At 0920 hours, 23 July 1952, the Wing PIO office, 4709th Defense Wing, received the following message from Mrs. [REDACTED]: "Five people sitting with Mrs. [REDACTED] at 9:50 p.m., 22 July, saw a plane (type unknown) travelling from northeast to southwest, preceded by a huge light which seemed to be towing the plane. The plane travelled at a normal rate of speed." This information was referred to the 56th Air Base Group for investigation, and was investigated by Staff Sergeant Dennis G. Washburn, Jr., Intelligence Technician. His complete report is forwarded.

Mrs. [REDACTED] and the other members of the observing party report that they saw a bright light travelling in front of the civilian airplane. They claim the reason for their noticing the object was the fact that it remained at a constant distance from the object at all times. The object was observed from two to three minutes and disappeared simply by drawing out of sight. It was travelling from northeast to southwest. After its disappearance it was not seen again.

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Report of Investigation of Unidentified Object Sighted in the Air on
22 July 1952 at Flemington, N.J., by S/Sgt Dennis G. Vaughan, Jr.

At 1400 hours, 23 July 1952, I was instructed by Major Joseph H. Minty, Operations Officer, 30th Air Base Group, to investigate an unidentified flying object report received at 0920 hours. The person reporting the unidentified object was Mrs. [REDACTED]. I contacted her immediately by telephone and made an appointment for a personal interview at 1900 hours, 24 July 1952. Mrs. Meredith appeared unable to give any other information over the telephone, as connections were extremely bad.

At 1900 hours 24 July I made an interrogation of three of the observers of the incident: Mrs. [REDACTED], Miss [REDACTED] and Miss [REDACTED]. I was unable to contact the others (Mrs. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] as they are in Hawaii).

All observers agree that the object seen followed a straight course across the sky, and that the aircraft following the object remained the same distance behind at all times during the sighting. They were unable to formulate any ideas as to size and shape, although Mrs. [REDACTED] stated that she believed the object to be oval; and Miss [REDACTED] believed the object to be slightly larger than any star. The witnesses agreed that the color was a very dull yellow-orange. Only one object was seen, and all observers continued to watch it for as long as it was in view. Possibly because of their lack of experience in incidents of this nature, none of the observers were able to distinguish any aerodynamic features or to advance any theory as to the object's propulsion system. No trail or exhaust was seen, and statements of all the observers coincided in the fact that the object travelled at exactly the same speed as the following aircraft. As far as the observers were able to determine, it made no distinguishable sounds and definitely executed no maneuvers. Mrs. Meredith stated that possibly the object was flying in some type formation with the aircraft, and both continued their courses to the southwest until out of sight.

No other pertinent or unusual features of the object were noted, and observers say that the incident occurred in a matter of two or three minutes. The weather was very clear; it was extremely hot, and observers say that there just have been quite a lot of humidity in the air. There was no breeze and no clouds were to be seen in the sky. Miss [REDACTED] remarked several times upon the number of fireflies flitting about throughout the sighting. All observers agree that no member of the party had been drinking any intoxicating beverages. Mrs. [REDACTED] in her signed statement to me declares that the object was approximately two to three lengths from the aircraft. In this statement she says that by lengths she refers to the length of the aircraft itself.

All observers agree that in all parts of their description of the object there appears to be no variation in any of the narrative which they gave to me. I have received no other reports of an incident of this nature occurring on the night of 22 July 1952, and as nearly as I can determine, this group comprises the only observers of the reported sighting. Miss [REDACTED] advances the theory that the object may have been observed by the pilot or some of the crew members of the following aircraft, and suggests that the

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Air Force makes a routine check of all air crews that traveled from northeast to southwest on the night of 22 July 1952.

The next item in this investigation report will be copies of the statements signed by Mrs. [REDACTED], Miss [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], and following that will be a copy of the interrogation of each of them.

STATEMENT BY MRS. [REDACTED]

"On the evening of July 22nd as I sat in the back yard with Mrs. [REDACTED] and son Walter, my sister-in-law, Miss [REDACTED] and my daughter [REDACTED] (age 21), I noticed an unidentified object moving across the sky, which seemed to follow a set course. Immediately following the object was what seemed to be a civilian air liner. The object flew a straight course and was followed by the aircraft as long as it was in sight. I was unable to determine any specific shape or size. Its color was a very dull yellow or orange. There was only one object and it appeared to be flying some type of formation with the aircraft. I could distinguish no aerodynamic features and it left no trail or exhaust. I have no idea as to its propulsion system. Its speed was the same as the following aircraft. It made no distinguishable sound and executed no maneuvers. The object with the aircraft continued its course to the southwest until out of sight. I can list no other pertinent or unusual features of the object. This sighting took place at exactly 9:50 hours. The duration of this sighting was approximately two-three minutes. The weather was very clear and there were no clouds to be seen in the sky. There was no breeze and fireflies were to be seen all around. Neither I nor any of the members of my party had partaken of any intoxicating beverage. To the best of my knowledge no identification or interception action was taken against the object. The aircraft following the object seemed to be the only aircraft in the general area. The reason for my noticing the object was the fact that it appeared to be from two to three lengths ahead of the aircraft, and seemed to follow exactly the same course as the aircraft. I can give no other information concerning this incident.

