused a great sensation in professional circles in West Germany. No confirmation has been obtainable, but it is rumored that the witness is well informed since German experts, have also been consulted.

The chief of the Norwegian Defense Staff and Swedish experts have no knowledge of and are skeptical about the information.

A telegram stated that an aircraft flew over a North Norwegian district on 6 Aug 52 and release 4, apparently round, objects which continued on a northerly course at about 5,000 m. height. No Norwegian aircraft were up at the time.

(b) Witness stated that his information is based on authentic data, states that at 4 a.m. on 1 Aug 52 a flying object was observed over the southern Black Forest, at Herrenalb, in clear weather. It appeared as a shining body of light traveling from East to West at high speed. The noise it made was like that of a turbine: it left a trail of light.

Witness is convinced that the apparatus is of German origin and has been appropriated by the Russians.

(c) A flying object, round like a ball at the forward edge, was seen at Rovaniemi, in Finland, on the evening of 10 Aug 52. Its color was a clear green and it left behind a red glow which soon disappeared.

1. The flight object of 28.88 meters diameter, conical to the outside, was unpowered.
2. The silvery disc of circular shape, built from a metal of not yet known composition, carries 46 equally spaced automatic circular nozzles at the periphery, which turn the disc, when in operation, with reference to the central plexi glass sphere, which houses instrumentation for measurement and remote control.
3. The dials and instruments have Russian figures and symbols.
4. The range of the disc seems to be better than 30,000 kilometers, the flight altitude 160 kilometers.
5. The aircraft, resembling the telltale flying saucer, possesses enough space for a warhead with high explosive, eventually for an A-Bomb.

The Norwegian specialists believe that the disc was launched in U.S.S.R. By a transmitter or perhaps receiver breakdown it impacted on Spitzbergen and destroyed itself partly by the crash landing. The strange remotely controlled, unpowered jet aircraft will be transported via ship to Narvik for further investigation.

The German V weapon designer, Riedel, explained when receiving a description of the disc: "That is a typical V7, on the mass production of which I have worked myself."

REMARKS BY RIEDEL

As usual, this report contains a nice collection of nonsense. I have, nevertheless, translated as verbally as possible. The "unknown" 934 Hertz, the statement about range and ceiling altitude, etc., have to be consumed with a pound of salt. The last paragraph quoting my name and the V7 is pure invention or a direct misrepresentation of the "famous" scientist from Tel Aviv Dr. Mieth. He has stated in German papers that Germany, specifically Pennemuende, was developing a V7, which resembled the flying saucer of today.

Two unidentified flying objects described as "saucers", one remaining stationary over Lancaster, California, and one over Leona, California, stationary at times then moving slowly along the horizon and accelerating out of sight to the South, were observed at 2223PST on 1 August 1952. This sighting was accompanied by a report from sheriff station personnel in Palmdale, California, who observed a brilliant red light 25 miles south of Lancaster during the period 2206PST and 2220PST.

1. A sheriff's patrol at 2223PST on 1 August 1952 observed two flying saucers, one remaining stationary over Lancaster, California, and one over Leona Valley, California, hovering, stationary at times, and moving slowly along the horizon, then accelerating out of sight to the south. The Leona Valley object appeared 15° above the horizon then dropped to 5° and then disappeared rapidly below the horizon. Sheriff station personnel in Palmdale, California, observed a brilliant red light 25 miles south of Lancaster between 2206PST and 2220PST. One of the witnesses in the Palmdale sighting spent six years in the Navy as a pilot and stated that the sighting could have been an aircraft; however, he could see no normal identification lights.

2. Weather in the area at the time of sighting was clear, visibility 15 miles, winds aloft at 10,000 feet from 180° at 13 knots, 20,000 feet from 200° at 17 knots, 30,000 feet from 210° at 18 knots.

3. Witnesses: Mr. William D. Mallette, Sheriff's Office, Palmdale, California
Mr. T. M. Morrisity, Sheriff's Office, Palmdale, California.

4. Air traffic in the area at the time of sighting was one Navion westbound over Palmdale at 2231PST and one C-46 eastbound over Palmdale at 2236PST.

Comments of Preparing Officer:

1. Sheriff Mallette's six years experience as a Navy pilot should adequately qualify him for making accurate aerial observations. Witnesses were not interrogated. No interception action was taken by the 27th Air Defense Command Division and no object sightings were reported from radar sites.

FTD-5 -8-M In compliance with the request of Major Herman on 2 August 1952, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Sub-station was contacted on that date and the two (2) sheriff's deputies who reported sighting the "flying saucers" on 1 August 1952 were interviewed. The interviewing officer was Captain Paul E. Shoemaker of the Air Force Flight Test Center. The written report made by the two (2) deputies is inclosed with this message as well as the report of the interviewing officer. It has not been possible to correlate this report with any operation from Edwards Air Force Base. The only operation of the Air Force Flight Test Center during the approximate time period was a flight of one (1) F-94C in the general area of the sighting. However, this aircraft landed at Edwards Air Force Base at 1115 Pacific Daylight Saving Time whereas the initial sighting was reported at 1118 Pacific Daylight Saving Time. It is believed that the inclosed reports are self explanatory.

Verbal questioning substantiated the details set forth in the attached Sheriff's Office report prepared by deputies W.D. Mallette and T.M. Morrissey.

The following additional facts were obtained:

The sky was very clear; no clouds were visible in any direction and the moonlight was very bright.

The objects appeared to be white-yellow lights, elliptical in shape with hazy outlines.

Size of the objects was about that of a baseball.

No noise from the objects was discernable.

The objects appeared side by side about 20 degrees above the mountain horizon in the south. They then moved west in formation at the same time descending to about five degrees above the horizon. One of the objects remained in this position while the other returned at the same elevation to the original position and then became dimmer and disappeared from view. The one remaining in the west descended slowly with a pendulous motion for about 14 minutes until it disappeared below the horizon.

The horizontal movement of the objects was described as, "drifting."
