Object shaped like a lifesaver with black smoke emitting from the top traveled in reciprocal arc of 15°, A/C which searched area found nothing.

At 0310 hours I saw a light coming from overhead and going in a north-west direction, I saw it for about 5 seconds disappear for 3 or 4 seconds and reappear for another 5 seconds going in the same straight line and then disappearing completely.

At approximately every five minute interval after that until 0330 hours I saw a similar light going through approximately the same motions. We also looked to the southeast, south, and south west to no avail as the sky was obscured by clouds and the Organ Mountains.

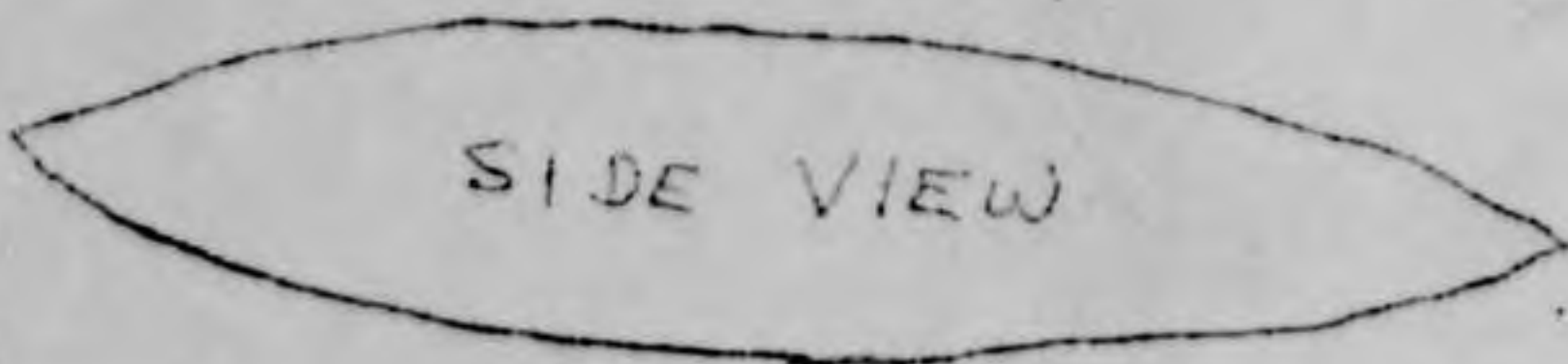

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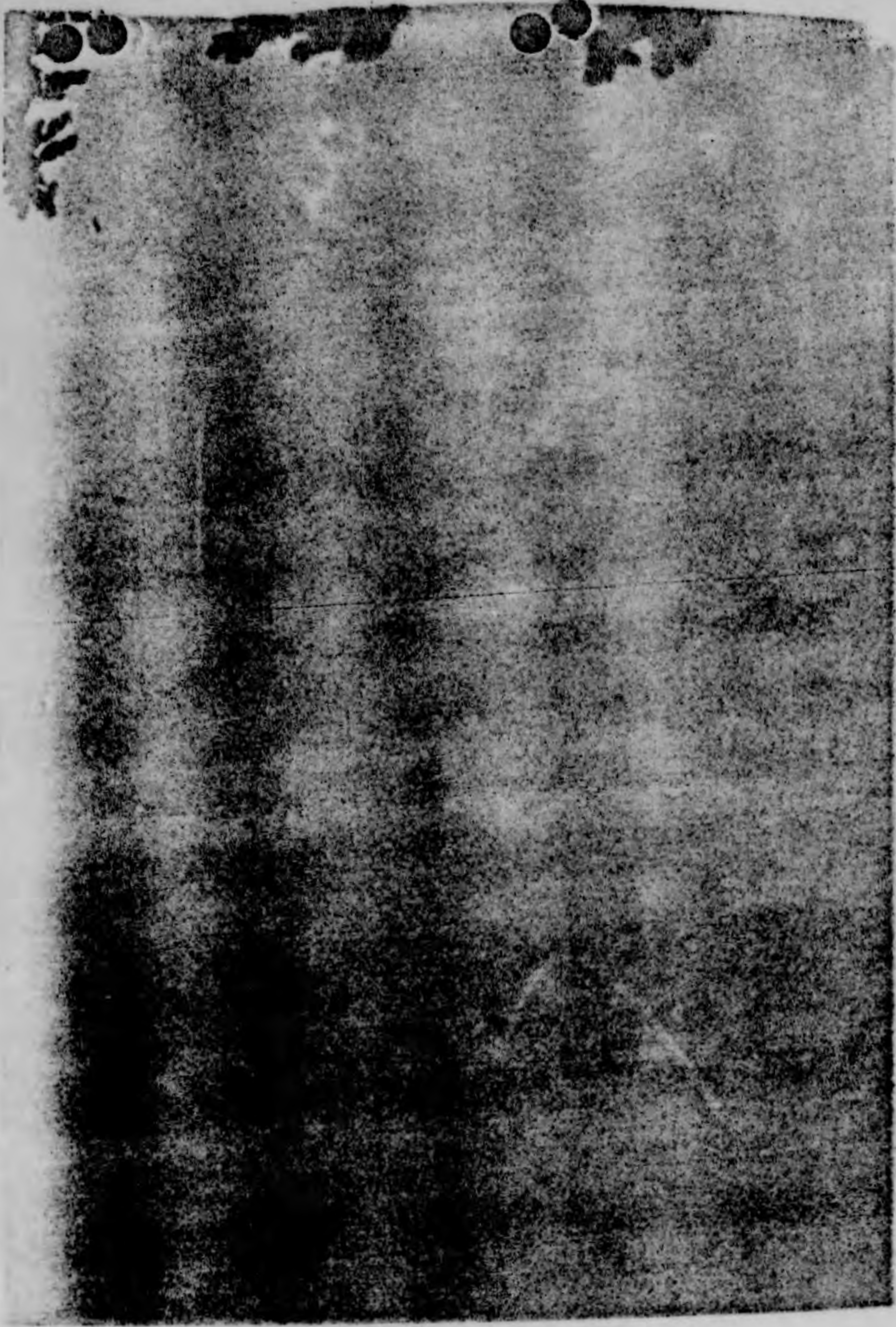
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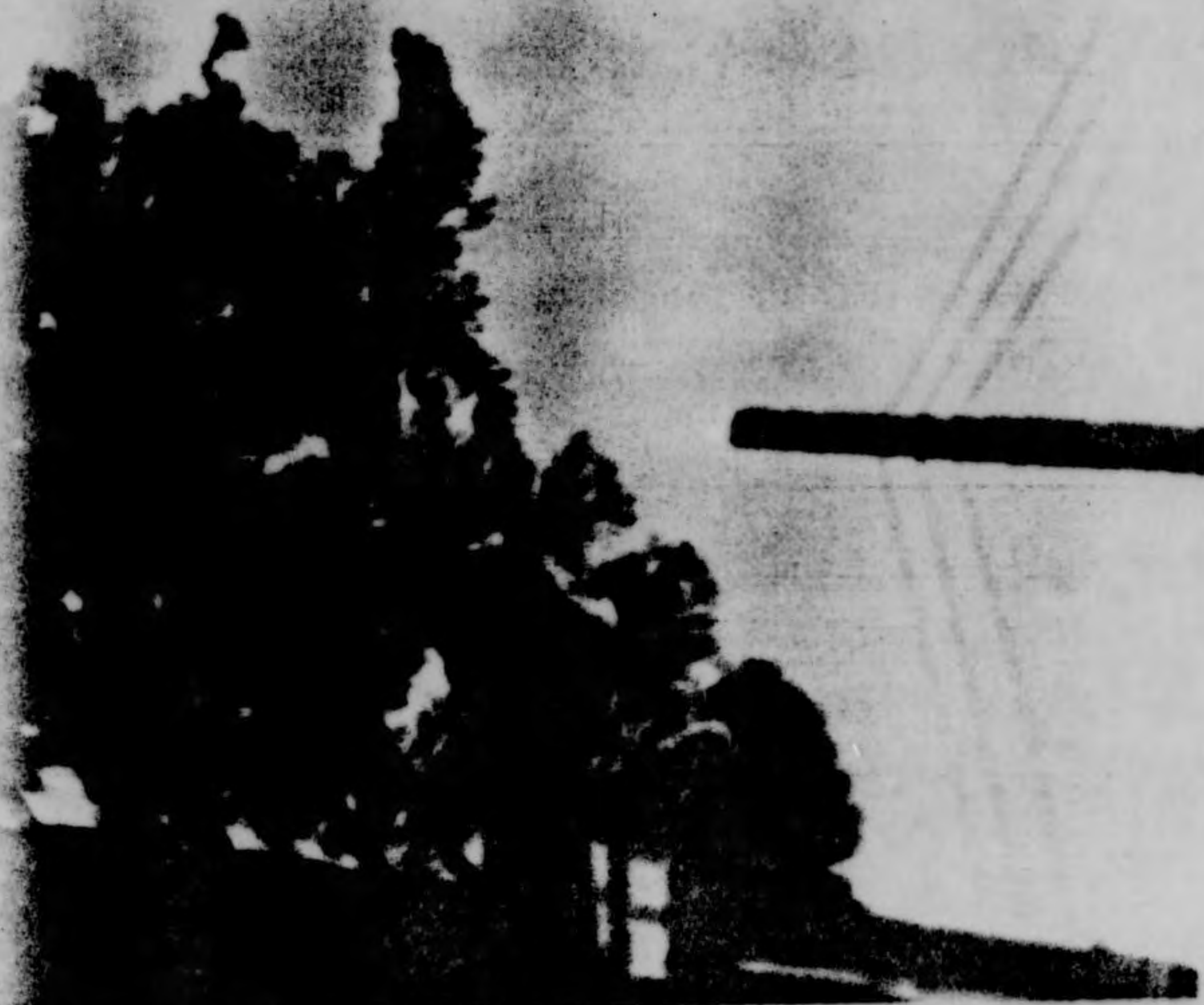


