HORRY COUNTY MAN SHOOTS FLYING SAUCER

Disk Vanishes After Receiving
Direct Hit

All over the United States reports have been made of the sighting of various unusual objects in the air, now generally referred to as "flying saucers," and just such a thing was reliably reported by [REDACTED], of the Poplar and Adrian community of Horry County, this week.

Booth is a 29 year old ex-serviceman, a member of the Poplar Methodist Church and of exceedingly high character throughout the area in which he is known. There is no doubt in the minds of those who know him well, including ministers, that he is by nature truthful and of high moral integrity. What he saw was no hoax, and he had ample time to study it in great detail.

Booth runs a community store and service station on highway 701 about eight miles north of Conway. He usually keeps his business open until about 11:00, which he did on the night of January 29, last Thursday.

He lives with his parents a mile or so from the store and after closing the station, he drove home and arrived there at about 11:15. His mother had left his supper prepared for him as usual so he put on the coffee pot and sat down to read the paper while it was heating.

A few minutes later, he heard one of his father's mules neighing at the barn. A few minutes more and a second mule began causing a commotion, a mule that is not easily disturbed. Then at about the same moment, the chickens and a pen of ducks began hollering and Booth sensing something awry, grabbed a 22 calibre pistol and went outside to investigate.

He was particularly anxious to investigate because the day before a cow of his had died suddenly, and the veterinarian diagnosed her cause of death as poisoning. Portions of the cow were cut up and sent off for laboratory study to determine what type poisoning.

Thus, Booth thought perhaps some more stock was being tampered with by some one. When he was outside the house, he went directly to the barn, and seeing nothing, he went around behind the building. By this time it was near midnight and a full moon lit up the sky. The eclipse of the moon on the same night had already completely vanished. From his vantage point there, he looked up above the top of the pine trees, and there was the strange object that at first frightened him but never kept him from fully investigating.

The object was almost still, like it was drifting at a pace slower than the fast walk of a human. It was only some ten feet above the tree tops and easily visible. It was making a very low humming noise, barely detectable. Booth realizing he was perhaps getting the best view in history of the long discussed "flying saucer" yelled loud and long for some one at the house, about 200 yards away. But the late hour had them soundly asleep, and he was not able to arouse them.

"But I still wanted to know more about this thing that was hovering around our barn, and with my gun in hand, I went directly into the woods, easily catching up with the object. I walked under it, around it, and viewed it from all sides. It was

about 24 feet long and about 12 feet across, was a light greyish color and was lit up on the inside. Two places in the front somewhat resembled cockpits and were glassed over. I could see the light inside but could see no object in there. The back also has something resembling a cockpit with a stained glass over it. Light was coming through this section, but I could not see through it," Booth said.

"The object was about eight or ten feet deep. The front sloped upward at the base at an angle of about 60 degrees and the back was sloped upward at an angle of 40 to 50 degrees. The sides came straight down from the top for maybe four or five feet and then sloped outward and joined the base at about a 45 degree angle," Booth said. The object obviously was novel in construction and gave an overall, streamlined effect something like half an egg cut from end to end.

"Underneath the 'saucer' was something resembling a built-in wheel, with half the 'wheel', possible three feet across, extending below the base in a crescent shape. There were no markings anywhere on it because I looked hard for some identification," Booth said.

He continued, "There was no visible means of support for the object. It had no propeller, there were no exhaust fumes showing, no vapor trail and I could detect no vapor trail and I could detect no unusual odor. It simply sat there and drifted along as I ran around and around it getting just as good a look as I could. I watched it for at least 20 minutes, maybe as much as 30 minutes."

Despite Booth's yelling for some one to come and see the object, he aroused no one and in desperation after this length of time, he fired his pistol straight up at the "saucer" at a distance of about 75 feet. "I heard the bullet hit the object. It made a metallic sound and bounced off. A bare instant after the bullet hit, the object began making considerably more noise like a large electric motor and took off at a high rate of speed at about a 65 degree angle. It kept that same course until it was completely out of sight," said Booth.

He pointed out that the noise it made when it took off could have been heard easily at his house, if some one had been listening for it, although it was by no means a loud noise like an aircraft of conventional design would have made.

He also debunked any notion that it was a helicopter or any other known type aircraft. "I have been in helicopters and been in and around almost every type plane. This was none of them and didn't even faintly resemble any of them," he said.

