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DETAILS:

1. This investigation opened at the direction of the District Commander, predicated upon information furnished by [REDACTED], Director, Security Division, Los Alamos Field Office, Atomic Energy Commission, Los Alamos, New Mexico, concerning the observation of an unidentified aerial light.
2. On 3 September 1952, Mr. [REDACTED], Mr. [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED], Inspectors, U.S. Atomic Energy Protective Force, Los Alamos, New Mexico, reported the sighting of a moving white light travelling in a Westerly direction -- the light varying in density from "very dim" to "near glaring". The light approached from the East -- stopped, then proceeded South at about two hundred (200) to three hundred (300) miles per hour. The light was observed by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] for approximately three (3) minutes. Color, size, shape, or odor given off by light not known. No exhaust trail was noted. The light appeared to approach observers from the East, stop, then proceed Southward -- stopping occasionally. Also witnessing the light was [REDACTED]. [REDACTED], S-Site employee. Actual time of sightings 2215 and 2245 hours, 2 September 1952, by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] respectively. Point of sighting, Los Alamos, New Mexico. Mr. [REDACTED] remarked that approximately three (3) minutes after the light disappeared toward the South, the same procedure of appearance, stopping, and then proceeding Southward by a similar light occurred.
