1. An unidentified flying object was visually observed by two Canadian Nationals from the ground at Ernest Harmon AFP (48°33'N, 58°13'W) Newfoundland, 4 May 1953 at 0150Z.

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1. An unidentified flying object was observed visually from the ground at Ernest Harmon AFB (48°33'N, 58°33'W) Newfoundland at 040150Z.

2. Mr. [REDACTED] Canadian National civilian, in company with his fiancee, was seated on the steps of the Canadian Post Office building, Ernest Harmon AFB, when the flying object was observed. Mr. [REDACTED] attention was attracted skyward by a noise, which he described as similar to the whistling of a rotating helicopter blade. Looking up, he saw a dark object travelling fast at a low altitude. The object first appeared as a shadow, however it passed through the beam of light from a rotating beacon and seemed to be of a gray metallic color while in the light. After passing through the beam of light, the object again took on the appearance of a shadow.

3. Mr. [REDACTED] estimated the object was four (4) or five (5) feet long, about two (2) feet thick and shaped like a football or an egg. The object seemed to be travelling very fast and passed out of view behind the building after two (2) or three (3) seconds observation. The object was estimated to be about 200 yards distant when first observed at a point north of the observers. It then travelled to the southeast until the corner of the post office building obstructed the view.


4. No lights, tails or trails were visible. No noise was heard other than that described above. Weather was 1000 feet broken, 15 miles visibility with low cloud obscuring the hills to the north.

COMMENTS of Preparing Officer:

1. A check of aircraft flight plans and weather balloons indicates that neither could account for the sighting.

2. From the information of the observer, it was calculated that the object would be travelling from 140 to 200 miles per hour.

3. Although the estimated speed would be comparable to that of a small aircraft, the negative flight plan checks necessitate final evaluation as that of a flying object.