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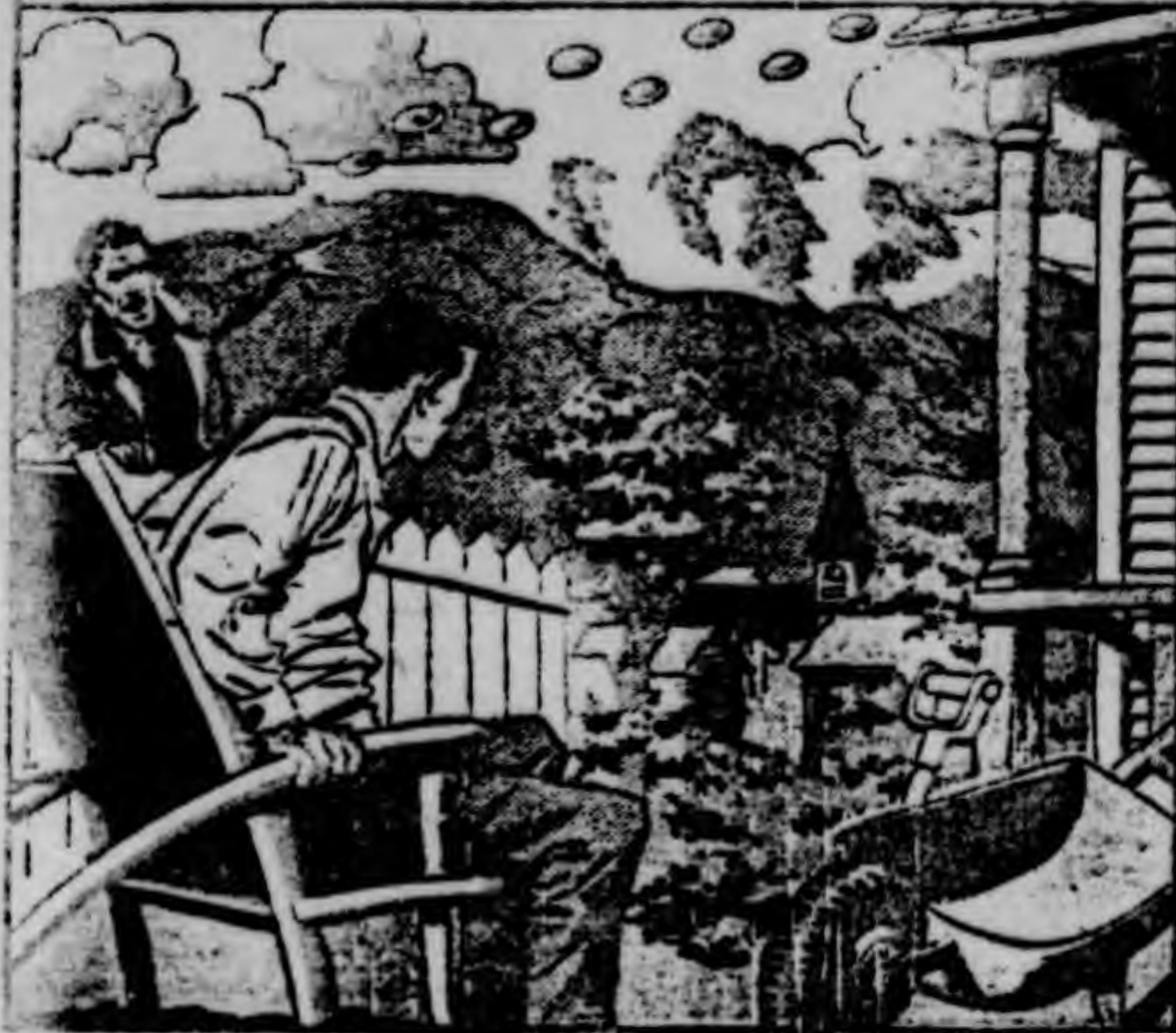






