STATEMENT

The unidentified object was similiar to a large star, but seemed to be rotating and emitting alternate green and red flashes, and moving slowly north and downward on the horizon. The shape of the object, speed, and method of propulsion could not be determined.

I first sighted the object at 2145 hours Central Standard Time on 27 August 1953. Obscured by clouds and it was lost from sight at 2235 hours Central Standard time. The object moved very slowly and up and down. The object was sighted visually from the surface, however the speed and altitude was unknown.

The observation was taken from my bedroom window, and the distance between the object and myself could not be determined. See inclosed memory sketch for more details. (Inclosure #2)

I have 12 years Air Force service, and held a private flying certificate. I have appreximately 300 hours of night flying time as engineer on C-47 type aircraft. My wife, Mrs. The less saw the object, but she has no experience to authonicate reliability of observation.

The weather was high scattered clouds, winds aloft unknown, visibility good at time of first sighting. There were no condition or meteorological activities that would account for the sighting. There was no physical evidence of the sighting.





STATEMENT

Statement of sighting by A/1C A. E. ARCENEAUX, AACS Squadron Greenville Air Force Base, Mississippi.

Over the herison it appeared to be a circular shape. It didn't appear very large from our view point. Its color was sort of red, green and slight yellow. There were only one object, and it did not appear to have any exhaust at all. Its propulsion system could not be determined, speed could not be determined because I did not know its distance, but it moved very slowly from my vantage point. Its movements were but moving in a westward movement at approximately the same altitude, it just seemed to fade away into the night. It moved about ten (10) to fifteen (15) degrees from southwest towards the west. It appeared to be rotating. It would give alternating colors for approximately three (3) or four (4) seconds and then would give a steady red light. It moved so slowly that it appeared to remain stationary. But as time went along I could definitely determine a movement.

I sighted the object from the Control Tower at 2230 hours until 2300 hours in the southwest with westward movement. At 2310 hours I notified Memphis Control, and they stated no aircraft were in the area at 2312 hours. At 2300 hours it disappeared.

At first it was isghted with the naked eye and in order to get a better view we used a pair of 7 x 50 binoculors. My vantage point was in the control tower at Greenville AFB, Miseissippi. I'd rather not guess at its distance because it was over the horison and appeared to be some distance off, southwest of the town at approximated 5,000 or 6,000 feet. Capt. Lehman was the Officer of the Day and was in the tower at the time, also A/2C Hugh Mas Bonell.

The weather was V F R, and there were no conditions or meteorological activities to account for the sighting. I have no physical evidence of the soghting.



DESCRIPTION OF UNIDENTIFIED OBJECT:

- (1) The unidentified object was of circular shape, and similiar to a large star. It emitted red, green, and white alternate flashes of light for approximately three (3) or four (4) seconds, then a steady red flash of light deminishing as if increasing in distance. There was only one object observed. It did not appear to have any exhaust, and its propulsion system, or speed could not be determined, however it did seem to be rotating. Obscured by clouds and lost from sight was its manner of disappearance.
- (2) The object was first sighted by source at 2145 hours Central Standard Time, and remained in sight until 2235. It was sighted by a second source at 2230 hours Central Standard Time, and remained in sight until 2330 hours Central Standard Time. These observations were made the 27 August 1953.
- (3) First source made his observation visually from the surface, and no optical aids were used. Second source observed the object from the Greenville AFB Control *** and 7 x 50 binoculors were used.
- (4) First source had no knowledge of the altitude of the reported object, however it was moving in northward direction from his vantage point, see inclosure #1. Second and third sources estimated the object at approximately 5,000 or 6,000 feet in altitude, and was observed south-west of the Greenville AFB Control lower, see inclosure #3.
- (5) Source one was M/Sgt American having 12 years Air Force Service. He has approximately 300 source night flying time as an engineer on G-47 type aircraft and has his own private flying certificate. Source two was Capt. William D. Lehman an Air Force Officer on flying status. Source three was A/1C A. E. Arcencaus, who is a qualified control tower operator.
- (6) Base Weather was contacted and the conditions were as follows: Broken clouds at 5,000 feet, with eight (8) miles visibility, wind velocity four (4) miles per hour, direction 140 degrees south-east; this was between the hours 2145 Control Standard Time, and 2235 hours Central Standard Time, 27 August 1953;
- (7) There were no conditions or activities meterological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.
 - (8) There was no physical evidence of the sighting.
 - (9) There was no interception or identification action taken.
- (10) Memphis Control was notified at 2310 hours Central Standard Time of the sighting, and a 2312 hours, Memphis called GAFB Tower, and reported that Memphis Flight Service reported no transit aircraft in Greenville Area. GAFB Base Operations was also contacted to determine if any aircraft from this station could have been in the area of the sighting, and no aircraft was reported flying at the time of the sighting. The weather detachment was also contacted for possibility of weather balloons, but none were reported.
