On 27 July 1953, I interviewed Mr. [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED], civilians working in the Auto Maintenance Section, Hollis Air Force Base, Nevada, concerning an unidentified flying object. These men were together when they observed this object and their versions of the appearance of the object are virtually the same.


These men were having a picnic at Deer Creek Springs, Nevada, on Sunday, 26 July 1953, however, the two men were in different camps approximately 100 yards apart. Mr. [REDACTED] was the first to observe the object and after looking at it for a few minutes, contacted Mr. [REDACTED] and together observed it for about an hour. Although the object could be seen with the naked eye, most of the observing was done with the aid of two pairs of binoculars, one 7 power and one 10 power. Their description of the object is substantially as follows:

The object appeared to be at a tremendous height. The men estimated 70,000 feet but when questioned they could offer no reason for this estimate. They also estimated its size as high, possibly 100 feet in diameter, but again could give no reason for their estimate. The object was to the northwest of their observation point but so high that it necessitated holding their heads back and looking almost straight up in order to observe it. They both agreed on the following points: That the object was round and flat resembling the shape of a肾脏 lens. It was bright silver metallic in color and reflected the rays of the sun brilliantly at times. It seemed to hover on its own axis while remaining in one spot, at times showing just the side view and again showing a top or bottom view. A slight whitish glow was seen at times near the object but observers could not indicate its source.

The two men finally got tired of watching the object and were relaxing for a few minutes and upon resuming their observation discovered the object had disappeared.

Both men seemed to be sincere and reliable. This officer can give no logical explanation of the object since no weather balloons or aircraft from this area were airborne at that time.

At eleven hundred on the 20th of July 1953, we were having a picnic at a camp site on Deer Creek in the Spring Mountains. My mother-in-law, Chester Anderson was looking at the clouds when he spotted a light speck which he asked me to look at through my binoculars which are fairly powerful, being 10 power. It was round at times appearing to get flatter at others. It seemed to be revolving such as a disk might. The object seemed to have a darker surface on the top, such as a hat with a shallow crown. It was bright as new metal and at times I noticed a vapor, mist or some such substance on one side of the object. The object stayed in one spot for about an hour; the last time I looked I didn't see it.

I had two pairs of binoculars with me and observed the object thru both pairs, one being 10 power and the other 7 power. After looking for a while at the object, I went up to another camp, about 100 yards away and showed it to a friend of mine, George Fingerman. The object seemed to be around 75,000 feet altitude, and located west of Deer Creek Spring.

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Yesterday, 28 July 1953, at approximately 1100 A.M., at Deer Creek Springs, Nevada, I saw a flying object which I could not identify.

I could see it with my naked eye as a small shiny object and I brought it into more detail with a pair of 10 power binoculars. The object maneuvered by turning and swinging around while staying in one spot where I observed it for thirty minutes. I would judge it to be about 70 or 75 thousand feet in a north westerly direction from where I stood. I stopped looking for about five minutes and when I looked up again it was gone.

The ATIC needs the following information for its Project Blue Book: Was there any type upper air research balloon in the Nellis AFB, Nevada, area at 26 1900Z Jul 53? Unidentified aerial object was observed near Nellis AFB that was round and approximately 100 feet in diameter, bright silver color, trailed by slight whitish vapor released intermittently. Location of object was 116 deg 10 min N - 36 deg 25 min E, sighted northwest from observers at approximately 30 miles distance, estimated altitude of object was 75,000 feet.

**Description**

Two civilians who work in the Aero Maintenance Section at Nellis AF Base were on a picnic at Deer Creek Springs, Nevada, when they saw an unidentified flying object that was estimated to be 100 feet in diameter and at an altitude of 70,000 feet. The object was silvery metallic in color and reflected the rays of the sun brilliantly at times. The object was observed for a period of one hour with both ten power and seven power binoculars.

**Discussion**

Reporting officer stated in his report that there were no weather balloons or aircraft in the area at the time of the sighting. A check was made with the upper air research balloon tracks received from Lowry AF Base revealing that there was very probably a balloon over that area at the time of this sighting.

**Conclusion**

Probably balloon (upper air research).
