1. Reference your message, cite number AIT-4773, dated 6 May 53 and IR-23-53, Headquarters USAF, Director of Intelligence, Subj: "Unidentified Flying Object (UFO)", dated 4 May 53. The following additional information is forwarded concerning "UFO" sighting at Sheave's Cove, Newfoundland (463M - 5903N) at 1300Z 27 March 1953.

2. Inclosure 1 is a copy of Report of Investigation conducted by the 2nd CBI Detachment, Ernest Harmon AFB, Newfoundland. It will be noted that the report concerns not only subject sighting, but numerous other sightings on different dates which are alleged to have occurred in the Ernest Harmon AFB area. Inclosure 2 is a map indicating the area the object was sighted on 27 March 1953.

3. With regards to specific questions reported by your message, there appears to be a variance in dates of the reported sighting. The original message to this Headquarters from Ernest Harmon AFB stated that the specific sighting took place approximately 27 March 53 while Mr. [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED] were proceeding to the woods near Sheave's Cove to haul wood pulp. In the CBI report, Mr. [REDACTED] stated that the incident occurred approximately 17 October 52. This agrees favorably with time and date of incident reported by Mr. [REDACTED]. Each of the sightings outlined in the CBI report go in different directions as to travel of unidentified objects. All sightings are alleged to have arched downward toward the land or water.

4. There were no known astronomers in the area of the sighting whereby a check could be made to determine any possible astronomical activity in the area. Weather personnel at Ernest Harmon AFB, approximately 25 miles east of Sheave's Cove, have not indicated any unusual astronomical activity in this area. No unusual phenomena has been noted in this area other than the sightings indicated in the report. All have centered near Sheave's Cove and reported by the local people.

5. The sighting reported by [REDACTED] which is the subject of interest to [REDACTED], occurred at an unpopulated area at a distance from Serrano's Cove. Since the location was not accessible by automobile it was not visited by the investigators.

6. The witnesses involved in the sightings are relatively uneducated individuals living in a remote and rather backward area. In the case of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] it will be noted that, while they observed one sighting from the same location at the same time, there is considerable difference of opinion as to direction, distance and length of observation.

7. During an interview, [REDACTED], 332nd Air Base Squadron, Ernest Harmon AFB, stated that he observed the light with [REDACTED] on approximately 20 April 1964. He stated the sighting was an aircraft which had its landing lights on. The aircraft appeared to [REDACTED] as though it was taking a landing approach to Ernest Harmon AFB.

3. On 8 May 1953 the writer, in the presence of S/A DRAKE and Constable CORRIGAN, interviewed Mrs. [REDACTED] who stated that she and her son, [REDACTED] observed the light on 14 April 1953 at approximately 1930 hours, and stated substantially the same as [REDACTED]

4. On 8 May 1953 the writer, in the presence of S/A DRAKE and Constable CORRIGAN, interviewed [REDACTED], Canadian National, Sheave's Cove, 17 years of age, who stated that some time in March 1953 he was walking along the road with his brother, [REDACTED], who called his attention to a light in the sky. [REDACTED] stated he observed the light and it had the shape of a large light bulb and its elevation was approximately 60 feet and was 75 yards away from him and appeared to be from a northwesterly direction. [REDACTED] stated the object was orange in color and was dropping steadily in a downward arc toward St. Georges Bay; that he observed the light for approximately 15 seconds and that when he last saw it, it was traveling in a southerly direction. Further questioning of [REDACTED] revealed that on approximately 20 April 1953 he had observed a lighted object in the sky approximately two miles away which was traveling in a south south easterly direction; that this light appeared to be approximately six inches in diameter and that there was no bright glow from it and that it appeared to be traveling "slower than an airplane". [REDACTED] approximated the elevation from approximately 400 to 600 feet and stated he observed this light for approximately 15 seconds and that he heard no noise from it and that when last seen, the light had dropped down over a hill out of sight. [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] the American from the base had also seen this object. [REDACTED] could offer no other identifying information concerning this sighting.

