Information was received from OSI District office No. 23, Carswell Air Force Base on this subject as related to them by Mr. [redacted] employee of Consolidated-Vultee Aircraft Corporation, Department 28-3 (Production), who resides at [redacted] Haltom City, Fort Worth, Texas.

Mr. [redacted] was interviewed 17 July 1953 in accordance with AFI 200-5. Mr. [redacted] was cooperative and conversant during the interview and offered a signed statement which is attached herein. Mr. [redacted] related the following description: The object was blue or purple in color, appeared more of a light than a solid object, he was unable to estimate size or any aerodynamic features. Object apparently was traveling at a very high rate of speed, and registered no sound. Mr. [redacted] advised the object maneuvered very sharply once or twice then disappeared in a northwesterly direction.

questionnaire sent to unit 7-15-53

Object was sighted approximately 2115 hours 9 July 1953, and was visible to Mr. [redacted] about three or four seconds. The weather at the time was hot and clear, and according to Mr. [redacted] there was no activity or condition, meteorological or otherwise which might account for the sighting.

It should be noted Mr. [redacted]'s estimate of location the Lake Worth area would be in the immediate vicinity of Consolidated-Vultee Aircraft Corporation and Carswell Air Force Base.

Employment records reveal [redacted] employee [redacted] born 15 July 1918, employed as Engineer Liaison Man-B, High School Education.

The information as developed herein did not warrant further pursuit of the matter and other witnesses herein mentioned were not interviewed.

1. Information was received on this subject from Mr. [REDACTED], an employee of Convair, Department [REDACTED], who resides at [REDACTED], Fort Worth, Texas.

2. [REDACTED] advised that at approximately 2115 hours, 9 July 1953, he had just finished a church activity at the Ridgecrest Baptist Church and was locking the front door of the church in preparation to leaving when he observed a blue, hazy, glowing light northeast from the front of the church which faces in a westerly direction. The blue, hazy light had no definite outline and appeared to be travelling in a southwesterly direction. It changed course and travelled in a westerly direction for what appeared to be a short distance and again changed course to a southwesterly direction. The total time this blue, hazy light was visible was approximately three (3) or four (4) seconds and [REDACTED] was unable to identify a shape or form which might be attributed to the light. [REDACTED] further advised that he was unable to estimate the altitude of the light; however, believed it to be at the same altitude as normal aircraft in flight. [REDACTED] could not state whether or not the blue, hazy light could be attributed to the flying saucer phenomena. [REDACTED] stated that three (3) other persons were present at the time he saw the light and whom he also believed saw it. [REDACTED] identified these persons as: Mrs. [REDACTED], his wife; Mr. [REDACTED], residing at [REDACTED], Haltom City; and, a Mr. [REDACTED], who resides in the [REDACTED], Haltom City.

3. For your information, [REDACTED] is believed to be somewhat sensitive about this matter, believing that he might be held up to ridicule at his place of work should his name be used in this connection. He is willing to give any information desired irrespective of any other consideration.

4. The foregoing is submitted for your information in the event that you desire to submit information pursuant to Air Force Letter 200-5.

Please be advised that approximately 2115 hours, 9 July 1953, just having finished a church activity at the Ridgecrest Baptist Church, I observed one object of a blue or purple color traveling at a very high rate of speed. There was no sound apparent to me. The object maneuvered sharply with the exception of a momentary hovering motion, and disappeared in a northwesterly direction at a very high rate of speed. I would estimate the period of observation to be three or four seconds. It is further estimated that the object went over the Lake Worth Area, and continued to travel and disappear in a northwestern direction. It was impossible for me to give an accurate estimation of the altitude. The object was at an approximate 60° angle from the point where I was standing, but appeared to be at the same altitude of a normal airplane in flight. This object was also observed at the time and in my presence by my wife, Mrs. [REDACTED], Mr. [REDACTED], residing at [REDACTED] Halton City, and Mr. [REDACTED] who resides in the [REDACTED] Halton City.