The 1952 HAMILTON A.F.B. CASE

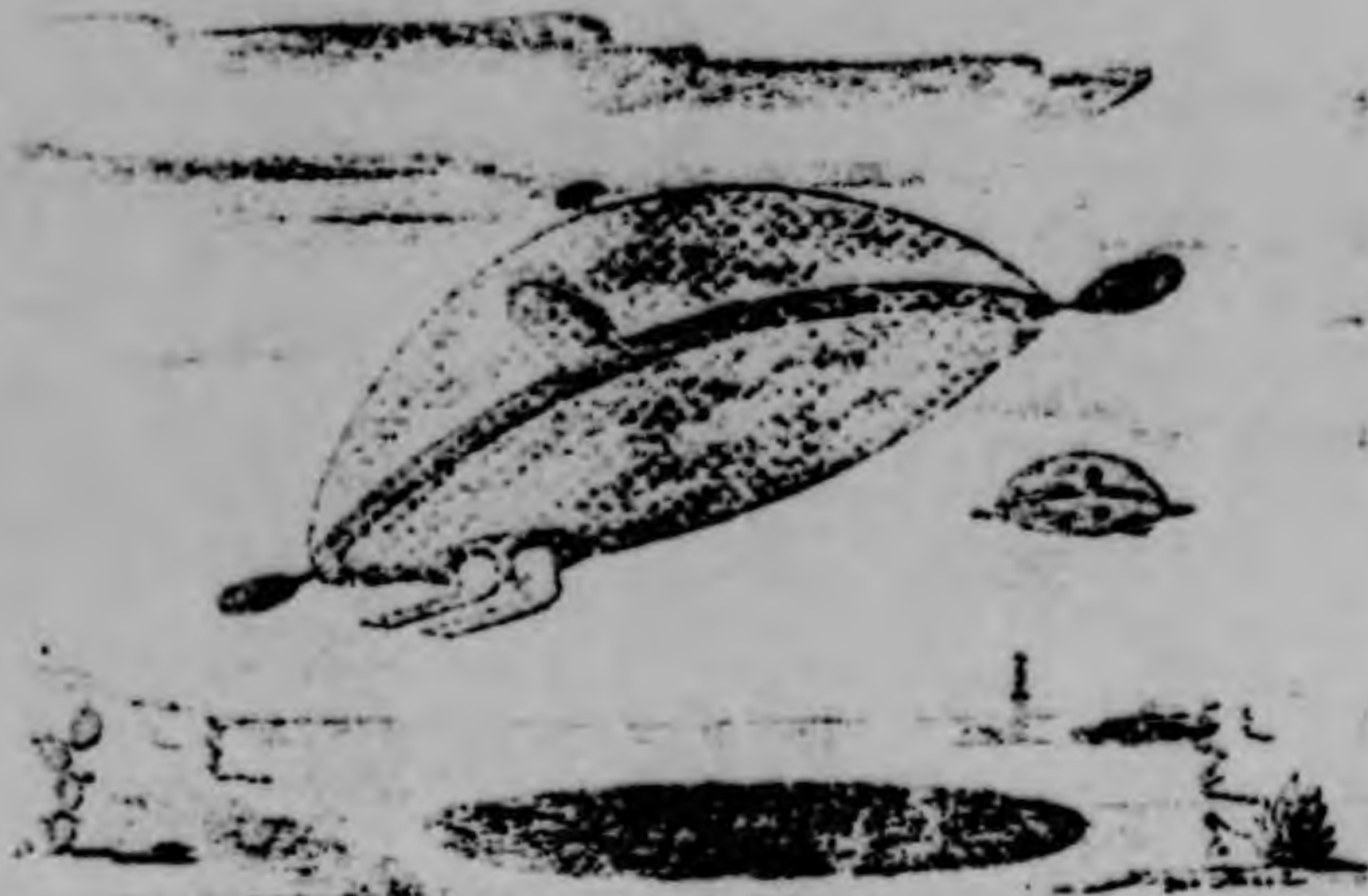

Flying Saucer "Takes" Shape Of Turtle

It was shaped just like a turtle, she said.

