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The following teletype report was received from McChord Flight Service Center, McChord AF Base, Tacoma, Washington:

FIC 30-C-2

a. One object; shape and size unknown; bright color; observed object unknown; no observed propulsion system, exhaust trail, red; speed and sound unknown; no maneuvers observed; moved from Northeast of Lyle, Washington to a position over Rowena, Oregon. Object vanished did not go behind clouds.

b. Object sighted 1905 PST 30 March 1953, periods of time unknown.

c. Object was observed visually from the ground, with eight power glasses.

d. Observer sighted object at Lyle, Washington. $45^{\circ} 40'$ North $120^{\circ} 15'$ West.

e. Object observed passed from North to South at an azimuth elevation of 40° .

f. Mr. ██████████, Lyle, Washington. Reliability of information submitted cannot be judged.

g. Weather in general area scattered clouds bases approximately 4000 feet visibility unrestricted; winds aloft 280° 25 knots at 10,000 feet; 300° 30 knots at 20,000 feet; 320° 50 knots at 30,000 feet.

h. Moby Dick weather balloon MQ DA being plotted in general vicinity at 1900 PST.

i. No photographs or fragments available.

j. Interception action attempted unknown.

k. Air traffic; two civil aircraft South and West bound from Yakima, Washington to Portland, Oregon; one jet interceptor on patrol in vicinity of The Dalles, Oregon, at 1845 PST 35,000 feet.

l. Information was received from The Dalles Interstate Airways Communications station via teletype and from Seattle Air Route Traffic Control center via interphone.

Comments of Preparing Officer:

1. Lyle, Washington is located on the North side of the Columbia River, approximately six and one half miles Northwest (330° true bearing) of The Dalles, Oregon. Rowena, Oregon is located across the Columbia River from Lyle (1.5 miles, true bearing 190°).

2. There is a Moby Dick balloon launching site at Chehalis, Washington, which is 11 1/2 miles Northwest (true bearing 310°) of Lyle. A balloon launched from this site, affected by the winds aloft indicated in the message, would have passed near the Lyle area, as indicated by the message. Balloon would have been at an altitude which would render an estimate of its course by a ground observer at least unreliable. Experience has proven that a balloon at altitude can be easily lost when using glasses in a manner which leads to a belief that it has burst or disappeared.

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3. The area in which sighting occurred is in an Air Defense Identification Zone, and any aircraft or flying objects should have been under radar surveillance. Positive statement that radar sites had not observed the incident is not included. The presence of an interceptor patrol in the area, however, indicates that radar surveillance in this area is inadequate.

This is a belated report on the last batch which I received at the end of April.

Just as soon as our plans for employing Miss Gluck officially go through, I shall be able to send you a sheet with comments on each individual case, so that you will have my comments on each folder. The letter method ~~is~~ has obvious drawbacks. But until that time comes and she can handle my typing and completion of forms, I had better stick to this letter method.

In this latest batch we have only 4 really interesting cases. I might mention a 5th, 28 March 53, Scott AFB, which is the 1st report I've seen of an honest to goodness mirage. 6 Cases have only one observer and I'M following my usual rule of discounting those.

8 April was a meteor.

The Great Falls 3 April case was Venus if reported times was in error.

28 March Albrook AFB was probably Venus.

31 March Honshu, and 30 March Lyle, Wash., are puzzling but could possibly have been balloons.

~~The 8 April~~ Greenland case was an obvious meteor.

This brings us to the interesting cases:

25 March San Antonio could hardly have been a mirage and I'm surprised there was no radar pickup. Was there any aircraft like helicopters that might explain this. Anything more come in on this one? Don't think this is good enough for a pinch-bottle but it should be listed as Nocturnal meandering Right.

29 March Spooner, Wisc; Duration times needs checking here. Hard to believe that object could have done all that in 15 seconds. An interesting case and one of the regular questionnaires should be sent to Mr. Gilette.

Next is the 12 April Stead AFB. I think this is the most interesting case of the batch, and I hope you receive more dope on it. Questionnaires should be sent. I'd like to see Menzel explain this one! Is there any possibility that these could have been aircraft? Apparently ducks have been eliminated.

As for the 26 March, Equasseur AFB although NML, the data are contradictory and insufficient. Perhaps this was a helicopter? We ought to ~~have~~ have much more information on this one. Has this been received?
