On June 19, 1953, 1913, EST, was sitting in stern of skiff at anchor on the Flats just East of Marathon - estimated position, latitude North 24°, 41 mins., 15 secs., longitude West 81°, 4 mins., 40 secs. - watching my wife fight a bonefish from middle of skiff. Fish had been hooked some 10 minutes. Captain was seated in bow of skiff. wind Beaufort's No. 1, dry, warm (approx. 80°), few stars, just at twilight, no clouds of any kind save a thunderhead below Bahia Honda Bridge (some 12 miles distant) which we had been watching earlier in the afternoon, wondering if it might come up on us. The cloud had remained stationary and the distance was quite easy to judge as we had an unobstructed view of the sea and the 7 Mile Bridge was some 2 miles to our right. Cloud formation was obviously South of the termination of the Bridge and indeed we learned later that it had been squalling at Bahia Honda during the late afternoon and early evening. There was no rain of any kind at Marathon until after 2300 EST.

There were no ships in sight, nothing showing in the Stream, and not even a skiff any place near us. There was no noise of any kind and indeed, just prior to hooking the fish we had remarked on the absolute peace and quiet of the scene. The fish was running more or less due East, and I was following his course, when suddenly, out of the sky, as though a flash-light had been turned on, appeared a semi-circle of light (yellow in color, with a greenish tinge), altitude 300, estimated hight 8000 ft., moving on a 2550 true course. The brightness was approximately that of the moon at a similar altitude, the size about 2/3rds of a half-moon --which was indeed its shape. Object remain illuminated for approximately 3 seconds and then faded so that there was practically no liminosity. At the end of about 2 seconds of darkness, object again illuminated for 3 seconds, went off for 2 seconds, again illuminated, and after about 2 seconds, made a 900 turn and disappeared behind a cloud bank.

4 . . . . .

I was able to follow the path of the object somehow, even when it was not luminous, and knew exactly where it would emerge. The distance that the object ran during the some 13 seconds we had it in view was approximately 11 nautical miles. My reason for stressing the cloud bank formation and its distance is that it is by means of this that I marked the length of the run.

When abeam the object had an altitude of about 300, and my recollection is that when it disappeared, its altitude was approximately 100. This latter figure may be erronious. If my recollection is correct, it would indicate either:

(1) that I was wrong on my estimate of the height of the object when abeam (possible, but if it was higher, its size must have been completely fantastic),

- (2) that I misjudged the run of the object before it disappeared (seriously believe this to be improbable, as I had the cloud bank well marked),
- (3) that the object gained height on the run (this latter, toward)

To me the most striking feature of the fantastic episode is the absolute and complete lack of noise that accompanied the phenomenon. There was not a sound of any kind, either before or after its appearance... if you can exclude my exclamation "Jesus Christ, what's that?"

It is my opinion that Captain saw the object simultaneously with me and that my wife looked up and saw it at a fraction of a second after I did. The three of us were able to follow it during the entire run.

The formation, as mentioned above, was that of a round half-moon that was brightly lighted, but there did appear to be a dim, to me, very dim, after-part -- triangular in shape, attached to the base of the half-moon.

I have heard, but do not know of my own knowledge, that the object was picked up on Key West radar.

Statement of Paul Mathias LEINO, Chief Radio Electrician, U. S. Navy, attached to HS-1, Seaplane Base, Key West, Florida, who resides at 1913 Patterson Avenue, Key West, Florida