And with these words began the most interesting flying saucer story ever told as well as one of the most brilliant descriptions of a saucer ever given.

The story was told by Mrs. Clara Rogers, Martin County ranch woman, who observed the saucer one of the now famous flying saucers during a tour of some of her leased property near Garden City, Aug. 12, 1948.

Mrs. Rogers first observed the saucer while driving down a pasture road, returning to Garden City from her lunch tour. She stopped her car, got out and looked on the road.

"My first impression was that it was an airplane falling," she reported. However, on closer observation, I knew I was wrong.

Flying in a westerly direction, the object seemed to be "pecking in and out," the ranch woman declared. She estimated its speed to be around ten or fifteen miles per hour when she first observed it.

As the "turtle" came closer, Mrs. Rogers could clearly see its characteristics. She said the ob-

ject was just across the pasture road from her and got over 20 feet in the air. In other words, it passed right by her.

"I could have taken a picture of it," she said, "if I had had a camera. It was that close."

The top of the object was just the same shape as the bottom, except that the top protruding the lower portion by three or four inches.

She reported that the machine was camouflaged on both the bottom and sides. When asked by The Reporter's newsmen if the camouflage resembled the olive drab used by the army in the last war, she explained: "Yes, it did resemble that type of camouflage. It was sort of a greenish gray and brown shade."

The rest of the description of the space ship is truly amazing.

Mrs. Rogers grew more enthusiastic as she talked, leaving the impression that she certainly had seen what she was talking about.

"The thing had a crack or slit all the way around it," she declared, "and there were three paddle-like objects, resembling heat ears, which protruded from the phenomenon."

"These ears," she explained, "moved slowly back and forth in a smooth motion. I could even see where they were fastened on," she said.

"The machine was about ten feet long," she estimated, "and about fifteen feet wide." She said that the thickness through the middle seemed to be around three feet. She was then asked if

she thought a man could sit in the saucer.

"I believe that there was room for a man," she answered, "however, I saw no sign of any person on or about the ship."

She explained that there were no windows or door on the object and that no light shone from the crack around the machine.

"There was, however," she added, "a great sucking out of the back resembling a tailpipe. A blue flame, similar to a hot lane flame, was coming from this point."

"There was no sound at all from the machine," she said.

Mrs. Rogers explained that the machine went past her for a short distance, and then suddenly zoomed straight up in the air, again making no noise.

"That was the first time I became frightened," she said, "for the machine started rising at a rate almost too fast for the eye to see. It was out of sight in seconds."

All in all, Mrs. Rogers stated that she had observed the craft for approximately four minutes.

After seeing the craft rise out of sight, Mrs. Rogers got in her car. "I was so scared," she said, "that I had to lift my feet into the car. I drove the 15 miles, seven miles of which was on a dirt road, back into Garden City in 25 minutes. I didn't stop for a light or anything," she declared. "I was so scared."

Upon arrival at Garden City, Mrs. Rogers went straight to the Sheriff's office and reported her

tale. "I don't suppose you'll believe that," she told him, then she began her story.

After hearing the story, the sheriff sent out a search party and it is understood by The Reporter that Goodfellow Air Force Base at San Angelo later sent up some planes to search for the object.

Mrs. Rogers returned to Stanton that same day.

When questioned more about the strange object she had seen, Mrs. Rogers explained: "I have lived a long time and what I saw was certainly no mirage."

And a person, after listening to Mrs. Rogers's story, couldn't help but believe her. She told her story with all seriousness and enthusiasm. "What it was, I don't know," she said, "but I know I saw it."

