1. At approximately 2110 hours, CST, 14 September 1952, Mr. [REDACTED], [REDACTED], sighted unidentified flying objects in the sky East of his position at the De Drive-in Theater, Pass Road, Biloxi, Mississippi. The objects were reported as being cigar-shaped and greenish-white in color. The first object appeared in sight and remained in a constant position until it began to lose intensity, which was estimated by the observer as being twice the normal intensity of the light of a cloud, at which time the object appeared to assume a half-moon shape and disappeared from sight. Approximately five (5) minutes later, the first object returned to the same position; this object remained in a constant position from 2120 hours, CST, to 2210 hours, CST, at which time it "twinkled" and the second object appeared in a similar manner, somewhat above the position of the first object. Finally, a third object appeared, considerably East of the previous two (2). The size of the objects was compared to that of the size of the moon plus four (4) inches along the circumference. No estimate of speed or altitude was given. The observer noted no trails and/or exhausts and heard no sounds coming from the three objects.

2. The sighting of the unidentified objects lasted approximately from 2110 hours, CST, until 2200 hours, CST, at which time the observer left his ground position.

Information Pertaining to Objects Sighted

1. Shape:

The shape of the objects was reported as being primarily cigar-shaped but, as the objects lost their intensity, they assumed the shape of a half-moon.

2. Size:

The observer estimated the size of the objects as being comparable to the size of the moon plus four (4) inches along the circumference.

3. Color:

The objects were described as being greenish-white in color.

4. Number:

Three (3).

5. Formations:

Two (2) objects were in the sky East of observer's ground position, one above the other. A third object appeared considerably East of the first two objects.

6. Aerodynamic features:

No aerodynamic features were observed.

7. Trail or exhaust:

No trail or exhaust was observed.

8. Propulsion systems:

None observed.

9. Speed:

No estimation of speed was given by the observer. Observer stated that the impression he received was one of merely disappearing without any sense of speed.

10. Sounds:

Negative.

11. Maneuvers:

The first object appeared, lost intensity, assumed half-moon shape and disappeared from sight. This object later returned to its former position.

12. Manner of disappearance:

Objects were still in sight when observer left ground position.

13. Time sighted:

Approximately 2110 hours, CST, 14 September 1952. The length of time object(s) remained in sight approximates one hundred and ten (110) minutes.

14. Manner of observations:

Visual observation from a surface location.

The reporting agency of this sighting was not contacted regarding the incident until 6 October 1952. Consequently, the excessive time lapse between date of information and date of report.

S T A T E M E N T

At approximately 2110 hours, 14 September 1952, I, the undersigned was parked at a drive-in theater in Belzoni, Mississippi, when I sighted an unidentified object in the sky. At first, the object appeared to be a cloud, with a size appearing to be six (6) inches long. The object, which was seen as being cigar-shaped and a greenish-white in color, radiated twice the normal intensity of the light of a cloud and remained in a constant position until it began to lose intensity. Losing intensity, the object appeared to assume a half-moon shape and disappeared from sight, straight up.

Approximately five (5) minutes later, the object returned to the same position with a gradual intensity build-up. The object remained constant from 2120 hours until 2210 hours, at which time it broke up and another object appeared in an analogous manner. Finally, a third object appeared, East of the previous two. The sighting of the objects lasted until approximately 2300 hours when I left the drive-in theater.

I heard no sounds emanating from the objects; I observed no aerodynamic features or trails or exhausts.