5. On 8 May 1953 the writer, in the presence of S/A DRAKE and Constable CORRIGAN, interviewed [REDACTED] Canadian National, Sheave's Cove, who stated in substance that at approximately 0830 hours, 17 October 1952 he and [REDACTED] were walking into the woods at Sheave's Cove on a [REDACTED] sitting expedition; that they were carrying an ordinary kerosene lantern; that they noticed it beginning to become very light in the area and on looking into the air saw a round ball of fire of approximately the same color as the flame from a kerosene lamp approaching from a southerly direction; that the ball of fire passed to the right of them and disappeared over a hill approximately 600 feet in height; that as it disappeared from sight it looked as though it was proceeding in a downward arc toward the ground and just as it passed from sight a large number of sparks burst forth from the ball of fire. [REDACTED] stated that when the ball of fire passed over head it lighted up the area so much that the light from the object dimmed out the light from the lantern; that he could not estimate the amount of time required for the object to pass from the first point of observation in the south to the point where it disappeared over the hill to the north; but he stated that it appeared to be traveling at two or three times the rate of aircraft normally seen flying in the area. [REDACTED] stated that his wife also observed light from the object on the same morning.

6. On 8 May 1953 the writer, S/A DRAKE and Constable CORRIGAN interviewed Mrs. [REDACTED] who related substantially that just at daylight on the morning of 17 October 1952 she was awakened by a flash of light; that she looked outside and noticed that the whole area was lighted by a bluish reflection; that she did not see the source of the light; that the reflection lasted for only a few seconds and gave the appearance of light reflected on the ground from chain lightning.

→ 7. On 11 May 1953 the writer, in the presence of DRAKE, interviewed A/3C [REDACTED] 602d Air Base Squadron, Air Police Section, who stated that he observed the light with [REDACTED] on approximately 20 April 1953 and that he is positive that it was an aircraft which had its navigation or landing lights on. The aircraft appeared to [REDACTED] as though making its approach to Ernest Harmon AFB.

8. The writer was unable to contact [REDACTED] he is presently in Deer Lake, Nfld., and will not return to his residence at Sheave's Cove until August 1953.

9. On 8 May 1953 the writer, DRAKE and CORRIGAN canvassed the area of Marche Point, Newfoundland, for residents who have seen any unusual lights or sightings. Negative results were obtained.

10. Sheave's Cove, Nfld., is a small isolated community approximately twenty-five miles west of Ernest Harmon AFB.

SUBJECT: Unidentified Sightings at Sheave's Cove, Newfoundland

1. On 7 May 1953 Major JACK P. RUFF, Base Intelligence Officer, contacted Major WILLIAM M. OFFLEY, Detachment Commander, and informed him that there had been reports of unidentified sightings during the period of March and April 1953 in the vicinity of Sheave's Cove, Nfld.

2. On 8 May 1953 the writer and S/A DRAME and Constable EDWARD CORRIGAN, STEPHENVILLE Detachment, Stephenville, Nfld., interviewed [REDACTED], Canadian National, 20 years of age, Sheave's Cove, [REDACTED] stated that some time in March 1953 he was walking along the road with his brother [REDACTED], he did not remember the exact time but stated it was shortly after dusk. At this time [REDACTED] noticed the road directly behind him "lit up" and thought that it was a taxicab behind him with bright head lights on. [REDACTED] then observed a light in the sky approximately three-quarters of a mile away and approximately 55° in elevation from shoulder height. [REDACTED] is approximately 5'6" in height. He stated he observed this light for approximately two seconds and that it was traveling from a southeast direction to the southwest over St. Georges Bay. The light appeared similar to a light bulb with a "tail on it". [REDACTED] stated the tail appeared to him to be approximately ten inches long and four inches wide and was the color of the flame of a kerosene lamp and it sounded like an aircraft "far away". Further questioning of [REDACTED] revealed that for a radius of approximately 75 yards from the point he was standing on the road, the area was lighted up by this object in the sky. [REDACTED] stated he last observed the light falling toward the bay in a downward arc and when last seen by him, it was approximately 10° in elevation from shoulder height; further, that the "bulb" part of this object was circular and approximately 12 to 15 inches in diameter. [REDACTED] also stated that on 14 April 1953 at approximately 1930 hours, he was sitting in his kitchen with his father, Mrs. [REDACTED] when they saw a light in the sky that was traveling in a southwesterly direction. [REDACTED] stated that this light, which he viewed for approximately one to two seconds, also appeared like a light bulb and that it was approximately 18 inches in length and again was the color of the flame of a kerosene lamp. [REDACTED] stated he did not observe any of the immediate area lighted up from this object and that the object sounded like an airplane far away. [REDACTED] could not estimate the distance the object was from him but stated that he noticed that it appeared to be falling toward St. Georges Bay and was traveling "three times as fast as a falling star". [REDACTED] further stated that he had heard that residents of CROCHE POINT, Nfld., had observed unidentified lights in the sky. [REDACTED] could offer no other identifying data regarding these people.