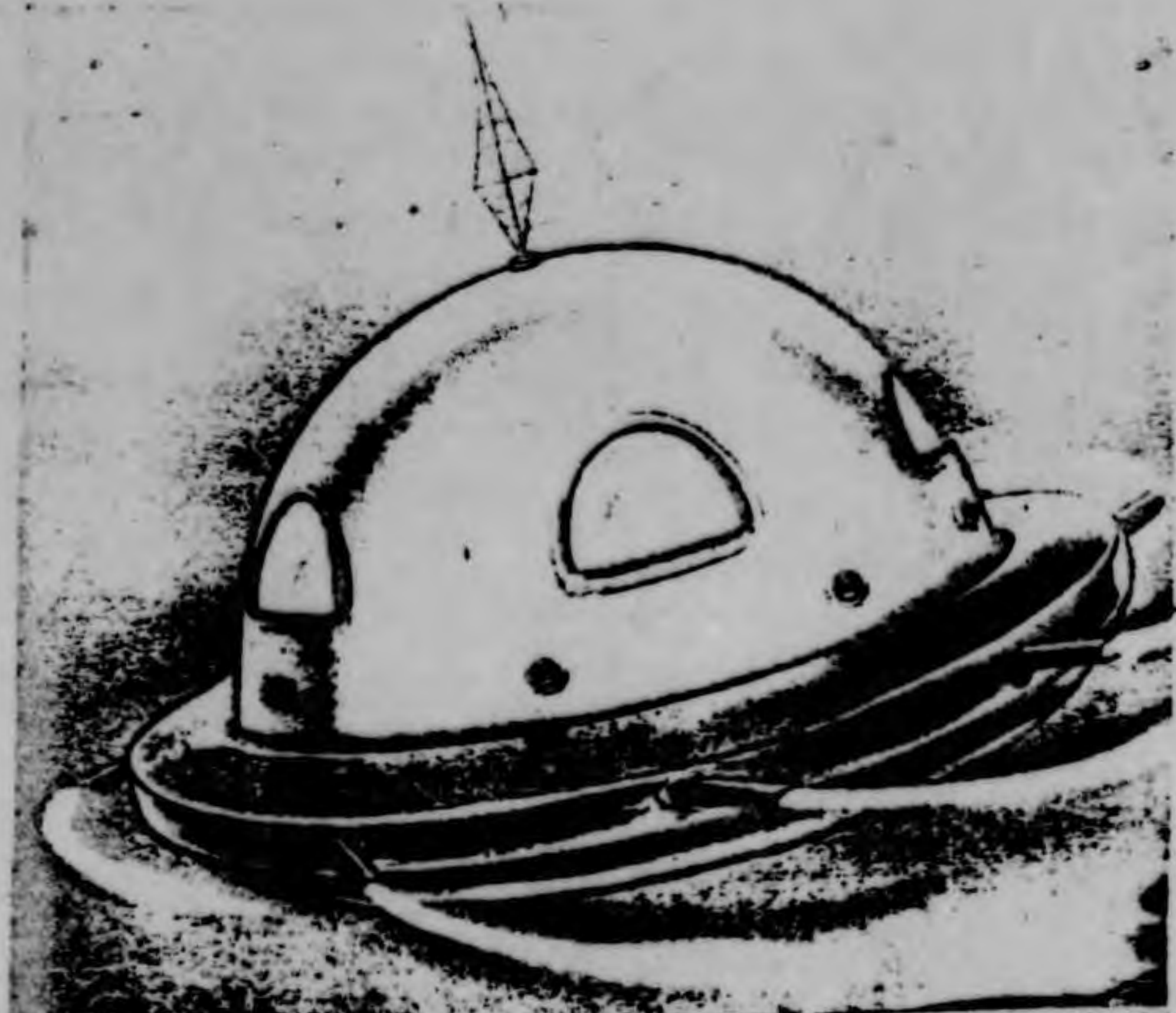
Mrs. Rogers did have her own ideas on what it was, however. "I believe it was some sort of radar machine," she stated, "and that it was taking pictures of the land beneath." She also said: "I believe that the object was fixing to land before it saw me."

And so ends another Flying Saucer story. But has one ever been described like this, or seen at so close a distance, or for so long a time?

And turtles don't fly. The flying saucer story appeared in The Stanton Reporter, Aug. 12, and as Mrs. Rogers is a former resident of Big Spring we thought our readers would enjoy this story.—Editor.

'Saucer' in Front of Car

READING, Aug. 26. — Herbert Long, 29, a Kutztown insurance salesman, reported seeing a flying saucer last night 30 feet in front of his automobile on the Allentown Pike near Makatawby.

Long, an Army Medical Corps veteran of the Second World War, said he was "too darned scared to approach it any closer."

In reporting his experience to friends here today, Long said the large saucer-like object first appeared in front of his car about a mile off the Allentown Pike on Makatawby near Mitzelburg.

It remained motionless above the earth for 30 seconds, he said, then "began to move" it "swam" away with a tremendous burst of speed.

SIGHTED BY 2 GIRLS

Two Kutztown girls, Carol Houch and he observed "some signs of activity or movement" within the swimming pool there, said today.

