1. The following article appeared in the 16 September 1952 edition of the Hong Kong "South China Morning Post":

FLYING SAUCERS REPORTED SEEN OVER HONG KONG Taipei, 15 Sept.

A radio officer, whose hobby is the studying of electronics, said today that he had been able to witness the passage over Hong Kong of 15 "flying saucers."

The informant, who asked that his name be withheld, added that the flying objects appeared over Hong Kong at 1:45 a.m. on Saturday.

He said that they passed over the Colony toward the southeast in an "arc" formation. Their size were three times as big as a star. Light was fluorescent and the altitude could not be determined, but while on their way, the objects passed into a small cloud and light was seen through the cloud.

The informant said that he did not immediately report to the authorities, as he did not wish to be delayed in his trip to Taiwan. However, on his return to Hong Kong next Thursday, he would get in touch with the Royal Observatory there.

This is the first time that reports have been made of flying saucers in Hong Kong.

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2. COMMENTS of Reporting Officer:

The Hong Kong weather at 0200 local time 13 September (121700Z) was "overcast with continuous light rain."

The time of the alleged incident, 1:45 a.m. Hong Kong time, 13 September 1952, is 121645Z.

The person who made this report is so far unknown to this office. Further information will be reported if it becomes available.

## ROUTINE SAUCER SIGHT

Members of an open-air concert audience near Rocking last night reported seeing a brightly illuminated greenish-white object travelling at great speed and high altitude from north to south at about 11.15 p.m.

The object was visible for about 10 seconds. It was preceded by a screeching sound which lasted three seconds.

This is the second occasion that a phenomenon of this type has been seen in recent memory.

## SUMMARY OF APPROXIMATE DETAILS:

The facts are as follows: The reports of the flying saucer in the Malaya-Sumatra area, though numerous, were discredited by the R.A.F. (R.A.F. Joe controls). Although there has been little verification on the latter reports from Sumatra, it is believed that the "saucer" was probably an optical illusion and the sound a mere echo.
