SPOT INTELLIGENCE REPORT

SUBJECT: Unidentified Flying Object at Little Rock, Arkansas

1. SYNOPSIS: Mrs. [REDACTED], Little Rock, Arkansas, advised that at approximately 1000 hours on 18 September 1952, she took a photograph of an unidentified flying object which appeared in the sky, south of her home, at the address listed.

2. DETAILS: Mrs. [REDACTED] residence as shown, who is employed by the U. S. Time Corporation, Adams Field, Little Rock, Arkansas, reported to the 11th District Office of Special Investigations Detachment Commander, Little Rock, Arkansas, on 29 September 1952, that she was stepping from her front door, facing south, at the approximate hour and date mentioned, in preparation to take photographs of her dog when she observed an object in the sky. She had in her possession a No. 616 box-type camera and took a photograph of an object which was estimated to be at a distance of approximately four blocks, about the size of a dishpan, and about three stories from the ground.


Mrs. [REDACTED] described the object as being bright silver and dark in the middle and appeared to be spinning in one direction, then appeared to reverse itself and fade away, and the length of this observation was somewhat less than one minute. [REDACTED] related that the day was clear with little or no wind and the only object between her and the flying article was a small wooded area which is shown in the inclosed photograph.

The original photograph has been reproduced at this District and are the inclosures, the original having been returned to [REDACTED] per her request.

Two unidentified flying objects were reported by civilians in the Tripolitanian area of Libya on the nights of September 19 and 22, 1952.

A. Unidentified object sighted September 19, 1952:

1. A circular light with an illuminated tail, which was 20 meters in length; moved horizontally and then disappeared in a vertical climb. The object was silent.
2. Time - 2240 Local. Observed for approximately five minutes.
3. Visual observation from the balcony of a Garian building, Libya.
4. Coordinates of Garian, Libya are 3212N - 1302E. The object appeared southeast at a height of 10,000 meters. It traveled a southwesterly direction for five minutes, then disappeared in a vertical climb.
5. The information was informally reported to the Sunday Gibli, an English language newspaper published weekly in Tripoli, Libya. The information was carelessly and incompletely recorded and the published article lacked many essential details. The editor of the Sunday Gibli admitted freely to printing the article for its "interest" value.

The witness of this flying object was Mr. [REDACTED], Tripoli. Reliability undetermined.

6. Weather - Clear; visibility 15 miles - surface winds 130° 4 knots.

B. The second unidentified flying object; sighted 22 September 1952.

1. A brilliant lighted ball, about the size of a football, was sighted moving silently and noiselessly. Disappeared vertically and the light went out quickly.
2. Time - approximately 2030 Local. Observed for approximately six to seven seconds.
3. Visual observation at various locations in the city of Tripoli, Libya.
4. Traveling, in general, on a North-South line and then disappearing vertically. Sighted approximately ten miles North over the Mediterranean Sea at high altitude (not estimated). There were contradictory reports on its movement — both northerly and southerly directions being given.

5. The information was informaly reported to the Sunday Gibli, an English language weekly published in Tripoli, Libya. The information was carelessly and incompletely reported and the published article lacked many essential details. The editor of the Sunday Gibli admitted freely to printing the article for its "interest" value.

Witnesses were one English couple and a Welsh couple, all unidentified. One reliable source reporting this flying object was Ignor Oliver de Salas of the Spanish Legation in Tripoli.

6. Solid overcast 3,000'; 15 miles visibility, slight rain. Surface winds  $40^{\circ}$  22 knots. A low pressure area was centered East of Italy. A cold front, almost stationary, was joining a trough coming out of the central desert area of Africa. Both the cold front and the trough became nearly stationary in the Tripoli area.

### FLYING SAUCER SEEN OVER GARIAN GEBEL

#### Third Libyan appearance reported

Another "Flying Saucer" has been seen over Libya. This is the third reported appearance of the phenomena in Libya which when the "saucers" have appeared in other countries have puzzled scientists and military experts alike.

First reported three years ago by an American serviceman at Wheelus Field who said that he saw a disc high in the sky over the airfield, and lately said to have been seen over the Cyrenaica gebel by a party of Englishmen returning to Benghazi after a day in the mountains, the latest appearance was last Friday night at Garian.

The story comes from Mr. Joseph Mallia of 24 Via Livorno, Tripoli, who was sitting with four friends in the Government tobacco monopoly building in Garian at 11 p.m. All five saw the flying disc and watched it for more than five minutes during which time it slowed down and then increased speed, finally disappearing from sight as it mounted almost vertically to an enormous height.

"We were sitting on the balcony of the building", said Mr. Mallia to the Sunday Gibli, "when from the south east, flying at a height of some ten thousand metres, we saw a circular light approaching. It had a tail of about twenty metres long and this was also illuminated.

We knew that it could not have been an aeroplane as it flew without a sound. At first it was coming slowly towards us and we had it in view as it travelled South-West. We all saw it quite plainly. Suddenly, after we had been watching it for five minutes, it stopped moving horizontally and shot upwards in a complete vertical climb. It disappeared out of sight into what I can only think was the upper atmosphere.

"It could not have been a comet because these fly round the earth's orbit... they don't go straight upwards. Similarly this disposes of the theory that it was shooting stars because they always travel straight. As it went up was a thin tail, lighter at the top."

Following the disappearance of the object from the sky, two Englishmen were able to compare the time and the apparent, flight and altitude and completely agree. They also heard the noise of the object's motion, but the "saucer" was completely silent."