Booth said that he was reluctant to tell anyone about the object, even his family because of the widespread debunking of those who have reported seeing mysterious objects. However, his family had heard the shot, and he told them about what he had seen.

He also told Rev. Elwell Jones, Baptist minister in Horry County, and Rev. Jones said "I have known Lloyd Booth all my life. We are about the same age and grew up together. When he says he saw something, he did." And that's the opinion of dozens of Horry citizens who have known Booth for years. "He is a Christian man who doesn't drink or misrepresent anything," said one of his neighbors.

And as a finishing touch, the cow poisoning entered the affair. At least 16 cows have died mysteriously in Horry County within the last three weeks. All have died

instantaneously, some never even kicked. All have died from poisoning, of a caustic nature. There have been no early symptoms. The cows simply have fallen over, and have died in an instant.

Two cows owned by Henry Anderson died of poisoning less than a mile from the sighted object on the very night that Booth saw it. Both cows were milked and fed the evening before but were stone dead at milking time the next morning. Other cows have died the same way from Myrtle Beach through Red Hill and into the Adrian and Poplar sections.

And the greatest number of hogs have died in the area in history. Some farmers have lost whole herds. One man alone reported losing 75. They did not die of cholera.

All of which might add to the mystery. What did Booth see? Why was it there. Did it have anything to do with the death of Horry livestock?

"Blimps Don't Go That Fast"

BOOTH DEBUNKS C. A. A. THEORY HE HIT BLIMP

The Horry County farmer who on January 29 became the only man in the world to shoot a flying saucer today debunked a CAA suggestion that he might actually have "wounded" a Navy blimp.

Lloyd C. Booth, 29, said: "I have seen many blimps and I've even been in one. I'd certainly know a blimp when I saw one 80 feet over my head."

That was the height of the unidentified object which floated slowly over Booth's farm on the eventful night and which soared away after he shot at it with a .22 pistol. Booth sighted the object after a commotion among his livestock sent him in search of a possible prowler.

The blimp suggestion came Tuesday from C. W. Hall of the CAA control tower at Bluetenthal Field, Wilmington, N. C. Hall said three Navy blimps were en route from Glynn, Ga., to Weeksville, N. C., on January 29, and that one of them could easily have passed over Horry County at midnight when Booth was patrolling his farm.

High headwinds kept the blimps low, Hall said, which was why Booth spotted one just ten feet above the pines on his land.

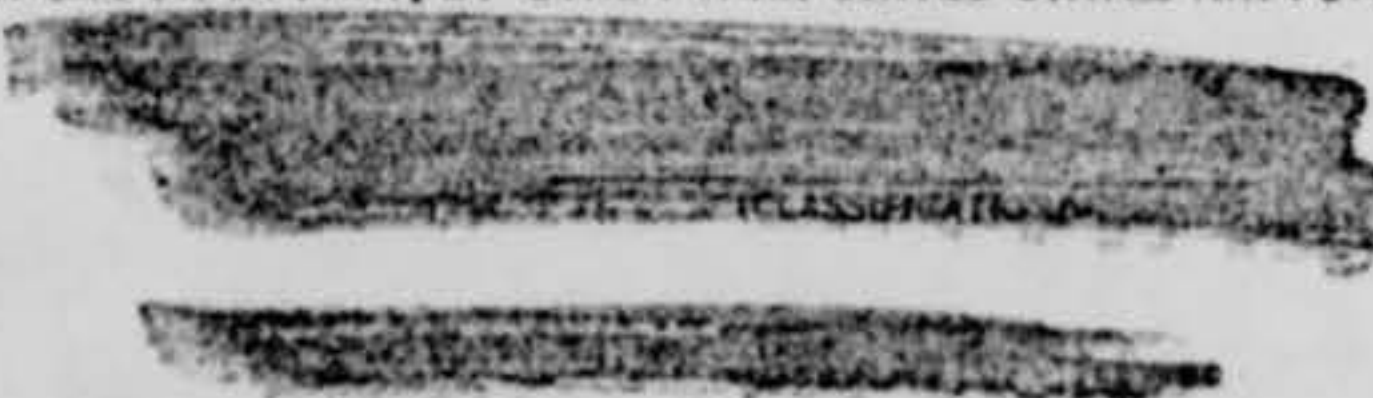

"I was with an anti-aircraft unit for 22 months during the war and I was trained to identify planes on sight. If the object I saw and shot was a plane or a blimp, I surely would have known. I watched the thing for almost 30 minutes."