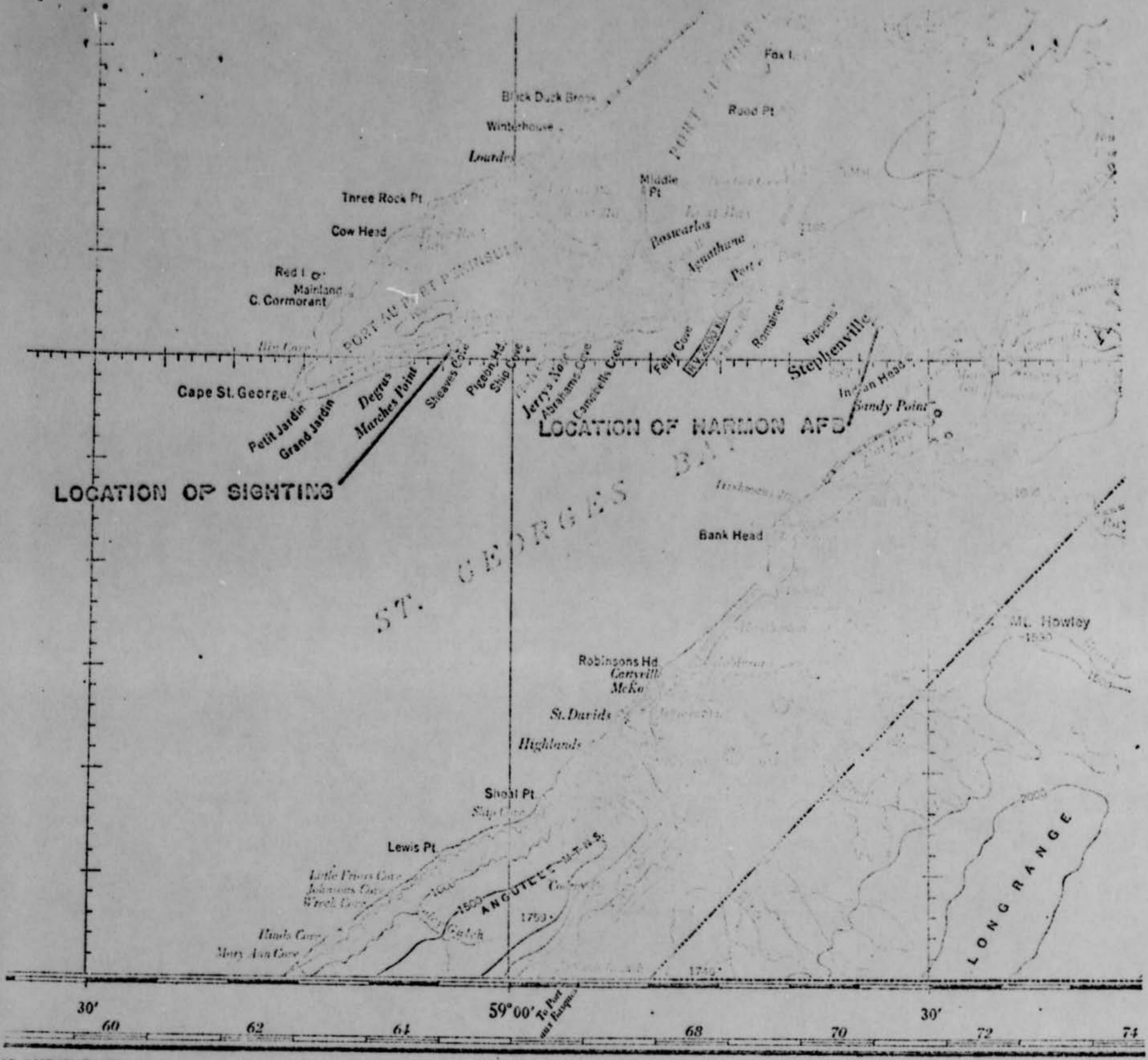

3. On 8 May 1953 the writer, in the presence of S/A BRAKE and Constable CORRIGAN, interviewed Mrs. [REDACTED] who stated that she and her son [REDACTED] observed the light on 14 April 1953 at approximately 1930 hours, and stated substantially the same as [REDACTED]

4. On 8 May 1953 the writer, in the presence of S/A BRAKE and Constable CORRIGAN, interviewed [REDACTED] Canadian National, Sheave's Cove, 17 years of age, who stated that some time in March 1953 he was walking along the road with his brother, [REDACTED], who called his attention to a light in the sky. [REDACTED] stated he observed the light and it had the shape of a large light bulb and its elevation was approximately 60 feet and was 75 yards away from him and appeared to be from a northwesterly direction. [REDACTED] stated the object was orange in color and was dropping steadily in a downward arc toward St. Georges Bay; that he observed the light for approximately 15 seconds and that when he last saw it, it was traveling in a southerly direction. Further questioning of [REDACTED] revealed that on approximately 20 April 1953 he had observed a lighted object in the sky approximately two miles away which was traveling in a south south easterly direction; that this light appeared to be approximately six inches in diameter and that there was no bright glow from it and that it appeared to be traveling "slower than an airplane". [REDACTED] approximated the elevation from approximately 400 to 600 feet and stated he observed this light for approximately 15 seconds and that he heard no noise from it and that when last seen, the light had dropped down over a hill out of sight. YOUNG stated that "JACK, the American from the base" had also seen this object. YOUNG could offer no other identifying information concerning this sighting.