### FLYING SAUCER SEEN OVER TUNISI

"Like a football", says Englishman

Is the "Flying Saucer" reported last week in the Sunday Times, as having been seen over the Trinolitanian Ghazi range of mountains at Tarian still flying around Libya? The question is raised by two more reports of a strange object flashing across the night sky last Friday evening.

First witness, Mr. Fawzi, subject temporarily resident in Tripoli, saw a rapidly flying object travel from north to south over the evening sky. It was moving upwards at an unusual speed. The place where was seen at the same time by an English man sitting on a balcony of his apartment in the Gaddafi neighbourhood, and by a Welshman and his wife who were walking in the Gaddafi Circle.

There was no comparing of notes by the three people concerned. Two of them did not know the other one had seen it until twelve hours later. And their stories tally for time, direction of flight, and size of the "disc".

Second observer in the Omar Mukhtar - "I was sitting on my balcony looking out to sea at about half past eight on Friday evening when a brilliant light fell about 100 ft. off the coast. It faded into view, so I turned my eyes to the horizon from the south and saw a very dark

"...that's only a small portion of the whole object. It was about 100 ft. long and 20 ft. wide. It was completely indistinguishable and the angle of elevation was 45 degrees."

Third observer in Tripoli - "I was walking along the Esplanade at about 10 p.m. when I saw a completely indistinguishable and the angle of elevation was 45 degrees. The saucer was completely silent and moved very much faster."

Confirming these facts the next witnesses were a Welshman and his wife walking in the Giaddat Idris. They had arrived at the turning by the Cafe della Post which gives a view over the sea and were startled to see a brilliant ball of light flash across the opening. They guessed that it was some ten miles out to sea, and they only saw it for a second or so before it was out of range behind the buildings. It was travelling north west to south east.

Meanwhile reports are still being received confirming the details of last week's "flying saucer".

[REDACTED] the Spanish Legation and his wife reported seeing the object quite distinctly as it hurtled across the tranquil sky.

[REDACTED] said he and his wife were sitting on deck chairs in front of their Garden City villa when they saw it approaching from the south at a great speed.

"It was flying at a height," he said, "and over Tripoli it came down low, went along vertically and then shot upwards. It was a quiet peaceful night and we are quite sure it was not an aeroplane. There was positively no sound.

"My wife, who saw it a second or two before I did, says it left a glowing tail, but I did not notice that."

"It came and went in about six or seven seconds. The light seemed to go out as if a lamp had been extinguished rather than a gradual disappearance of the whole from view".

Four Italian residents of Tripoli seated on their balconies near the Tobacco Monopoly Building also report seeing the "saucer" last week.

They thought it was a meteorite until suddenly they realised it was going up instead of down.

**COMMENTS of Preparing Officer:**

Captain Morey B. Jeffrey, Intelligence Officer, 7th Air Rescue Squadron has injected the possibility that the unidentified object sighted 22 September 1952 was a weather balloon. The 29th Weather Squadron, based at Wheelus Field, Tripoli, sends up four weather balloons daily, at 0300, 0900, 1500 and 2100.

1. At approximately 1145 MST, on 17 September 1952, [REDACTED] of [REDACTED], Tucson, Arizona and his wife, observed six flat, shiny, large, unidentified flying objects in two sightings of three each. The first group of three objects appeared to be in extremely close formation, (see diagram #1), traveling in a general northward heading at an extremely slow rate of speed. This group of objects seemed to be flying through a pass in the North end of the Tucson Mountains. The second formation of three objects had the same general appearance as the first, flew in the same close formation but were traveling at a slightly faster rate of speed. Both formations seemed to fade from view rather than disappear because of distance.

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1. All six objects appeared to be of the same shape, size, and color. Mr Hollingsworth stated that they were generally flat in shape (see diagram #2), and very bright white in color. During the second sighting Mr [redacted] states that a B-50, taking off from Davis-Monthan Air Force Base crossed under his line of vision to the objects and that the total length of the formation of objects was about  $\frac{1}{2}$  as long as the B-50. Both the B-50 and the formation were below the sky line of the Tucson Mountains. [redacted] reported no flight surfaces on any of the objects, no exhaust trails and no propulsion noises although any noise from these objects in the second sighting would have been negated by a B-50 passing directly overhead at that time. The objects in the first formation were traveling on a general northwest straight line course at what appeared to be a very slow rate of speed. The second formation was traveling on a southwesterly course at a faster rate of speed than the first formation but much slower than any airplane in his experience.

2. Time sighted: 1st Formation 11:38 lasted for about one minute.  
2nd Formation 11:40 lasted for about one minute.

3. Manner of Observation: Visual only. [redacted] was wearing dark, polaroid glasses and was able to see the objects for a longer period of time than his wife who wore no glasses.

4. Location of Observer: 1st Sighting  $32^{\circ} 08' 40''N / 110^{\circ} 57' 20''W$  ✓  
The two formations were observed Northwest of the observers position. The first group of objects appeared to be passing between the last two peaks on the northern end of the Tucson Mountain Range. The distance, if the observers judged correctly would be about 22 miles.? The second formation appeared near the southern end of this range of mountains and below the sky line (see diagram #2).

5. Identifying Information on Observers:

a. [redacted] is 36 years of age, in good physical health and above average in intelligence. He is at present a salesman for the Empire Craft Corporation and a part-time student at the University of Arizona.

b. [redacted] is in good physical health, above average in intelligence and by profession a housewife.

c. Mr [redacted] and his wife seem to be absolutely sincere and thoroughly convinced of what they saw. Neither has ever seen anything similar before.





