Description

At 2310 EST on 10 June 1953 an AFROTC cadet at Wayne University observed one large bright object that was white or light yellow in color, round in shape and larger than a star. This object moved from a high westerly position in a falling arc toward the north and then leveled off and proceeded at a high rate of speed to the north in a straight line. This object made these maneuvers in a period of 60 seconds and disappeared over the northern horizon. The object, though bright, cast no beam nor left any trail or exhaust. No sound was noticed.

Discussion

Movements of this object and length of observation eliminate the possibility that it was of astronomical origin. Checks with airports in the vicinity revealed that there was one aircraft in the area. This was a DC-4 enroute to Chicago on a heading of 270 deg and was probably not in the area. A check was made with the weather bureau to determine whether or not they had a balloon in the area. A balloon was released at 0300Z, but it could not have caused the sighting since it burst before 0410Z (time of sighting).

Business is a little slow. Jen is going ahead with requesting cooperation from the air control tower operators. Her usefulness has increased in view of her temporary clearance and I hope that her full clearance will not be too long in coming.

I hope we can see you soon and wish you a bon voyage into Law School.

I had just left the Redford Theater and was cutting across feeting 104000.

I had just left the Redford Theater and was cutting across a parking lot at the northwest corner of Grand River and Redford Avenue. I was admiring how clear the sky was and how well the stars shone when I spotted this object. At first I thought it was a meteor, but it didn't take me long to realize that it wasn't, meteors just don't act like this object did. When I first sighted the object, it was northwest of me. It appeared to be about five times the size of a large star and just as bright. The light was white or light yellow and of constant intensity. It did not flicker like stars do. The time was within a few minutes of 2310 hours.

The object also fell too slow to be a meteor. I would judge the speed to be somewhere under 1000 m.p.h. The object was clear and distinct and round or cliptical in shape. It seemed to fall free at first, but than it changed course, leveled out and headed due north. I would judge that I watched for almost a minute before it disappeared over the horizon. The sky was perfectly clear and the air cool, sound would have travelled good, but there was none except the few cars on Grand River a block away.
