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STATEMENT

On 4 Dec 1952 I went on duty at 0800 hours as Plan Position Indicator at the Tactical Air Direction Center. At approximately 0815 hours a few scattered targets began to appear on my scope. At approximately 0842 hours a target appeared on my scope, azimuth 034 degrees at approximately 82 miles. This target was assigned as track 11, I then called in a continuation of the remaining moving targets. When I observed the scope for track 11 it was at 034 degrees at 99 miles. At that time the sweep was at approximately 360 degrees. Then it appeared at 052 degrees at 99 miles. I called the floor supervisor and told him that I had an unusual target. At this time the target had moved to 068 degrees at 99 miles. At this time the floor supervisor and A/2C Arthur A. Waller and A/1C Walter Hopf from Radar Maintenance Section came to the scope. Next sweep the target was at 089 degrees at 99 miles, then at 105 degrees at 99 miles, then to 112 degrees at 99 miles. The target stopped at 112 degrees for approximately three sweeps, the target then move back to 105 degrees at which time it disappeared. The above moves from 034 degree at 99 miles to 112 degrees at 99 miles are consecutive sweeps of the antenna which is revolving at 4 revolution per minute. The target disappeared at approximately 0847 hours. The speed was estimated at approximately 6,000 miles per hour.



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FLIGHT CHART


ELEVATIONS IN FEET

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
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



I. Description of Incident:

One unidentified object was sighted by radar at Congaree AFB at 0342 EST by an AN/MDS-5 radar set. The sighting was strictly electronic, not visual. The object was sighted 100 miles NE of the radar site, traveling at an estimated speed of 6,000 mph with contact lasting 5 minutes. The weather at the time consisted of low stratus clouds, no precipitation, and winds NE at 5 mph.

All observers were airmen graduates of radar operator's school with between two to five years experience and considered excellent and reliable sources.

II. Discussion of Incident:

Several past radar sightings of this type have been received by ATIC and evaluated as probable interference from another radar station. This incident may fall into this category eventually in that the excessive speeds of 6,000 mph plus the object's tendency to the radar beam's sweep indicate that interference may have been present. However, not enough information has yet been gathered on local weather, temperature and moisture v.s. altitude, so this incident will be carried as unknown until such information arrives.

In compliance with paragraph 7d, Air Force Letter 200-5 the following information is submitted. All information is itemized corresponding to paragraph 7c:

1. One object was sighted approximately 100 miles north east of Congaree Air Force Base, South Carolina traveling at an estimated speed of 6,000 miles per hour. The object circled the base at a radius of approximately 100 miles from 034 degrees to 112 degrees

a. No information is available as to shape, size, color, aerodynamics, trail or exhaust, propulsion system, and sound.

2. The object was sighted at 0842 zone time, contact was maintained for 0005 minutes.

3. Object was observed by an AN/MPS-5 radar set.

4. The AN/MPS-5 radar set is located at Congaree AFB, S.C. The Coordinates are Lat 33 degrees 56 minutes 00 seconds, Lon 80 degrees 47 minutes 30 seconds west. The latitude reading is north. The object was first sighted 85 miles from the observer at 034 degrees and observed until it disappeared 99 miles from the base at 105 degrees. (See map as reference)

5. The radar set operator was S/Sgt Thomas and was witnessed by A/1c Walter Hopf, A/1c Arden Patefield, A/1c Clarence Ives, and A/2c Arthur Waller. These Airman are rated excellent in regard to reliability and are graduates of radar operators school with two to five years experience.

6. The weather conditions were as follows: Low stratus clouds, no precipitation, and winds north east at 5 miles per hour.

7. No known meteorological condition existed.

8. No physical evidence exists such as fragments, or photographs.

9. No interception or identification action was taken.

10. No known Air Traffic was in the area at the time of sighting.

This track was first picked up at 0840 by S/Sgt Thomas who was at the scope. It was around 99 miles from our sight.

On the morning of 4 December 1952, I A/IC Arden D. Patefield of the Radar Operators Section had the first hour off and was sitting at the scope normally used for controlling. This scope was set up for a range of 80 miles. At approximately 0840 S/Sgt Thomas picked up the fast moving track and reported it. I immediately adjusted the scope to pick up out to 100 miles so as to pick up the same track. I saw the track at 99 miles out traveling at a terrific speed in a Southern course.

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S T A T E M E N T

On the morning 4 December 1952, I A/1C Walter Hopf, and I A/2C Arthur A. Waller of Radar Maintenance Section was in the Control Van adjusting a scope when we heard one of the operators call that he had an unusual object on the scope and that it was moving very fast. We went to the screen and saw an object moving approximately 20 degrees per sweep about 100 miles out. The object was moving Southeast. We watched the target for several sweeps until it slowed, stopped and after a few sweeps disappeared. To my knowledge this was no radar malfunction.