STATEMENT BY MISS [REDACTED]

"I have read the statement of Mrs. [REDACTED] and concur with her description of the unidentified object sighted at 9:50 o'clock on the night of July 22, 1952. I should like to add however, that the object appeared to me as though it were a copper penny only half of which was discernible, (similar to a quarter moon with the far side fusing into the sky). I would like to reiterate that the object was followed by the aircraft across the sky and proceeded at the same speed. I should like to suggest that a thorough check be made of all air traffic in the general area in the event that it was sighted by any crew members of the airplane.

When I first saw the object it appeared remarkable to me that it always kept the same distance from the airplane that was behind it and it was just as if it was towing the airplane.

S/Gen Washburn: Describe the weather at the time of sighting.

Mr. [REDACTED] The sky was extremely clear and there were no clouds to be seen. There was no breeze.

S/Gen Washburn: Have you ever observed any object such as this before?

Mr. [REDACTED] No.

S/Gen Washburn: Is there anything else that you can think of which might aid the Air Force in this investigation of the incident?

Mr. [REDACTED] No, there isn't.

S/Gen Washburn: Miss Margaret Meredith, you have read the statement made by your sister-in-law and have been all the questions I have asked her. Is there anything that you might like to add or elaborate on which hasn't been thoroughly covered thus far?

Miss [REDACTED] No, I can't add anything except that the object did remind me of the color of a bright new copper penny, a portion of which was invisible and fading into the sky.

S/Gen Washburn: How much of this so called penny could you distinguish?

Miss [REDACTED] It was just about the same as a quarter moon.

S/Gen Washburn: Was it also the same size as a quarter moon?

Miss [REDACTED] No, it was a little bit larger than a star.

S/Gen Washburn: Is there anything else you would like to add, Miss Meredith?

Miss [REDACTED] No.

S/Gen Washburn: Miss [REDACTED], can you add any information not covered in the statements and interrogations of your mother, Mrs. [REDACTED] and your aunt, Mrs. [REDACTED]?

Miss [REDACTED] No, there isn't, except that I'm never sighted and didn't have my glasses on. I didn't see the object as clearly as the rest of the witnesses, but I did see it and agree with everyone else in their descriptions.

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STATEMENT OF MRS. [REDACTED]

"I have read my mother's statement and I concur in what she says. However, I would like to say that the object preceding the aircraft seemed to be a light orange-yellow color. I am slightly near-sighted and the object did not appear to me as distinctly as it might possibly have appeared to the others. The object appeared to be slightly larger than the average star. I can add nothing further to this statement."

S/2t Washburn: [REDACTED], what were you and the other members of your party doing at the time of the sighting?

Yes, [REDACTED]. Immediately after dinner we retired to the back yard because of the extreme heat, and were sitting around sipping iced tea.

S/2t Washburn: Exactly what made you notice the object?

Yes, [REDACTED]. At first I was under the impression that the object was a shooting star, but then I noticed it was followed by the airplane, and it seemed to be following a course straight across the sky. I knew by this that it was not a shooting star because all shooting stars seem to make an arc.

S/2t Washburn: Would you say that the object stayed at the same distance at all times?

Yes, [REDACTED]. Yes, very definitely I would.

S/2t Washburn: Mr. [REDACTED] can you give me any idea as to the shape or size of the object?

Yes, [REDACTED]. No, I can't. I think that it was oval, but I do not know why I have this impression, and it appeared to me that the object was larger than any star in the sky.

S/2t Washburn: Was the object clear and distinct, or was it hazy?

Yes, [REDACTED]. It was very readily discernible, and the fact that it was moving across the sky made it all the easier for it to direct our attention.

S/2t Washburn: Did any of you happen to look at your watch as the sighting was going on, Mrs. Meredith?

Yes, [REDACTED]. Yes, Jean checked the time and it was exactly 9:50.

S/2t Washburn: When you telephoned to McGuire Air Force Base, you mentioned that the object seemed to be towing the aircraft along; will you please explain that statement to me?

EVALUATION BY STAFF SQUADRON LEADER HASKELL CONCERNING RELIABILITY OF OBSERVERS:

I would judge all the observers of this incident that I was able to contact to be fairly reliable. Both Mrs. [REDACTED] and Miss [REDACTED] [REDACTED] are ladies of approximately forty five years and appear to be cool, well possessed, and nothing indicated that they were not describing the incident exactly as it occurred. Neither appears to possess a nervous disposition. Miss [REDACTED] is a young lady, twenty one years old, who in attending St. Mary's College in Notre Dame, Indiana. I would judge that the report deserves a C-3 evaluation.

CONCLUSION:

In conclusion I take a brief summary of the incident. On the night of 22 July 1952, at 2150 hours, an unidentified object was sighted in the air over Pennington, New Jersey (Latitude- 40 Degrees North, Longitude- 74 Degrees West) by five persons: Mrs. [REDACTED], Miss [REDACTED], and Miss [REDACTED], who were contacted immediately, and Mrs. [REDACTED] and Mrs. [REDACTED] who are presently in the Middle East on vacation. The object appeared to be a light which drifted along in front of an aircraft, such as if it might have been towing the aircraft. No guess could be made as to size other than to say it was slightly larger than a star, and its speed appeared to be the same as the following aircraft. It was traveling in a northwesterly direction and disappeared by travelling until the eye could no longer see it. The weather during the time of the sighting was very clear and apparently no meteorological conditions could have caused the incident. After its disappearance it was not seen again.

EVALUATION BY MAJOR JOSEPH H. KING:

I have coordinated with Sgt. Haskell during all phases of this investigation, and concur with his evaluation of the sources and of the report.