This is my report of a strange object observed in the sky on the 18th past. at about 1900. It was first brought to my attention by my wife, Bobbie Jeanne, by asking if that was an airplane. Upon first observing the object, it appeared to me to be a very bright light such as a large are search light. The light seemed to focus upon us and well, it seemed as if the object was trying to attract our attention by focusing the light and then kind of taking the light out of focus. I seen this phenomena two or three times. My wife said that she had observed it for, oh, a minute and a half, two minutes, something like that before she had called my attention to it. After two or three phenomena of this apparent focusing upon us by the light appeared to come toward us at a very rapid pace and then it veered off to the right at about a 30 or 35 degree angle from the horizon and where we were anchored in the boat, south of Little Spanish Kay. This light then travelled several miles, I would say 15 to 20 miles in a Westerly direction and then it turned off leaving an object in the sky, oh, anywhere from 12, 14, 13 inches in diameter and continued in a Westerly direction for another 10 to 20 miles and then from this 12, 14, 16 inch diameter it veered directly or in a Southerly direction again and disappeared in a matter of seconds. The right angle flight of this object was at the speed approximately of a shooting star. There was no trail of any sort behind it except this yery, very bright light, it seemed to me a carbon are light. That is just about all that I can recall of the incident. It happened south of Big Spanish Key, here in the Keys, and we were anchored in about 20 feet of water. The object was anywheres from 20 to 30 miles from us at about a 30 or 35 degree angle from the horizon, come toward us from the South, veered off to the West, and disappeared back into the South. On the extinguishing of the light, it appeared to be, well, having been at sea and seen operations where the larger battleships use these very large 30 inch carbon arc search lights, the light appeared to be of that type and upon turning out it acted just as those lights that I have seen during maneuvers, well, some maneuvers that I have been in in the Navy, having been in several years. It just dimmed out, fluttered a little, and after the light was out I could still distinguish this object as a dark object. I wouldn't say it was exactly black, but it was a dark object in the sky anywhere from 12, 14, 18 inches in diameter and it continued for several miles in a Westerly direction before it turned South again and disappeared in a matter of a very igw seconds or a very short time. The path of flight was upward. It was both upward and downward. As it come toward us at the first sighting, it come at a lowering altitude. It come from the horizon watching down, I would say it dropped about 2 degrees in the amount of travel that I saw and then upon turning right, it had a very slight increase of altitude, anywhere from 2, 3, perhaps even 4 degrees of rising altitude when it went in a Westerly direction and when it disappeared in a Southerly direction, it started in an up attitude again. We were in company with the "J" "D" of Key West, Florida, another fishing boat owned and operated by Joe Walker. He was on the Northern side of the Island doing some fishing and about the time that this chenomena was observed, they were returning to the anchorage, but upon them arriving back with us, I asked thom if they had seen it and they said, no, because at about the time that Mrs. Leino and I observed this phenomena they had become stuck upon a sand bar and all hands were out pushing the boat off the bar to get going again. light condition was right at dusk, around 1900. In this area it was still light enough that objects could be seen plainly for a good many miles. The weather was clear, no rain, some clouds in the sky. As a matter of fact, the object when my wife first observed it, came out from behind the clouds. The time of day, it was just before the stars came out. That is just about the time of day it was, just before the stars came out. I have observed falling stars, and meteorites in travel, prior to this, but this did not appear at all like anything that I had ever seen before, it was just this very, very bright light. It was a very bright light which seemed to be focusing upon us and then the focus would be lost and then it would come on again. It seemed like it was being focused on us and then as if they were trying to attract our attention. That is the way the wife explained it to me and the few times that I seen it, that it was just trying to get us in focus and then it would go beyond and then it wouldn't be focused and then to bring it back into focus and it was very, very bright upon its travel there was no trail of any sort that I could see. The closest distance that it got to me, I should say was within 20 miles. Not closer than 20 miles. Well, I am not a very good mathemetician, but from where I was it was about a 30 degree angle right off the water at about a 30 degree angle at 20 miles. How high would that be? We will let a mathemetician figure it out.

I was requester here to give my age, which is 43, I will be 42, this coming November, weight 194 pounds. I first emissed in the Navy, July 15, 1935, was discharged July 15, 1941, reenlisted October 1, 1942, and have been in continuous service since then, a total of 18 years and 9 months, no, not quite 9 months, 8 months and 25 days naval service.

WO Paul M. Leino, USN, HS-1, Seaplane Base, Key West, Florida, observed an extremely bright light in the sky, south and west of Big Spanish Key near Key West, at approximately 1900 hours (2400 Z) on 18 June 1953, after having his attention called to it by his wife. He observed the light for approximately five (5) seconds during which time it appeared to move towards him (northward), then away from him (westward), then to the south, at a very high rate of speed. The object was first seen by Mrs. "eino who is said to have observed it for approximately two (2) minutes before calling her husband's attention to it. Salient features of the observation, in WO Leino's account, were the apparent "focusing" effect; the intensity of the light, and the object's speed and abrupt change of course.

This office has no comment on the similicance of the report other than that the observer evidently saw a very bright light or lighted object which was not familiar to, nor recognized by him.