5. On 8 May 1953 the writer, in the presence of S/A BRAKE and Constable CORRIGAN, interviewed [REDACTED] Canadian National, Sheave's Cove, who stated in substance that at approximately 0830 hours, 17 October 1952 he and [REDACTED] were walking into the woods at Sheave's Cove on a ~~map~~ wood cutting expedition; that they were carrying an ordinary kerosene lantern; that they noticed it beginning to become very light in the area and on looking into the air saw a round ball of fire of approximately the same color as the flame from a kerosene lamp approaching from a southerly direction; that the ball of fire passed to the right of them and disappeared over a hill approximately 600 feet in height; that as it disappeared from sight it looked as though it was proceeding in a downward arc toward the ground and just as it passed from sight a large number of sparks burst forth from the ball of fire. [REDACTED] stated that when the ball of fire passed over head it lighted up the area so much that the light from the object dimmed out the light from the lantern; that he could not estimate the amount of time required for the object to pass from the first point of observation in the south to the point where it disappeared over the hill to the north; but he stated that it appeared to be traveling at two or three times the rate of aircraft normally seen flying in the area. [REDACTED] stated that his wife also observed light from the object on the same morning.

6. On 8 May 1953 the writer, S/A DRANK and Constable CORRIGAN interviewed Mrs. [REDACTED] who related substantially that just at daylight on the morning of 17 October 1952 she was awakened by a flash of light; that she looked outside and noticed that the whole area was lighted by a bluish reflection; that she did not see the source of the light; that the reflection lasted for only a few seconds and gave the appearance of light reflected on the ground from chain lightning.

7. On 11 May 1953 the writer, in the presence of DRANK, interviewed [REDACTED] 5502d Air Base Squadron, Air Police Section, who stated that he observed the light with [REDACTED] on approximately 20 April 1953 and that he is positive that it was an aircraft which had its navigation or landing lights on. The aircraft appeared to [REDACTED] as though making its approach to Ernest Harmon AFB.

8. The writer was unable to contact [REDACTED] as he is presently in Deer Lake, Nfld., and will not return to his residence at Sheave's Cove until August 1953.