He viewed it from directly below and from both sides, but was unable to detect any identifying marks or means of propulsion. While cruising from east to west over him, the craft gave off a low hum, like a distant auto. Booth was able to keep pace with the vessel at an average walking speed. It was almost directly above him when he fired at it; his bullet struck with a metallic sound. The craft shot up and away instantly and was beyond range when Booth fired a second time.

"It took off at a speed I'd estimate at 700 miles an hour," Booth said today. "I never heard of a blimp going that fast."

CAA-man Hall opined that an investigation of the blimps now at Weeksville would reveal a dent in the bottom of them where Booth shot it. The Navy has not announced any such damage or indicated any association with the shooting since the event was reported.

Reports of flying saucers have been frequent in this area during the past few weeks. One was seen near Myrtle Beach a week before the Booth shooting. A Marine Corps jet pilot pursued and lost a strange craft along the Carolinas coast. Last Friday, another was seen by four people at Myrtle Beach, heard by another, then seen by six others a few minutes later over Marion, S. C.

Latest reports were made last night when three Myrtle Beach residents saw an unidentifiable object fly inland at approximately 1000-foot altitude.

SC Man Tells of Studying Hovering Flying Saucer, Shooting Into It

LLOYD BOOTH, a local merchant, told today how he "ran around and around" a "flying saucer" hovering a few feet above the trees for an hour and scored a direct hit on the object with a .22 caliber pistol before the "thing" soared away.

The man, 35-year-old Lloyd Booth of the Pontar and Adrian communities, told the State tonight he observed the mysterious phenomenon on the night of Jan. 27.

Booth told in detail of the strange aerial streamlined object and indicated that some people thought it might be connected with the numerous mysterious deaths of animals in his section.

Booth's story was first reported in a page one story in the Field (Conway) written by W. Horne last year.

The story in The Field said "Booth" is a member of the Poplar Methodist Church and of a decidedly high character throughout the area in which he is known. There is no doubt in the minds of those who know him well, includ-

ing his neighbors, that he is by nature honest and of high moral integrity. What he saw was no hoax, and he had ample time to study it in great detail.

The Field's version of Booth's story was confirmed by Booth, an ex-serviceman, who runs a community store and service station on Highway 701 about eight miles north of Conway, said the strange object frightened him at first but never kept him from daily investigating.

He said the object was almost still as if it was drifting at a pace slower than the fast walk of a human. He said it was only a few feet above the tree tops, and easily visible, making a very low humming noise, barely detectable.

Booth said he yelled loud and long for someone at his house nearby to come but everyone was sound asleep.

He added, "But I still wanted to know more about this thing that was hovering around our barn and with my gun in hand, I went directly into the woods, came within 75 feet of the object. I walked under it, around it, and viewed it

from all sides. It was about 22 feet long and about 12 feet across. It was a light grayish color and was lit up on the inside. Two places in the front somewhat resembled cockpits and were glassed over. I could see the light inside but could see no object in there. The back also had something resembling a cockpit with a stained glass over it. Light was coming through this section, but I could not see through it.

The object was about eight or ten feet deep. The front sloped upward at the base at an angle of about 60 degrees and the back was sloped upward at an angle of 40 to 50 degrees. some identification.

"There was no visible means of support for the object. It had no rudder; there were no exhaust pipes showing, no vapor trail and I could detect no unusual odor. It simply sat there and drifted along with a low humming sound as I ran around and around it getting just as good a look as I could. I watched it for at least 20 minutes, maybe as much as 30 minutes."

Booth said his yelling aroused no one. So in desperation, he said, he fired his pistol straight up at the "saucer" at a distance of about 75 feet. Booth said:

"I heard the bullet hit the object. It made a metallic sound and bounced off. A bare instant after the bullet hit, the object began making considerably more noise like a large electric motor and took off at a high rate of speed at about a 65 degree angle. It kept that same course until it was completely out of sight."

He said that the noise it made when it took off could have been heard easily at his house if someone had listened for it. He said the noise was not loud like an aircraft of conventional design would have made.

When questioned about his fear of firing at a strange object with the possibility of being cut down by some strange weapon, he said his curiosity overcame his fear and he fired at the half wheel projecting from the bottom.

