

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



Dear Sir:

In reply to your telegram, following a telephone conversation on Feb. 10 with [redacted], as to a probable fireball or brilliant meteor reported from Long Island, N.Y., on 1953 Jan 23 between 10:30 and 10:35 P.M., I have searched our records and find one which I am pretty sure refers to the same body.

The man who reported it was in a car not too far from the Flower Observatory and gave me the information over the telephone. I had no doubt that what he saw was a bright fireball, which is a perfectly natural body and of which I have computed orbits for many dozens.

The one item is the time, but he was driving and quite uncertain about that though he said near 11 P.M. However, from his account the difference in time can be tolerated.

He reported it as  $\frac{1}{2}$  size Moon, falling at a  $45^\circ$  angle in S.E. from N towards S, visible 5-6 seconds, and disappearing below his horizon. As he saw it from front seat of a car, he could hardly have seen higher than  $30^\circ$  for the start, but of this he was uncertain.

Another brilliant one was reported to me by a friend who also lives near on Jan. 23 about 9:30 P.M., as being white, in the East, and falling perpendicularly.

From the data in your telegram there seems to me absolutely no reason to doubt that the object reported to you was a fireball, as I said, and further I think it was the same one reported from here.

Incidentally, at all the army and navy posts near New York City, all of which must have sentinels on duty at all hours, such an object should be reported by them. If not, may I respectfully suggest that it be called to the attention of commanding officers in all the services that they see sentinels be instructed to report such objects. It would in no possible way interfere with their military duties and would be of value to science as well as to you. I enclose a form we distribute to our observers.

<p>The single object was sighted at wide spread locations by five known observers, one of whom was in the vicinity of Upper Darby, Pennsylvania which would indicate that the distance of the object from the four observers on Long Island (the height of the object above the earth's surface) was great enough to be above a tangent extending from the earth's surface at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and above normal surface haze which would have obliterated it at the minimum altitude.</p> <p><b>Significance:</b> Due to the pre-eminence of Dr. Olivier in the field of meteor study it is felt that his statement that the object was a "bright fireball which is a perfectly normal body" may be accepted as the solution.</p>

1. In accordance with Air Force letter 200-6, 29 April 1952, subject as above, the attached report is submitted.
2. According to instructions from a representative, Air Technical Intelligence Center, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, who visited this station during November 1952, interviews were conducted with the observers rather than taking written routine statements. The results of the interviews were recorded on USAF Technical Information Sheets a copy of which is enclosed for reference to the answer.
3. Hayden Planetarium, New York City was contacted to obtain information on meteor activities. They referred the investigator to Dr. Charles P. Olivier, Director of Flower Observatory, Upper Darby, Pennsylvania, who is an authority on this subject. Dr. Olivier had had a report which he felt was the object being investigated and he considered it to be a "bright fireball which is a perfectly normal body".

1. Description: Single bright object described generally as round, oval or elliptical and with somewhat of a tail. All observers except one gave the color as green and also orange-reds. One observer described it as green with an orange tail. None of the observers could accurately describe what they had seen; all of them, however, stated that it was the first object of this nature that they had ever seen. The time of observation, azimuth and elevation of the object were approximately the same for all observers. Only two observers followed the object through a long traverse. The other two saw only a portion of the complete arc. The object was described as traveling at various speeds, all of them in the sonic to supersonic range.
2. Time: All sightings were reported as between 2230 and 2235 hours, 101, 28 January 1953.
3. Manner of Observations: With the naked eye, through eye glasses, window pane or automobile windshield. No aids to vision were utilized.

5. Information on Observers:
  - Mr. ██████████ Amateur astronomer and amateur radio operator. His descriptions were considered to be accurate.
  - Mrs. ██████████ Elderly housewife who stated during the interview that perhaps her impressions might have been conditioned from material which she has read.
  - S/Sgt James Brand and T/Sgt James C. Smith are traffic clerks at Operations, Mitchel Air Force Base, New York
6. Weather: Weather conditions at Mitchel AF Base at the time of the observation had been from broken to scattered cumulus between 4000 to 7000 feet. Further out on Long Island the cloud cover was from lightly scattered to clear.
7. Dr. Charles P. Olivier, Flower Observatory, Upper Darby, Pa., received a report of a sighting at approximately the same time which he accepted as a fireball phenomena.