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

- 1. The following information is submitted in the order established by paragraph 70. AFL 200-5.
- a. As observed and described by WO Leino the object and/or light had no defi nite shape other than "round and oblong". The size, as reported to the Base Intelligence Officer, US Naval Base, Key West, was stated to be 12 or 14 or 16 inches in diameter; however, after questioning by this interviewer, it was ascertained that this was Wo Leino's estimate of its exact size and Leino stated that as compared to his thumb held against the sky the light appeared to be approximately four (4) inches in diameter while the object seen after the light went cut was approximately one quarter (1/4) to one eighth (1/8) of an inch in diameter. Color was described as an intense white exactly like a carbon are larp of the type to be found or bettleships. There was only one light and one object seen and the light was described as coming from the object. No aerodynamic features, trail, exhaust, propulsion system, or sound were observed or noticed. During the time observed, the light and object traveled through approximately 90° laterally on two courses, westward and southeastward; degree of travel on the first or northwest-bound let was not ascertainable. On the first leg it appeared to descend an estimated 2" from the horizontal, while on the second, or westward leg, it was described as climbing 2° to ho, after which it levelled off, then arose again at a steeper angle on the last or southeast leg. It disappeared from sight, above the horizon, through what was described as dimming out or flickering out like a carbon are light when it is extinguished and by diminishing in size. Subject was emphatic in declaring that there seemed to be an attempt to "focus" the light. basing his statement upon the varying intensity and brightness of the light which he described as being greatest when directly facing him and his wife. As used by him, "focusing" connotes aiming rather than clarifying a field of vision. No lighting of the area of observation was noticed. Speed was stated to be that of a meteor and sharp turns onto each of the last two legs were noticed as additional unusual features.
- b. The observation was made at approximately 1900 hours EST (2400 Z) and lasted for an estimated five seconds. (Estimate of elapsed time was based on a test made for this interviewer consisting of counting up to five and adding the phrase "one thousand and " before each digit at a normal talking rate.) Mrs. Leino was mentioned as having observed the light for an estimated two (2) minutes before WO Leino's observing it, during which time the varying intensity was described as especially noticeable.
- c. Observation was visual, no optical aids being used, and was made from a boat on the water.
- d. At the time, the observer was in a boat anchored between marker buoys 33 and 3h, over the 20 feet depth just south of Big Spanish Key, or at 2h h6' 30" north, 081° 25' west. Observer mentioned Little Spanish Key in the attached statement but corrected this when questioned by the interviewer from this office. Observer estimated the object to have been twenty-five (25) to thirty (30) miles away from him and at a height of 30° to 35° above the horizon at all times. However, he stated to the interviewer, after being led to discuss perspective in connection with true size and distance, that his estimate of distance was not based upon known constants but was based upon his estimate of the true size of the object. This also explains the discrepancy between size of the object as set out in the attached statement and size as indicated in paragraph a. above, i.e., not taking into account the effects of perspective.
- e. Description of observer's experience set forth in the last paragraph of the inclosed statement was checked by the interviewer from this office and found to be true in all particulars. Personnel records pertaining to the observer indiantervals.

a Final Top Secret security clearance dated 25 March 1952, given by the Commanding Officer of the "S Naval Air Development Center, Johnsville, Pennsylvania. He was in the company of the interviewer for approximately one and one-half hours during which time he seemed very stable, extrovert in nature, friendly, mature, honest, and possessed of a quiet self confidence. His cooperation was excellent. He appears to be very religious although not ostentatiously so. He stated he believed life could exist on other planets and that he believed inter-planetary travel was possible but he was not convinced of its actuality at this time. He had heard reports of "flying saucers" and read articles concerning the phenomena. He stated he was slightly familiar with astronomy but that the object which he saw appeared to be different from any star or materr which he had ever seen, both in intensity and ability to change course sharply. At the time of the sighting he and his wife were alone on their hoat, fishing, and they remained on the boat for two more days. He stated they had nothing to drink aboard except coffee and water. Mo estimate can be given of his wife's reliability since lack of time during the visit to Key West prevented interviewing her.

f. Weather and winds aloft conditions at the time of the sighting were not available from the local weather station since they had been forwarded to the National Weather Records Station at Asheville, North Carolina. However, personnel stated that conditions had remained fairly constant throughout the twenty-four hour period and offered a report for 0900, 18 June. This is submitted solely as an indication of weather conditions for the over all period.

- g. No unusual meteorological conditions were noted during the period. There were thunderstorms in clouds and frequent lightning, cloud-to-cloud, thirty (30) miles to the northwest of Key West at 2128 hours. The ceiling was composed of low scattered clouds at 22,000 feet and high broken clouds at 30,000 feet. Official sunset was at 191h hours (001h 7).
  - h. No physical evidence of the sighting was found nor were photographs taken.
  - i. No interception or identification action was taken.

One of the TBM's on local flight missions was equipped with a searchlight; however, it was not on a searchlight operations mission and the light is aimed directly forward.