Booth said he was sorry he took a shot at the object before it had a chance to settle down in a nearby clearing, so he could investigate further.

Booth is a veteran of anti-aircraft service in the United States and Hawaii and has been drilled in aircraft identification of both enemy and Allied planes.

Booth said: "I have been in helicopters and been in around almost every type plane. This was none of them and didn't even faintly resemble any of them."

Booth said he was reluctant at first to tell anyone about the object, even his family because the "saucers" have been so widely debunked. However, his family heard his shot and he told them what he had seen.

He also told the Rev. Elwell Jones, Baptist minister, The Rev. Mr. Jones said of Booth:

"I have known Lloyd Booth all my life. We are about the same age and grew up together. When he says he saw something, he did."

Other Horry citizens say of Booth: "He is a Christian man who doesn't drink or misrepresent anything."

Meanwhile, other "saucer" reports came from the area.

Booth said that about three people in the Brownway had seen an object at about the same hour about a week before he saw the object. In reply to a question, he said that he did not hear of this report until the day after he had seen the "saucer." He said residents in the Brownway section had reported the object gave off enough light so that a pin could be seen.

Booth said this is how he first came to see the saucer.

Booth had closed his store at about 11 p.m. and driven about a mile to the home of his parents, where he lives. Shortly after 11:15 at the home he heard one of his father's mules neighing at the barn. Seconds later a second mule caused a commotion. Then the chickens and a pen of ducks began making noise.

Booth grabbed a .22 caliber pistol and went outside to investigate.

(The day before a cow of his had died suddenly and the veterinarian diagnosed cause of death as poisoning.)

Booth went to the barn, saw nothing there behind the building. A full moon lit up the sky. An eclipse of the moon on the same night had ended. Then from his vantage point, he looked up above the top of the pine trees and saw the strange object.

Citizens in the area noted that at least 18 cows have died mysteriously of poisoning in Horry County within the last three weeks.

Booth said he doesn't know what to think about the poisonings. He said he could detect no sign of poisonous smell or substance from the object. He said a veterinarian has sent the stomachs of dead cattle to a laboratory for analysis. He said it will take about ten days to get the results. Booth said cattle poisoning is "pretty widespread" over the county.

Report of the sighting of an unidentified flying object by [redacted] of Conway, South Carolina, at 300345Z (January). Three (3) Navy blimps were reported in the area at approximately the time of sighting. It is probable that what Booth saw was one of these blimps.

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1. The object sighted by [redacted] of Conway, S. C., on the night of 29 January 1953 had the following identifying characteristics:

a. Shape - The bottom of the object was oblong-shaped. The top was of a shape much like an egg cut in half. The front blended in with the oblong bottom and had a cab-like affair extending about four (4) feet around the sides. The back was in a point, had two (2) round openings on either side covered by red glass (apparently exterior lights) approximately 16 or 18 inches in diameter. On the bottom of the craft was a crescent-shaped object which looked much like a large counter sun wheel and which covered about half of the overall length of craft.

b. Size - The object appeared to be approximately 24 to 26 feet long and about 8 feet tall excluding the projection on the bottom which was about 3 1/2 or 4 feet tall and approximately the same in width.

c. Color - The object was observed to be a dull light gray color, not like aluminum at all, more like it was painted. This was all observed under a full moon.

d. Numbers - There was only one (1) craft observed by Mr. [redacted].

e. Trail or Exhaust - No trail or exhaust was observed.

f. Propulsion System - No visible means of propulsion was observed. There were no jet openings as exhaust pipes noticed. The observer stated that the object had a dull humming or whizzing sound to it like a large electric motor running.

g. Speed - When first observed, the object was practically standing still. It was so slow that the observer states that he walked along under it and observed it for about twenty (20) minutes. It was about twenty (20) minutes after first observing the object that Mr. [redacted] fired on it with a 22 caliber pistol. Mr. [redacted] stated that he heard the first shot hit the object and bounce off. It was then the object tilted slightly and went up at about a 65° angle at a speed estimated to be between 600 and 700 M.P.H. No erratic movements were noted. The object was traveling practically due west when it disappeared.

h. There were no identifying marks such as numbers, insignias, and the like. No human elements were observed in the object although the cockpit-like affair was fully lighted.