They saw a "white saucer" yesterday before the object took off, the girls said. The same neighborhood man said there appeared to be at that time a "white" object extending from the top of the dome or crown of the saucer.

He said there was no evidence of a landing gear or wheels.

SIMILARITIES:

(1) Both have a hemispherical shape that is rarely reported in flying saucers. (Flat discs are generally believed to be remote-controlled craft for reconnaissance, carrying camera or TV transmitters. One would assume a cone-shaped object would be carrying some object(s) that would need much more space. One immediate assumption would be passengers who need room to move about in. This seems partially proven by three windows in one craft.)

(2) Both have projections or 'antennae' on their roof tops. (Such projections are not very common, but have been reported in some old reports.)

(3) Both have rotating extensions around bottom edge. (Most saucers are reported to rotate, but are seen at too great distances to see small parts.)

(4) Both flew at very low altitudes (20 and 30 feet), for long periods (4 and 5 minutes each. (This is almost unknown in most saucer reports.)

DISSIMILARITIES:

(1) One object does not have the windows of the other. (Comment: It is possible that metal shutters covered windows. At great speeds, heat from air friction is so great that the plexiglass windows of a jet have been known to melt; the use of a shutter may eliminate this danger at high speeds. Flight at high speeds has also reached the point where the pilot has no time to correct slight errors after seeing a danger through the window; suggestions have been made that only radar or TV be used for external observations, because they are faster and more accurate, so a windowless craft may be quite feasible.)

(2) The 15' length and 3' thickness of the Texas object represents a thick disc, not a turtle or dome shape reported. (Comment: This may be an error of judgment, since in many old saucer reports, numerical measurements are very inaccurate, while the general shape given is closer to the truth.)

(3) The projections on the roof are not similar. (Comment: This may be retractable, similar to retractable landing gear in most airplanes.)

(4) One saucer's rotating side extends, the other is flush. (Comment: This also may be retractable.)

(5) The projections at the bottom edge are dissimilar, one resembling a jet turbine, the other a propeller. (Comment: This is unexplainable by any means of purpose. Mechanically, it may be to retract each for use in high or low speeds respectively, but performance of jet-powered fans, object would show it was capable of slow and high speeds. A slight possibility exists of a small error, with the extensions appearing indistinct to one observer, who seemed to resemble what they knew of aircraft. The salesman might think he saw a late model jet craft, while the ranchwoman would think primarily of propeller planes. This however, seems a very strained point of view. Of interest is the fact that the apparently tilting speed of the Texas object's extensions would not support the craft, requiring a jet exhaust underneath.)

CONCLUSIONS: The report may be explaining (1) rotating extension differences, and (2) window differences is too great, and tends to back theory we are testing with two different aircraft, although strikingly similar in many general details and performance. The study of similar reports in our files, the recall of witnesses and eyewitnesses, may clarify these reports, and will be published when received. Other landing report features will be:

FLYING SAUCERS— ARE THEY REAL?

The Air Force says they're strange natural phenomena or hallucinations. But experts claim they're spaceships from other planets.

"Bulletin 11. We interrupt this broadcast to bring you a special communique that has just been issued by the U.S. Air Force. . . . At exactly ten forty-five this morning, an ADC radar picked up an unidentified target moving at high speed southwest north of Dayton. . . .

"Two of our fighter aircraft were sent up to investigate and at a height of 40,000 feet came upon a large silver-colored sphere hovering almost completely motionless in the sky. . . .

"After several unsuccessful attempts to identify the object, one of our aircraft hauled the nose of its plane up in a stall and released several bursts of machine gun ammunition. . . .

"The unidentified flying object escaped. Both of our aircraft returned safely to their base. . . ."

If you never read this bulletin in your newspaper or heard it on your radio or TV set, it's because the Air Force didn't want to leak it.

This despite the fact that each item in it was absolutely true and fully warranted the issuance of a bulletin to the public.

This particular incident happened on the morning of August 1, 1962. . . . The USAF planes involved in it were a couple of F-105's from the 51st Fighter-Interceptor Squadron stationed at the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base near Dayton, Ohio. . . . The lead plane came back with several feet of exposed gun camera film. Upon examination by Lieutenant Andrew Fines, the film showed the silver-colored sphere clearly.

But these facts—like many others which make up the whole story—have never been told by the Air Force, leaving people to ponder in the dark!

Are flying saucers real? And exactly what are they?