2. Observer and his wife did not return to Key West until 20 June and, since he was on leave until 26 June, he did not report the incident to his superiors until the latter date. The sighting was reported to this office via the Base Legal Officer (Base Intelligence Officer) at Key West, the ONI in Miami. and the OSI at this base, and the report was received in the afternoon of 26 June. Efforts to contact the ONI in Miami and the Base Legal Officer at Key West proved fruitless on Friday afternoon and Saturday morning since both offices had closed for the week end. Due to the fragmentary incomplete nature of the first report no electrical report could be submitted. An interview was arranged at Key West on 1 July and it was decided that due to the lapse of time between the sighting and collection of all the facts the expense of an electrical report would not be warranted.

- 1. The inclosed copies of correspondence between this Headquarters and the Base Intelligence Officer (Base Legal Officer), U.S. Naval Base, Key West, are submitted in reply to your message AFOIM-ATTAE-7-16-E.
- 2. In reference to paragraph 3, Inclosure 2, the interviewer contacted personally an officer in the Operations Office at Boca Chica Maval Air Station and the latter officer furnished the information as to aircraft movements after a telephone conversation with another office. There was no reason at the time to suppose that the information was furnished from what was evidently some sort of planning schedule that was later modified. Having been informed of the contents of Inclosure 2 when in conference with the Base Intelligence Officer at Key West at the time of investigating the De Forrest sighting (reference message AFOIN-ATIAE-7-25-E), the interviewing officer personally reviewed aircraft movement control logs maintained by the CAA and the control tower to obtain pertinent information for the De Forrest report. This office regrets the error in not making personal absolute verification of information furnished in the Leino report.
- 3. In reference to inclosure 3, this office has furnished copies of AFL 200-5 to the Base Intelligence Officer, Key West, and has offered to furnish copies of JAMAP 146. CIRVIS Reports, if copies are not readily available to the Base Intelligence Officer.





- 1. The information stated in the third paragraph of reference (a) has been checked with the Operations Officer at the Naval Air Station and it has been determined that there were no aircraft in the air during the times in question. The two local flights, SNB and the TBM, were cancelled and were never airborne. The transient PAY did not arrive at 1902 on the day in question, but had arrived prior to that date. Its final departure from the area was in the mid-afternoon of the date of the reported sighting.
- 2. We were unable to determine that any aircraft with searchlights were in the air in the Key West area at any time close to the time of the reported sighting.
- 3. The information you have on the two local flights was apparently obtained from a mineographed flight schedule of Air Development Squadron ONE. These two flights were cancelled prior to the scheduled time of departure.

Interrogated Mr. & Mrs. . They both talked a great deal, not waiting for questions to be put to them.

Mr. Market is a deliberately careless, highly sophisticated individual of 5h, resembling Sir Cedrick Hardwicke, who made a well-executed entrance into the room zipping up his trousers, fablowed by flinging himself full-length upon a couch and pouring himself not less than h conces of Mennessey. He considers himself the epitomy of observers — in fact, he states he can see stars in the daytime. As he reached over to refuel his glass I could well believe him. The character of the observers is, I believe, relevant to the interpretation of the phenomenon being investigated.

The observers reconstructed the incident: namely, that they, along with a guide-fisherman, had been fishing off Key West, 19 June 53. The time was at twilight, everything was still, no clouds at all except a cumulonimbus piling up on the SM horizon, some 11 miles distant. Suddenly, a half-moon shaped object "like a quonset hut on its side, lit up out of nowhere, 20° high, and in the next 13 seconds traveled thru approximately 100 degrees of arc, rising to 30° when it was abeam, directly south, and then disappearing in the SM, behind the thunderhead. In the 13 seconds under observation, the object lit up, or went through, 2½ cycles, of illumination, of 3 seconds each, during which time it glowed a translucent, greenish-yellow, with dark splotches or markings on it. The outline of the object was still visible as it passed through the darkmed phases. There was no sound associated with this phenomenon. All three people saw it; one was wearing polaroid gunglasses, another, prescription sunglasses, and the 3rd observer (rothchild) observed with the unaided eye.

Mr. . calculates that at a distance of 12-14,000 feet, the speed would have been 3,400 mph and the size of the object 600 feet.

#### Evaluation:

- 1. The incident took place within 2 minutes of sunset.
- 2. No one saw the moon at the same time. However, on 19 June, the moon was at 1st quarter, putting it near the meridian at sunset. Yet, they all stated emphatically that the moon was not visible.