2. The object was observed at 300345Z (January) for a period of twenty (20) minutes. The object was approximately 80 feet above the ground at the time.

3. The manner of observation was visible and was observed by Mr. Booth alone.

4. The location of the observer during sighting was approximately 200 yards from his home which is located 1/2 mile to 1 mile off U.S. Highway 701, 7 miles northwest of Conway, S. C. There are no known landmarks in this vicinity. The object was observed from the ground and headed due West.

5. Mr. [redacted] was the only observer of this object on the night of 29 January 1953. In the statements given to the press and to me, Mr. [redacted] stated that he was very familiar with all types of aircraft, including blimps, having served with an anti-aircraft unit for 22 months during World War II. On checking on the reliability of [redacted] story and of his character, many people were interviewed. All testified that [redacted] was of the highest type character, that he was not prone to lying, and that he was definitely not a publicity seeker nor a drinking man. On interviewing [redacted], it was found that he

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was of an introvert nature which corresponds with the statements of others. The [REDACTED], S. C., stated that he was not personally acquainted with [REDACTED], but that he knew of the family and that as far as he knew they were very reliable people. Mr. [REDACTED], [REDACTED] of the "Field", one of the two (2) newspapers in Conway, S. C., and the only one which carried the story, stated that he had investigated the story, and that from his own investigations had found nothing which would disprove [REDACTED] story. Mr. [REDACTED]'s written statement is inclosed with this report. Mr. [REDACTED], General Manager of the "Field" and four (4) other newspapers in the Myrtle Beach area, also gave a written statement in which he said that he had investigated [REDACTED] and his story very carefully and that he is convinced that what [REDACTED] said is true. Mr. [REDACTED] has just been awarded the "Man of the Year" award for the state of North Carolina, and is a nominee for the Pulitzer Prize. From my own investigation of Mr. [REDACTED], I am convinced that he saw something. [REDACTED] has had two (2) years college at Wingate College in North Carolina and he served for twenty-two (22) months in the last war. He speaks intelligently, expressing himself very well. However, it is entirely possible that what [REDACTED] saw was a Navy blimp enroute from Glynnco, Georgia, to Weeksville, N. C. This theory came from [REDACTED] of the CAA Control Tower at Blumenthal Field, Wilmington, N. C. His story written in the "Field" is inclosed with this report.

6. The weather on the night of 29 January 1953 in the Horry County area was clear and cool with winds about four (4) M.P.H. This is the official report given to me by the 3d Weather Squadron at Pope Air Force Base, N. C. This corresponds to the story given by Booth, but not the one given by the CAA Control Tower. The report from there stated that high headwinds kept the blimps flying from Georgia to North Carolina unusually low.

7. There was apparently no activity or condition, meteorological or otherwise which might account for the sighting.

8. There was no existence of any physical evidence such as fragments, photographs and the like of sighting.

9. There was no interception or identification action taken.

10. Other than the possibility that one of the Navy blimps mentioned above might have been in the area, there was no known air traffic around at the time.

11. Reports of sighting unidentified aircraft of unconventional design have been coming in from the Horry County area for quite some time, but [REDACTED]'s sighting is the only one that has reported seeing the objects so close at hand. Inclosed with this report are several newspaper articles on the [REDACTED] sighting and on other reported sightings. One interesting sidelight gathered from this investigation is that the people of this area are quite upset over the deaths of so many of their cattle. They claim that every time one of these objects is reportedly sighted, within twenty-four (24) hours several cows in the vicinity are found dead. The veterinarians of this area say that the cattle have died from caustic or lead poisoning. This may or may have some bearing on the reported sightings.

To Whom It May Concern:

I have talked to [redacted] on five occasions since he sighted a mysterious flying object on the night of January 29, 1953. Mr. Booth has told me the same story on each occasion. He told it in deadly seriousness. He was never tangled up on details and never had to think to answer any question concerning it that I could ask him.

He is quiet, introvert type personality. He is not prone to talk much. He told no one about his experience for several days after the incident other than his immediate family.

I talked with a large number of Mr. [redacted]'s neighbors, including some who have known him all his life. Everyone has said that he is a good, Christian, God-fearing man that has never been known to lie or misrepresent anything. Rev. [redacted], a Baptist preacher in Horry county who has known [redacted] all his life, said that he was of good character and when he told you something you could depend upon it. The same story is told by every individual in that community that we have contacted.