The answer to these questions got locked in a big safe in a restricted office at Wright-Patterson. In a classified document entitled "Project Blue Book," it contains the official Air Force report which the Air Force is still loath to admit. It has strict orders to keep absolutely secret.

Jets  *Contrails*

Brightly illuminated advertising blimps have caused many saucer reports. But balloons are not the only air-borne objects that have been mistaken for interplanetary craft. Flying saucers reported over Durango, Colorado, early in August 1952 turned out to be four T-33 Air Force jets flying at 30,000 feet, so high that no sound reached the ground.




My name is [REDACTED]. I am a Security guard at WSPG, Las Cruces, New Mexico. On the night of 29 July 1952 at 0315 to 0400 hrs I was on duty at G Station. I was on top of the station checking the equipment. My first observation of an object in the sky was of an object of the approximate size and intensity of a star. Its velocity was similar to a meteor. It did not leave a vapor trail. The light came and went. It traveled in an arc of approximately thirty to fifty degrees. What aroused my interest was that it set a definite pattern. It started from north east directly overhead to the south east. I next saw it in the south west, next in the north west and back to the north east. It was not a continuous light, it came and went. At first I thought it was a shooting star but I have ^{never} known of shooting stars to follow a fixed pattern. This pattern continued for about half an hour when the sky became lightened at 0400 hrs the object disappeared. I have seen rockets fired at night and I have observed weather balloons at night also and jet planes and the velocity was too great to be any of these. I would describe this as a flight pattern rather than an object.

At approximately 0100 hrs on the 30th of July I was on duty at the landing area three miles from my original post at G Station. I observed a similar light. It appeared in a formation of stars in the south west. I would estimate the altitude at approximately 15000 ft. and it arched about 20 degrees and disappeared in a cloud formation. I could not estimate the lights of my

first observation due to the fact it was a clear night with
no clouds for estimate.

STATEMENT

At about 0245 on the morning of 1 August 1952, Guard [REDACTED] called me at C Radar Station to look up in the sky and see what looked like a light traveling a high speed. I went out of the guard shack and looked North. I saw what appeared to be a moving light. The first run was from a North to South by East direction. I observed some more about 3 or 4 minutes later. This light appeared to be coming from the South to North, that was the second time. I saw it streaking up above about 5 minutes later. This light appeared to come from the West to North, then it appeared from the North to South by West, and the last I saw was from North to West about 0315 hours. I observed for a while after that but couldn't see anything else.

I certify that the following statement is true to the best of my knowledge and belief. While I was on duty as the Officer of the Day at White Sands Proving Ground on 1 Aug 52, I was awakened at approximately 0240 hours by the telephone ringing in the OD's room at Post Headquarters.

I answered the telephone and was informed that it was the guard calling from building 1850 in the TECH AREA. He asked me to come and investigate something that was very important. After that, he explained the location of the building; I said that I would go. I dressed and put on my side-arms.

Prior to leaving Post Headquarters, I telephoned the telephone operator at WSPG to tell him where I was going and that if I had not returned in half an hour, he was to call the MP's and have them come to the TECH AREA and look for me. Its being Pay Day Night, I was aware that anything could have happened or that some one was playing a prank.

I was very cautious in advzncing to the building and was challenged by the guard and I identified myself. I asked him what the trouble was and he said, "Sir, we having been seeing some strange lights crossing over the Proving Grounds." I said to myself, "My God, Flying Saucers, and they woke me up for that" but I said, "Yea, where are they?" All I could see was the light beacon from Condon Field. I thought that they had imagined the "strange lights."

I telephoned back to Post Headquarters and told him to notify the telephone operator that I was OK and not to worry.

Several minutes went by and I did not see any "lights". The second guard there was the Roving Patrol in that Area.

One of the guards claimed to have seen another light but I did not see it. At 0300 hours I saw what I thought was a fast moving bluish light about the size of a second class star moving in a northerly direction. I was about 30 degrees verticle angle and of about 5 seconds duration. The guard said, "Did you see it Captain?" I said yes its moving in a northerly direction, pointing with my hand. "WELL" he said, "it should now reappear in that direction" pointing to the West. I looked, and sure enough I soon saw it reappear moving in a straight line from North to West at about 30 degrees angle of elevation and lasting about 10 seconds.

At 0305 hours one of the guards said, "There it is again." I saw it at the same time it was traveling northerly. He said it should turn and be in that area now. A few seconds latter I saw it reappear traveling in a straight line from North East to East, it was observable for about 5 seconds.