9. On 8 May 1953 the writer, [REDACTED] and CORRIGAN canvassed the area of Marche Point, Newfoundland, for residents who have seen any unusual lights or sightings. Negative results were obtained.

10. Sheave's Cove, Nfld., is a small isolated community approximately twenty-five miles west of Ernest Harmon AFB.

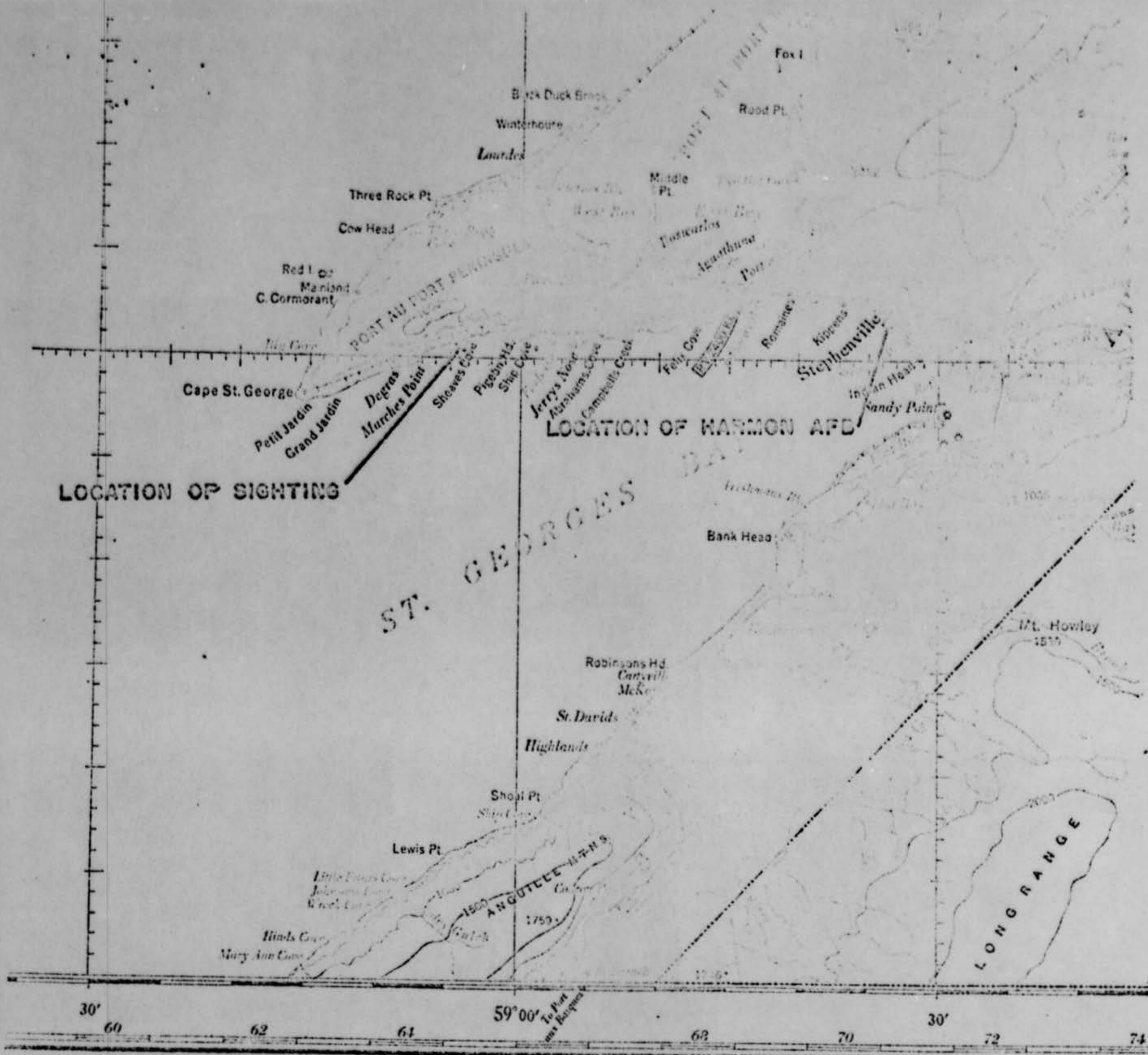
